Name Of Ex-Pennsylvania Figure Finally Corrected

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — History is spelling Aaron Dunkel's name right now, but it took 67 years to turn the trick.

Dunkel was Pennsylvania's secretary of internal affairs from 1870 to 1883 and he was twice a state senator.

Yet five years after he quit public office Snell's Legislative Handbook, forerunner to the Pennsylvania Manual, supposedly the last word on the state's affairs, started to spell the name "Dunkle."

The error persisted. It was compounded when a portrait of the man was hung in the capitol and the nameplate bore the same misspelling.

Not until the new edition of the manual came out recently was the mistake corrected officially.
