Dodgers To Remain In Brooklyn, Story Says

NEW YORK (AP)—The Dodgers are going to get their new stadium in Flatbush and remain in Brooklyn, the World-Telegram and Sun said it learned Monday.
 In a front page story, the paper said the Brooklyn Sports Authority will urge at the Board of Estimate's July 25 meeting that immediate approval be given the ball park project.
 Walter O'Malley, president of the Dodgers, who repeatedly has said he would keep his National League club in Brooklyn if he could acquire the desired site for a stadium, declined comment on the World-Telegram and Sun story.

The usually light-hitting Phils hit five home runs and beat St. Louis twice 6-2 and 11-4. Von McDaniel, the 18-year-old \$50,000 bonus baby, suffered his first major league defeat in the opener and Larry Jackson, the Cards' top winner, lost the second.
