The Giants defeated the Cubs 5-3.
Just one game was scheduled in the American League and the Washington Senators walloped Kansas City 10-3.

World High Jump Mark Set By Russian

LONDON (AP) — Yuri Stepanov of Russia, bettered the world high jump record with a leap of 2.16 meters (7 feet, 1 inch), Moscow Radio reported.
Stepanov's leap bettered the world mark of 2.15 meters (7 feet, 1/2 inch) set on June 29, 1956, by Charley Dumas of Los Angeles.
The Soviet athlete now becomes the second man in history to clear the high jumper's dream goal of seven feet.
The Moscow broadcast said Stepanov, a Leningrad athlete, made his jump during a track and field meet Saturday held by athletes from Helsinki and Leningrad in the Russian city.

Majors' MVP And Year's Rookie Awards' Candidates Considered

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball's election day will be held shortly after the close of the season and the balloting will result in the awards for the major leagues' Most Valuable Players and the Rookies of the Year.
With the campaign just a shade more than half gone, let's take a look at the likely candidates for each accolade.
Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees and Hank Aaron of Milwaukee, the current batting leaders, are almost certain to be considered for the MVP. Aaron is leading the National League in home runs and runs batted in while Mantle tops the American in homers.
Stan Musial of St. Louis, runner-up to Aaron in the batting race, also figures to be up high in the voting. So, probably, will Alvin Dark, a .295 batter and the Cardinals' sparkplug. Also Don Hoak, a big surfer for Cincinnati with 35 runs batted in and a .294 batting mark; George Crowe, another Redleg, who has filled in brilliantly for the ailing Ted Kluszewski; and Brooklyn's Gino Cimoli, who has continued to hit well while several of the Dodgers' stars have been slumping.
Mantle's competition likely will come from Billy Pierce, a 12-record game winner for the Chicago White Sox; Ted Williams of Boston,

ton, who is second in the batting derby with a .348 mark; Bill Skowron and Gil McDougald of the Yankees; Washington's Roy Sievers, a consistent batter all year, and George Zaverink, Baltimore's fine reliever.
The top rookies at this time are Jack Sanford of the Philadelphia Phillies and Frank Malzone of the Boston Red Sox. Sanford has won 11 games and dropped two and he also is the National League's strikeout leader with 101. Malzone is fifth in the American League in batting with .325 and fourth in runs batted in with 56.
Other competent first year men are Ed Bouchee of the Phillies (.270 and 47 RBIs); Von McDaniel of St. Louis (.40 as a pitcher); Dick Drott of the Chicago Cubs (.87 with 30 strikeouts); Tony Kubek of the Yanks (.301 in 54 games) and Eddie Kasko of the Cards.

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Ball Park Survey Talk 'Premature'
NEW YORK (AP) — "Premature" was the word Tuesday for a report that an engineering survey has found the construction of a new ball park to keep the Dodgers in Brooklyn "practical" from the city's standpoint.
The story was published Monday by The World-Telegram and Sun, which added that the three-man Brooklyn Sports Authority will urge immediate approval of the project at the next meeting of the Board of Estimate July 25.
Mayor Wagner, however, said he knew nothing about the report, and had "no idea" what the engineering firm would recommend.
Walter O'Malley, Dodger president, said he "would prefer to wait for the actual report before making any comment."
And a spokesman for the engineering firm making the survey commented: "The story is premature. Our report will be ready in three weeks."
The only positive statement on the report came from Kenneth Hahn, Los Angeles County supervisor who had led the drive to bring the Dodgers to the West Coast. "I seriously doubt that story," he said. "I talked to O'Malley and he told me, 'Ken, get all the arrangements ready.'"

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
