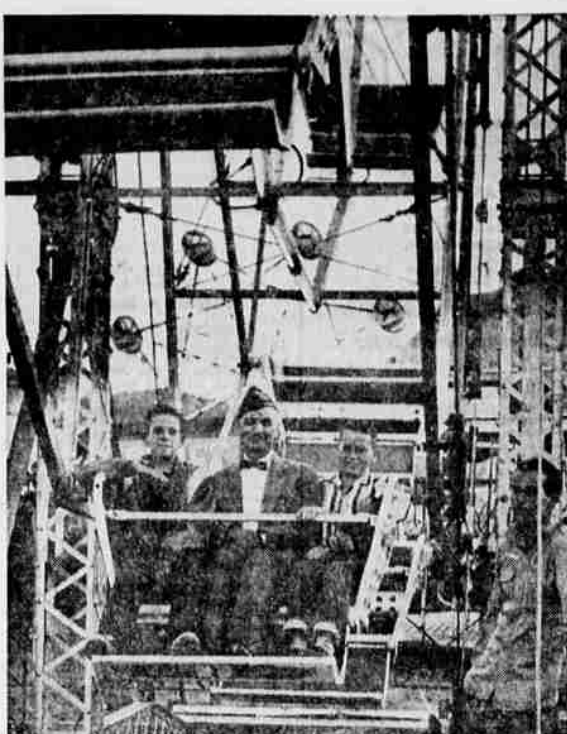

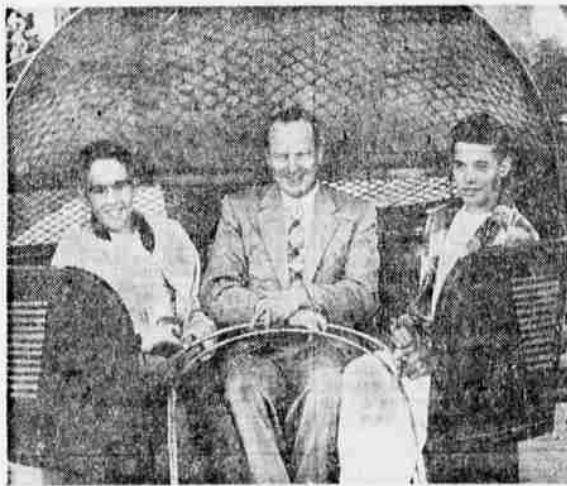

Work On New Oakland Church Progressing

Work is progressing on the new Oakland Community Presbyterian Church, with the roof being put on over the sanctuary.

The plastic roofing will be installed later, with the only lighting in the sanctuary coming from the outside except for a window near the pulpit. DIES IN FALL

COOS BAY — The Coos County coroner's office said Tuesday that Maurice J. Peck, 54, of Bangor, Ore., apparently died of injuries suffered in a fall.

Peck was treated for scalp lacerations at a hospital after he was found unconscious on a street. He was released from the hospital, but died several hours later.

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Manslaughter Charge Faces Truck Driver

DUNSMUIR, Calif. — Manslaughter charges were filed Tuesday against Bud Knichlow, driver of a runaway truck which roared down this city's main street and fatally injured two men.

Police Chief Lee Clark filed the charges in the justice court.

A meeting Monday of city, state and federal officials decided the Interstate Commerce Commission was the quickest answer to the city's runaway truck problem.

Angry Dunsmuir citizens have been clamoring for measures to halt the danger of uncontrolled trucks on the city's main street.

Three runaways in 10 days have shot down the mountain city's steep, narrow thoroughfare, the most recent that driven by Knichlow.

The City Council tentatively agreed to request ICC authority to stop and inspect trucks before they enter the long Highway 99 grade leading into the north side of Dunsmuir.

J. J. Murray, highway patrol inspector, pointed out patrolmen's authority is limited to ticketing and warning the trucks. But the ICC has the power to hold up any truck with faulty brakes, he said.

PLANE MISSING

TAIPEI — An intensive air, sea and ground search today failed to turn up any trace of a U. S. Air Force C-47 missing with 16 persons aboard, all military personnel.

Radio contact with the plane was broken Tuesday night as it neared the end of a journey to Taipei from Clark Field, in the Philippines.

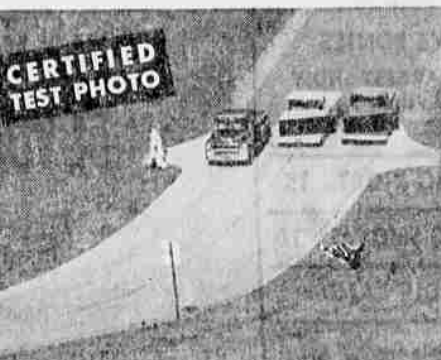
