

# Hurricane Would Give Patterson 'Beating Of His Life' -- He Says

COLUMBIA, N.J. (AP)—Hurricane Jackson says he wants to give Floyd Patterson "the beating of his life" July 29. The world heavyweight title is only an incidental factor.

"If I win it I'd like to give it back to him the same night," said Hurricane in discussing their championship match at New York's Polo Grounds.

Of course, Jackson will do nothing of the kind. Even if he still felt that way, his manager, Lippe Breitbard, and his mom would see to that.

"I'm gonna be much harder this time," said the Hurricane. "I'm gonna fight him harder. Last time I cried like a baby before I got in the ring because he was my friend. He's no friend no more."

What happened?

"Just one of those things," Jackson was anxious to discuss their first match last year, won on a split decision by Patterson who moved on to win the title by knocking out Archie Moore.

"I won it," said Jackson, his eyes flashing. "The referee (Harry Kessler) was the closest of all and he thought I won it. I tell you one thing, if they gave me that fight, he (Patterson) wouldn't fight me no more."

How does Hurricane plan to handle Patterson this time?

"Nobody knows. Not even my trainer. I never talk about a fight. I'm not the talking type. I'm just the fighting type. I'll cut his wind. That's what I'll do. I'll cut it short."

GREENWOOD LAKE, N.Y. (AP)—"What makes Hurricane Jackson the toughest contender around is that you can never tell what he's going to do," said heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson Thursday.

"And how can you tell what he's going to do when he doesn't know himself," chimed in manager Gus D'Amato.

The manager and his protegee were sizing up Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson, the eccentric, tireless, rock-jawed challenger who meets Patterson in a 15-round title fight at the Polo Grounds July 29.

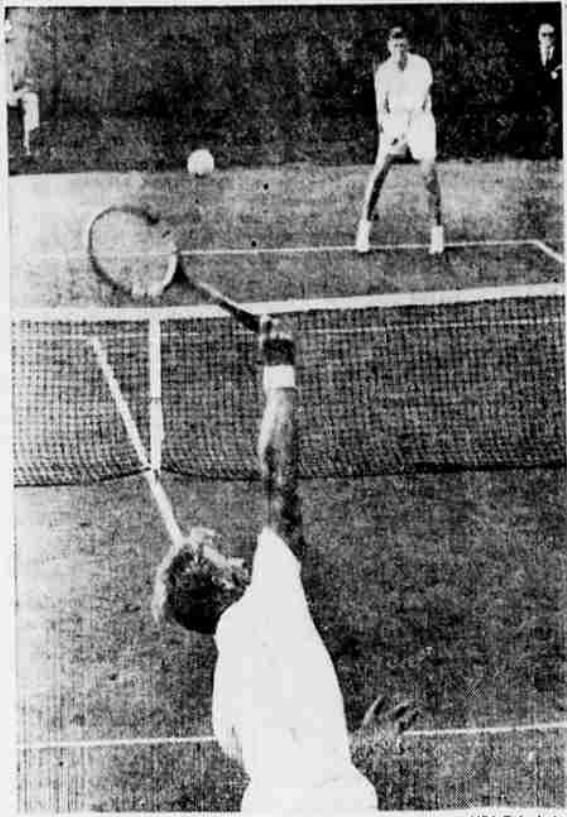

### Open Tennis Tourny Sought By Ellsworth

DAYTON, Ohio (AP)—Ellsworth Vines, the one time tennis great who turned golf pro, thinks an open tennis tournament would help the United States win back and keep the Davis Cup.

"Now, as soon as we can develop a topflight player capable of winning back the Davis Cup, Jack Kramer grabs him off for the pros," the tall, bespectacled Los Angeles athlete said Wednesday.

"If we had open tennis our best amateurs would be thrown against the pros. Chances are they'd lose. So it would be hard to develop an amateur name worth \$75,000 or \$100,000 to Kramer."

"The benefit would be two-fold. Players would remain amateur longer, at least until they gained stature enough to beat the best pros. And they'd have the benefit of constant competition against the pros. Our Davis Cup teams would have to improve."

Vines said he felt an open tennis tournament was inevitable.

## Americans Living Through World's Worst Weather

SEATTLE (AP)—Eighteen Americans have been isolated since Feb. 10 on the bleak, wind-swept, bitterly cold ice cap one half mile from the South Pole.

Already, they have lived through some of the coldest weather in the world.

On MAY 11 it got down to 100 below zero. The next day it was 97 below.

**It's Pitch Black**

It's pitch black around the clock, except for times when skies are clear and moonlight relieves the Stygian darkness. The wind blows almost constantly, averaging about 23 miles an hour. New snow falls about every third day. No plane will visit them until early November because of the deep winter blackness and severe weather. The last plane to land at the pole was Feb. 10.

This account of life 9,000 miles away was carried by The Seattle Post-Intelligencer this week, after a short-wave radio interview through station WTBA operated by Seattle "ham" Loyd Peck.

Most of the information came from Ed Flowers of Kensington, Md., head meteorologist and second-in-command under Dr. Paul Siple, chief scientist at the International Geophysical Year station.

**Nine Are Civilians**

Nine of the men at the South Pole are civilians.

The other nine are in the U.S. Navy, including Earl Johnson, 22, a Seabee who has relatives at Yakima, Wash.

But in spite of the hardships, life at the pole is not too difficult, Flowers said.

The food and coffee ("We drink tons of it") are good, the men are able to go outside for two or three hours a day when it is not storming, and the station is so well laid out with snow bars.
