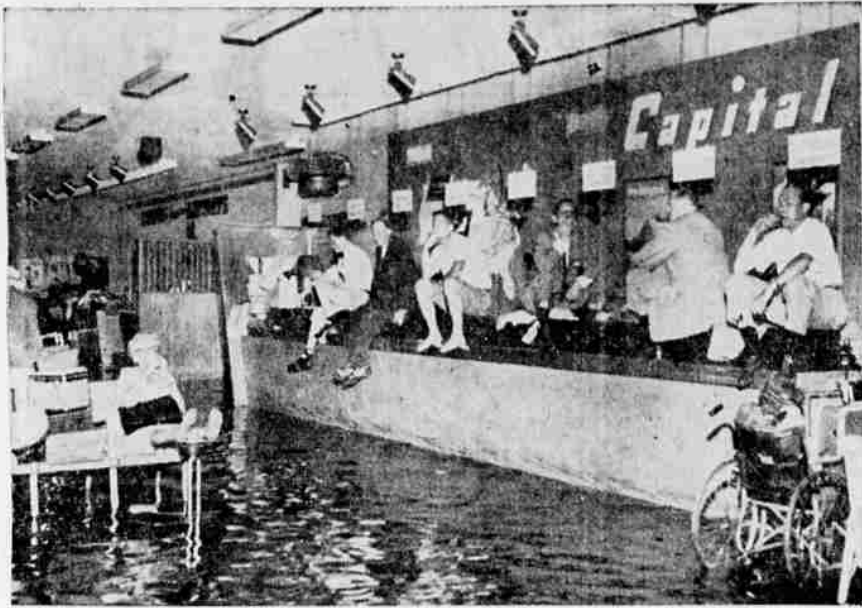




Attorney For 'Clinton 15' Says He Has New Evidence

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Robert L. Dobbs, chief counsel for the "Clinton 15" in the hotly fought civil rights trial here, said today he has uncovered new information that will have "a very sobering effect on this case."

He ran down "a good lead" during the weekend recess in the trial, he said.

"I've located a person with information that will have a very sobering effect on this case," he said.

Defense To Call
The defense will begin calling witnesses after the government's case finishes this week. U. S. Dist. Atty. John C. Crawford Jr. estimates that he will take at least two more days.

Dobbs declined further details about the new witness except to say, "It's someone within the territory of this court."

The case—growing out of riots that broke out when Negro students entered Clinton High School last autumn—is being tried in the U.S. District Court for Eastern Tennessee.

Contempt Charged
The 15 Tennesseans and lanky John Kasper, New Jersey segregationist organizer, are charged with criminal contempt. The government accuses them of "acting in concert" to flout a federal court order against any interference with desegregating the high school. Clinton is a highland town of 4,500 near Knoxville.

Kasper has told reporters he is prepared to sacrifice himself to help the 15 codefendants go free. "I wouldn't mind going to jail for a year or two in order to get them off," he said.

To that, Dobbs retorted, "his very presence in court is prejudicial to us. That's why we wanted a separate trial for the 15."

Defense attorneys contend that segregationists in Tennessee and all over the South have been hurt by Kasper's actions.

GET MORE PAY

OTTAWA (AP)—Canada is increasing the pay of her armed forces by 30 million dollars a year retroactive to last May 1.

Defense Minister Randolph Peakes announced the increase Monday. Affecting 117,000 members of the regular forces and about 30,000 reservists, it places heavy emphasis on trade skills.

A boost in trades pay of 20 per cent has been granted in addition to a rise in basic pay averaging about 6 per cent.

HIGH AND DRY—Passengers at Midway Airport, Chicago, seek dry perch atop counter as water entered terminal after a six-inch deluge flooded the city and surrounding area. The most intense rainstorm in Chicago's history left sections of the nation's second largest city flooded, partially crippled and periled by threats of fire and more rain. At least nine persons were dead, by drowning or electrocution when they touched electrical fixtures in their flooded basements. Unofficial estimates of damage ran into the millions.

Torrential Rains Threaten Several Areas Of Illinois

CHICAGO (AP)—Floods threatened some areas in downstate Illinois and Chicago suburbs today in the wake of torrential rains over the weekend.

The heavy rains which struck the Chicago area Friday night and Saturday morning and spread into central and south central sections of the state sent many streams to near flood stage.

AT Flood Stage

The Illinois River was at flood stage at Ottawa, a city of 19,000 some 85 miles southwest of Chicago where the flow was backed up by a 600-foot dam. Starved Rock State Park on the bank of the Illinois River was ordered closed.

The runoff from Chicago's record 6 1/2-inch rainfall, which caused millions of dollars damage to property, sent the Little Calumet River spilling over dikes and forced some 200 families from their homes in the Highland, Ind., and Calumet City, Ill., area. However danger of further flooding appeared easing, as the river started to recede last night.

Heavy rain fell in areas between Springfield and St. Louis yesterday, with nearly 6 inches at Vandalia. Minor flooding was reported along parts of the Kaskaskia River.

Nine Deaths Noted

Nine deaths were attributed to the storm in Chicago. Although water in the metropolitan area still caused some hardship and inconveniences, most of Chicago and nearby communities had finished cleanup jobs.

Rail, air and bus traffic was reported about normal. Telephone service also was near normal. Some 33,000 telephones were knocked out by the storm.

Segments of several roads in the Chicago area remained closed. Most of the several hundred families forced from their homes in low areas in Joliet, Kankakee and Chicago suburbs returned to their dank houses.

THREATEN STRIKE

COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)—Union employees at the Ohio Match Co. mill here have voted 252 to 37 in favor of a strike to back up contract demands, the International Woodworkers union said Saturday.

"The crew will meet Tuesday to decide when the strike will go into effect," said Howard Roe, business agent of the union local here.
