Glendale School Board Hires Staff Personnel

Two new teachers to complete the Glendale school staff were accepted by the school board Wednesday night.

Eighteen non-teaching positions were also filled, leaving one job still open, according to correspondent Mrs. Gerald B. Fox.

New office personnel for next year are Alice Nebel, Mrs. Phyllis Booth, and Mrs. Vera Kemp. Maintenance workers will be Peril Winkelman, Bud Reynolds, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Clark, W. R. Stevenson, and Pete Smith. Drivers will be Walt Winkelman, C. Clark, Gerald Brady, Claude Humphreys, and Pete Smith. Cooks will be Mrs. Margaret Hill, Stella Burke, Mrs. Betty Brady, and Mrs. Mary Harris.

One more cook will be hired to assist in the high school from 10:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

The board meeting schedule was set for the first and third Wednesdays of each month starting in August. The next meeting will be July 24.

The board accepted bids on a boiler to be installed in the elementary school by Harris Plumbing and Heating Co., Roseburg, and for painting the superintendent's house by Lloyd Grantham. The board also authorized level-

ing and grading behind the high school, purchase of a stove for the elementary school cafeteria, work to be done on the interior of the superintendent's house, and installation of water spouts at the high school.

School will start on Sept. 4 this year, it was decided.

According to Marlen Yoder, Glendale school superintendent, employees of the Murphy Construction Co. of Roseburg, who have the repair contract, found it necessary to tear out 32 feet of flooring, joists and underlayment of the oldest of the two wooden elementary buildings for repairing the wood rot condition. The building has been jacked up and drain ditches have been dug to put in drainage tile around the wooden buildings.

Marlen Yoder has taken over his official duties as school superintendent and will move into the superintendent's home at 346 Montgomery Ave. July 21. At the school office he can be reached from 9 to 11:30 a.m.

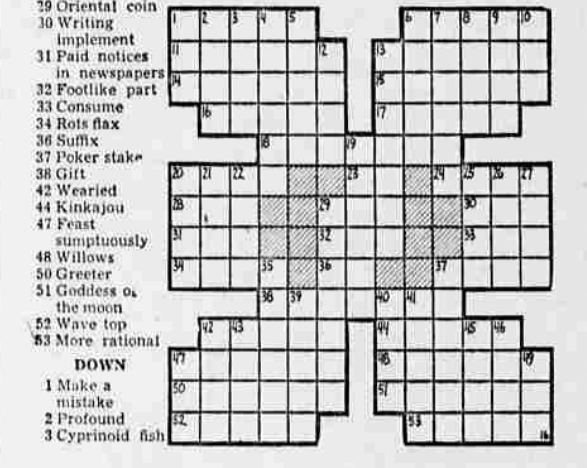
