The business agent for the local, Ed Mattox, said the drivers were seeking a 19-cent hourly pay increase and fringe benefits. The seven distributors offered a 12½-cent increase, he said.

Drivers now receive \$2.50 an hour.

Another local scheduled talks Tuesday with Georgia Pacific Corp. Georgia-Pacific has offered a five-cent hourly wage increase.

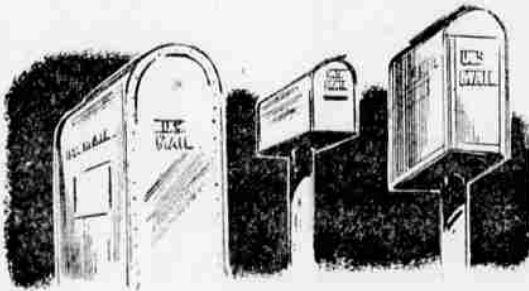
Supt. Deller To Attend Eugene School Meeting

Principal At Clinton Relates Tale Of Threats, Tension

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A jury heard a story Monday of threats, tension and terror after Negro students were admitted to the high school in the little Tennessee highland town of Clinton last fall.

"We had more concentrated internal trouble than at any other period of the year," David J. Brittain, 41, principal of the school, testified in federal court. "Why did you close the school on Dec. 4?" asked U. S. Dist. Atty. John C. Crawford Jr.

Rise Shooting

The battery of defense lawyers rose as a man shouting objections. They were overruled and Brittain replied:

"There had been so many actions, and the tension was so great I figured that was the safest policy."

Prior to Brittain's appearance on the witness stand, U. S. Dist. Judge Robert L. Taylor dismissed charges of criminal contempt against Mrs. Zella Lou Nelson, 19. She is expecting a child in September and the court agreed on a statement about her condition sent by a Clinton physician.

Mrs. Nelson was one of 15 Clinton area residents on trial along

with Northern segregationist John Kasper for alleged criminal contempt of court. They are accused of violating a federal injunction banning interference with court-ordered integration of the Clinton high school.

Courtroom Packed

Brittain, a thin-faced intense man testified in a low even voice. The courtroom again was packed. Many Negroes were among the spectators.

It was deathly quiet as Brittain told what happened last fall when school opened.

"Teachers, students—white and colored—were threatened," Brittain began. The defense objected again.

Brittain said attendance in the school dropped from about 800 at the beginning of the term to "260-odd." He said people told him they were receiving threatening telephone calls. After more defense objections, Taylor again told the jury the testimony would be pertinent only if it linked Kasper and the others.

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
