Aeronautics Board To Assist Airports

SALEM — The State Board of Aeronautics has approved assistance for airports in nine communities, but has rejected a petition for state aid in establishing a public airstrip at Seaside. The board announced Thursday that an airstrip site proposed by the Seaside Junior Chamber of Commerce was unprotected from the ocean, tides and winds. The petitioners said a private airstrip at Seaside that is not affected by sea or air conditions does not meet public airport requirements. Funds for seal coating of runways were approved for airstrips serving Pendleton, La Grande, Baker, Ontario, Salem, Lakeview, Burns, Eugene and Corvallis. The 1957 Legislature authorized \$27,000 for the work.

Dr. William M. Pearce, La Grande, was elected chairman of the board, succeeding Ralph Scroggin, Lebanon, whose five-year term expired last week. Attending his first meeting was Gene Waddle, Portland, named to the board this week by Governor Holmes.

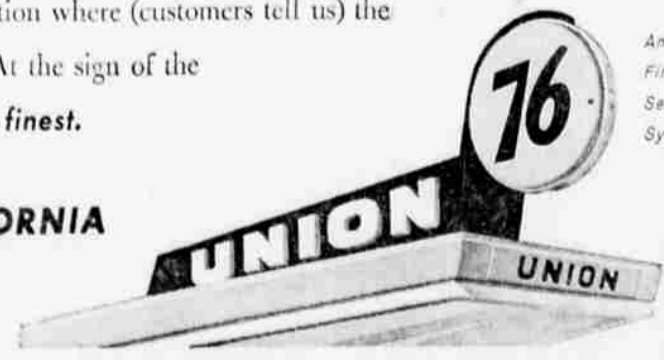
