

Local Steelhead Migration Falls Below Former Counts

The run of fish over the counting board at the Winchester station continues to fall below the pace set in recent years in all categories of migratory fish. About half of the total summer steelhead run to date at the Winchester counting station has been recorded over the past two weeks. Figures released by the Roseburg office of the Oregon State Game Commission show that 353 summer steelhead crossed the counting board during the first two weeks of July.

In another overtime game, Seattle tallied a run in the 11th inning to nose out Sacramento 4-3. The loss kept the Solons only four uneasy percentage points from the league cellar.

At San Diego, the Hollywood Stars came from behind with four runs in the ninth and downed the Padres 9-6.

Vancouver topped Los Angeles 4-3 despite homers by the Angels' Steve Bilko and Bert Hamric in the first inning.

Homer Starts Rally
San Francisco first sacker Frank Kellert homered in the 10th and uncorked the five-run rally against Portland, Portland's sixth pitcher of the night, Dick Fiedler, just couldn't hold the Seals down.
