The gunslingers were using cap pistols and shot against the stop watch and not each other.

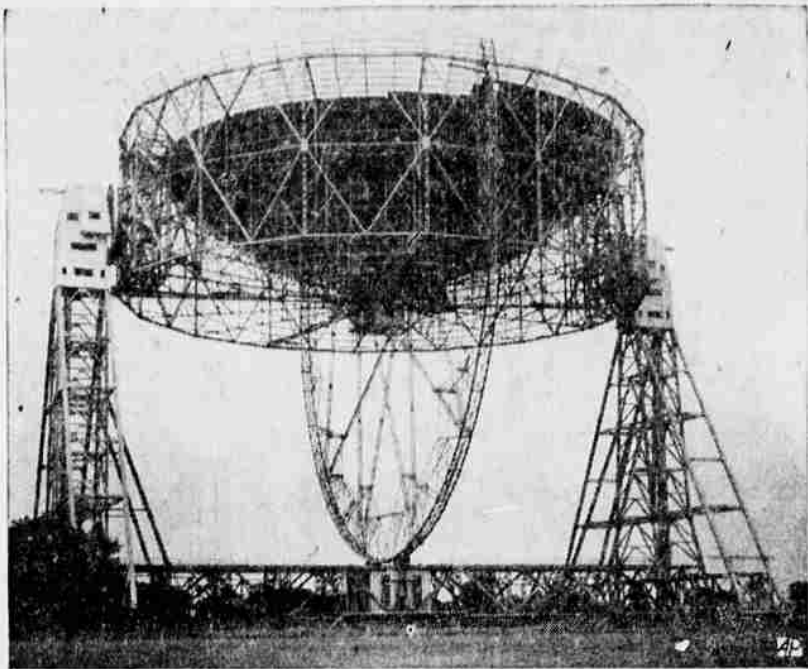
Reust, the winner, is 10 years old.

1,800 Carpenters To Go On Strike

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP)—Eighteen hundred carpenters union members go on strike in southern Idaho Wednesday morning, an official of the Rocky Mountain District Council of Carpenters announced Monday.

Virgil Tullis, council executive secretary, said the strike would be general, starting at 8 a.m., except for the Boise local, some maintenance workers at the Atomic Energy Commission's National Reactor Testing Station and some other minor exceptions.

Tullis said the strike is for higher wages. The union, he said, originally asked \$3 per hour, plus health and welfare benefits.

Contractors offered a pay increase of 45 cent per hour, spread over a 22-month period. The present pay scale is \$2.65 per hour.

Tullis said the dispute is in the hands of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, but there are no further negotiation meetings scheduled.

The strike will cover all of Idaho south of Elk City. Tullis said the heaviest concentration of men affected is in the Pocatello-Idaho Falls reactor station area of eastern Idaho. Included will be workers on Idaho Power Co.'s Brownlee Dam project.

An AEC official said there was no major construction work under way here.

Tennessee Editor Cited For Courage

CARBONDALE, Ill. (AP)—Horace V. Wells Jr., editor of the Clinton (Tenn.) Courier-News, received the 1957 Elijah P. Lovejoy award for courage in journalism Monday.

Wells accepted the award, a bronze plaque honoring an Alton (Ill.) abolitionist editor killed by a mob in 1837, at a third national conference of weekly newspaper editors, sponsored by Southern Illinois University's journalism department.

Dr. Howard Long, department chairman, said Wells devoted himself to the principals of law and order while "subjected to the scorn and abuse of a large element of his community."

Clinton was the center last year of a Negro-white clash over school integration. Some 600 Tennessee National Guardsmen finally moved in and restored order.

Marijuana Cigarettes Bring Fine, Sentence

EUGENE (AP)—Rock 'n' roll musician Edward James Silvers Jr., 29, of the Fats Domino band, was given a six-month suspended jail sentence and a \$250 fine Monday when he pleaded guilty in Lane Circuit Court to illegal possession of a narcotic drug.

Silvers, of Kansas City, Mo., was arrested last Wednesday after a deputy sheriff in plain clothes said he had purchased some marijuana cigarettes from Silvers with marked money. The musician had played for a dance here the previous night with Fats Domino's band.

The district attorney's office said a charge of selling narcotics is still pending against Silvers, but he is being permitted to rejoin the Domino band, at Seattle.
