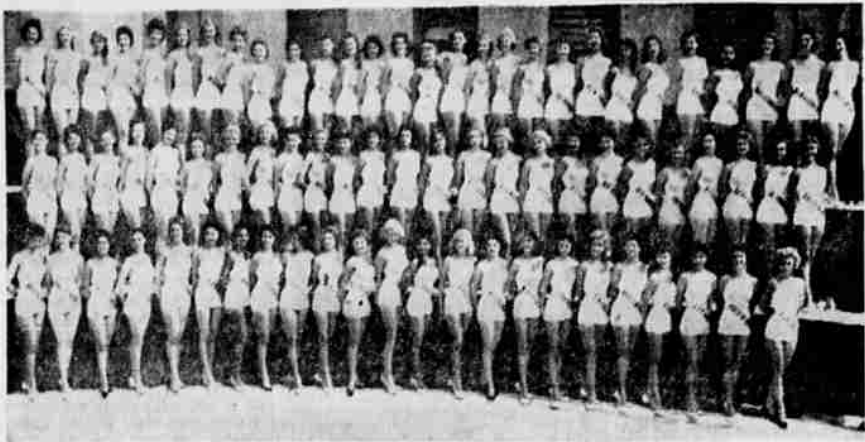

Aged Myrtle Creek Woman Succumbs

Mrs. Brunetta E. (Nettie) Whisenant, 90, died in her home at Myrtle Creek Saturday night. Mrs. Whisenant was born at Hope, Ark., Dec. 24, 1866, and moved to Myrtle Creek 5 1/2 years ago from Glenwood, Ark. She was a member of the Mt. Tabor Methodist Church at Glenwood.

Survivors include five sons, Curtis and Dale, both of Myrtle Creek, Arthur of Boswell, Okla., William of Hot Springs, Ark., and Marion C. of Oakland, Calif.; one daughter, Mrs. Josie Payne of Boswell; 37 grandchildren and numerous great and great-grandchildren.

Her husband preceded her in death. The remains are being shipped to the Davis and Westbrook Funeral Home at Glenwood for services and interment. Ganz Mortuary of Myrtle Creek is in charge of local arrangements.

Pacific Northwest Carloadings Drop

SEATTLE (AP)—The Pacific Northwest Advisory Board reports a drop of 10.2 per cent in Pacific Northwest carloadings in June, compared with a year ago.

For the first six months of 1957, total carloadings were 5.9 per cent under 1956.

The sharpest drops for June were in grain and grain products and in logs. The grain category had 5,877 carloadings, compared with 10,375 in June last year, but the six-month total was up to 46,539 from last year's 40,501.

Log loadings dropped to 21,654 from last June's 27,274. Log carloadings totaled 83,543 for the six months, compared with 96,135 a year ago.

Leeper Funeral Set Here On Wednesday

Funeral services for George William Leeper, 81, a lifelong resident of Oregon who died at a nursing home at Salem Saturday, will be held Wednesday at 2 p.m. in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary.

He was born at Sutherlin Feb. 9, 1876, and later moved to Corvallis before coming to Roseburg about 25 years ago. He was employed at the Roseburg Post Office for many years.

Mr. and Mrs. Leeper moved to Salem about nine months ago after their home on Kane Street burned. He was a charter member of the North Roseburg Church, Evangelical United Brethren, and a member of the Gideon Society.

Surviving are his wife, Lillith, whom he married at Corvallis in 1905, and a daughter, Mrs. Paul (Dorothy) Sike, Salem.

Careless Smoker Sets Brush Fire Near Vale

Driver Escapes Hurts
State police who investigated reported the vehicle was driven by William Paul Ernest Ott of Dillard and that no injuries were suffered. He was alone at the time of the accident.

Wet pavement was involved in another Saturday afternoon two-car crash at the south city limits of Drain.

A small scalp laceration was suffered by Gary Martin Dodd, Yoncalla, driver of one of the cars. A passenger in the other, Lucille L. Braune, Eugene, was taken by ambulance to Drain for treatment for lacerations of the scalp and right eyelid and bruises. Her husband, E. M. Braune, apparently escaped uninjured.

According to the report of state police, Dodd had rounded a curve and had lost control on the wet pavement, skidded into the north bound lane and hit the Braune car head-on.

Citation, Then Wreck
About a half hour after receiving a citation for running a stop sign, Donald Jack Hulce, Drain, "lo-tailed" his 1957 two-door hardtop Saturday evening about 1 1/2 miles north of Drain on Highway 235. He was taken by ambulance to Cottage Grove for treatment for a lacerated nose and possible chest injuries.

Police reported that Hulce was traveling north and had run into a rock bank and turned upside down on the highway. The report also noted that the driver had been cited by a state police officer prior to the accident.

No injuries were reported in a Sunday collision at the junction of Quines Creek Road and Highway 90. According to the accident report filed by state police, a 1949 sedan driven by Charles Everett Wendel, Dundee, had entered the highway when it was struck from behind by a 1954 sedan driven by Ted Owens of Riddle. The Owens car skidded about 67 feet, the report stated.

Driver 14 Years Old
Donald Edward Back, 14, West Myrtlewood, told police he lost control of the 1951 coach he was driving and skidded into a bank on the Happy Valley Road Sunday. The grill and right front fender of the car were smashed. Back told officers he was headed east on the road about 40 miles per hour and lost control on a sharp curve.

Towing a heavily loaded one-wheel trailer, Wanda Merle Hobson, Chico, Calif., lost control and went over the bank about two miles north of Wilbur on Highway 99 Saturday. Her husband, H. B. Hobson, was taken to Mercy Hospital for examination.

'Casey' Jones' Partner Succumbs Of Cancer

MEMPHIS (AP)—Cancer has killed the man who was fireman when Casey Jones, the greatest railroad hero in American folklore, made his fabled final run in the "Cannonball Express."

Simon T. (Sim) Webb, 83, of Jackson, Tenn., died in a hospital Saturday night, 57 years after the Cannonball burst through a stalled freight train on the Illinois Central line near Vaughn, Miss.

Obeying Casey's shouted order "Jump for your life," Webb leaped from the cab of the steam engine. Casey, with brakes locked and a whistle screaming, rode with the locomotive and was killed.

John Ferguson Dies Saturday

John Harold Ferguson, 74, well-known resident of Roseburg and Days Creek, died Saturday at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John Landers, Roberts Creek Road.

He was born at Winnipeg, Canada, Oct. 9, 1882, and came with his parents to Roseburg when he was 5 years old. He was married to Mary Lavina Johnston at North Bend Nov. 11, 1905. She preceded him in death in 1955.

Ferguson operated a delivery service in Roseburg until 1928, when he moved to Days Creek, where he engaged in farming until his retirement. He returned then to Roseburg to make his home.

Surviving are four children, Mrs. Landers, Donald Ferguson, of Tyee, Mrs. Oscar (Jean) Waterman, Grants Pass, and Bruce Ferguson, Canyonville; a sister, Miss Catherine Ferguson, Roseburg; a brother, Archie Ferguson, Days Creek; seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Yesterday, after religious services by various denominations, the Scouts entertained a multitude of relatives and friends. Thousands came from neighboring states.

Scout officials and state police estimated that more than 30,000 toured the camp yesterday.

Curiosity Aroused
As the Scouts approach the area, their curiosity is aroused by the beckoning wand of "Conservo," a giant wooden magician. In the tent, Conservo himself, in the person of one of the staff Scouts, explains the interdependence of soil and water conservation with that of plants and forestry, fish and wildlife.

Then the Scouts are taken on a tour of realistic exhibits where experts in various fields explain the need for conservation and its effect on their daily lives no matter where they may live.

Deer and other wild life are seen in their natural habitat.

The forest rangers conduct one of the most popular exhibits.

Forest fires are "set," sighted and reported by radio from three towers situated some distance apart, tracked and "extinguished."
