Clinton Case Lawyers Set

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Opposing lawyers in the Clinton segregation trial are working today on final arguments to present to the all-white jury Monday morning. Their closing statements may hold far more importance in this case than in the usual lawsuit, for two reasons: 1. Tremendous national issues are inherent in the suit. On trial are 19 men and one woman accused of conspiring to keep Negro students out of Clinton High School last fall. 2. Beyond the guilt or innocence of the 11 people are the great issues of enforcing the Supreme Court ruling that public schools should be desegregated "with all possible speed," the "social revolution" in the United States, as a southern defense lawyer put it, and the possible effect of this case on future civil rights suits. The defense is setting out to show that the U. S. government failed to prove its charges of conspiracy. In a daring maneuver, the southern attorneys put only six witnesses on the stand. They say they had 40 or 50 more. But they believed the very fact that they presented so little testimony to rebut the government's witnesses will help convince the jury no case exists to convict the 10 Tennesseeans and dark-haired John Kasper, northern segregationist organizer.

Bush, Portland, chief of staff; Dr. W. E. Buchanan, Eugene, legislative committee chairman. A. V. Wallis of Grants Pass was re-elected historian. The organization said it will select at some future date the site of its 1958 meeting.

Vladivostok Closed By Soviet Saturday

LONDON — The Soviet Union Saturday closed Vladivostok Bay to navigation by foreign ships and airplanes. The bay lies around and to the south of the city of Vladivostok, the U.S.S.R.'s big far eastern port. A broadcast by Moscow Radio said: "Navigation by foreign ships and foreign planes in the area of the bay can take place only with permission of Soviet authorities, with the exception of cases of foreign ships entering or leaving the port of Nakoda." Nakoda is a smaller port about 50 miles southeast of Vladivostok. The decision to close the bay to foreign ships and planes was taken by the Soviet council ministers, the broadcast said. First reaction of some Western students of Soviet affairs to the closing of the bay was that it was a military-political decision rather than one initiated by the Russian ministry of fisheries. The westernmost tip of the demarcation line lies just north of the northeasternmost tip of North Korea.

Hoffa, Acquitted, Stands Big Chance Of Replacing Beck

WASHINGTON — James R. Hoffa emerged today from his bribery charge acquittal in a strong position to take over from Dave Beck as boss of the 1 1/2 million member Teamsters Union. A federal court jury cleared Hoffa yesterday of charges he conspired and bribed to plant a spy on the staff of the Senate Rackets Investigating Committee. Hoffa, 44-year-old Midwest Teamsters boss, immediately announced he would get together with friends in Chicago within the next few days to decide on "my future activities in the union." At present, there is little doubt in the labor movement that Hoffa can take over Beck's spot if he wants it, or name who he wants as Teamsters president. Hoffa flew to Detroit last night. In response to a question there, he said he financed his trial defense entirely from his own funds, and that he had declined offers by several locals to raise a defense fund for him. He said he had mortgaged his home, cottage and automobile. Members of the senate committee, headed by Sen. McClellan (D-Ark.), were plainly disappointed with the trial outcome. The vice chairman, Sen. Verdes (R-N.Y.), said he felt the verdict was "a miscarriage of justice."

House Okays Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower seemed likely today to get a foreign aid authorization bill more to his liking than the \$3,116,833,000 measure passed by the House. The House passed Eisenhower's bill last night with \$727,800,000 lopped from the President's original request. And it knocked out just about all of the bill's long-term aid features which marked a new approach to overseas assistance program this year. Rollcall Vote Made Final House vote on a 254-154 rollcall vote eliminated a day-long series of votes which found the bill's supporters on the defensive most of the time. The measure now is slated for adjustment with a Senate-passed bill closer to the President's request. The Senate authorized a half billion dollars more than the House and approved some of the long-range authority Eisenhower wanted. Since the usual practice is to compromise somewhere between the extremes of differing House and Senate bills, the conferees are expected to come up with a measure providing more money than the House version.

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Judge Postpones Decision On Parent's Right To Visit From His 5-Year-Old Son

The decision of whether a man, who said he has only seen his son once in over four years, could take the boy away from his home for a visit was postponed in the circuit court of Judge Charles Woodruff Friday pending study of the power of the court in the case. The judge said that he is disposed to refuse the request by Peter C. Miller of Tacoma, Wash., for a writ of habeas corpus on his son by a former marriage if it is within the legal power of the court to do so. In a 1953 Washington divorce decree, Miller was granted the right to take the child, Randolph, for a two-week visit each summer after his fifth birthday. The boy was 5-years-old on July 15. Separated Miller and his former wife, now Myrtle Maxine Tate, were separated when the child was about three months old. They later divorced and both have since remarried. Mrs. Tate and her husband, Charles G. Tate, live in Sutherland. Miller said that his being crippled and hospitalized since the divorce used up his sick leave and prevented him from visiting the child. The judge commented Miller for keeping up support payments amounting to \$3,160 for the child, but gave an opinion that it was the father's duty to get to know the child before taking him away and that the court was opposed to split custody of children in divorce cases. He gave the attorneys 10 days to file briefs on the power of the court to disregard the Washington divorce decree provisions. The plaintiff has another 10 days to file an answer. The judge also denied a petition by the Tates to adopt the boy. He said that while it would be in the best interests of the boy it was unfair to the father to cut him off from the boy completely.

Governor's Proclamation Closes Ten Douglas Areas

Ten Douglas Forest Protective Assn. township areas have been closed to entrance by a proclamation of Gov. Robert D. Holmes, Wayne Miller, DFPA dispatcher, reports. The areas are not closed to logging operations, but persons must get permits to enter the logging area, Miller stressed. Permits are issued by foresters or fire wardens. The closure goes into effect July 24 and remains in effect until Dec. 31. No Smoking Permits require the entrant to refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe, to build no open fires except in places designated as safe, and to have as equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools specified by the forester as suitable for extinguishing fires. Permits can be obtained at the following places: DFPA headquarters in Roseburg, Tye Guard Station and Henry Tiller residence on Hubbard Creek. Areas Closed The areas closed are: Township 22 south, southwest of Elktion; Township 23 south, west of Elktion; Township 24 south, southwest of Elktion; Township 25 south, west of Tye, and part of section 19 in the same area. Township 26 south, range 7 west, that portion of township lying west of the divide between the Umpqua River and Hubbard Creek watershed; Township 26 south, west of Umpqua; Township 27 south, range 7 west, that part of township lying in Hubbard Creek watershed; Township 27 south, west of Cleveland, all of township with the exception of the southeast corner of sec. 36; Township 28 south, southwest of Elgiora.

Dulles Plans Speech Soon

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles plans a nationwide radio-television speech Monday night to detail the U.S. position on disarmament—a subject of heavy Russian criticism recently. State Department sources said one purpose of the "comprehensive statement" would be to offset Soviet attacks on U.S. proposals at the London disarmament talks. The department said Dulles would speak for 30 minutes over nationwide radio and television (ABC), beginning at 5 p.m. PST. It was reported the secretary does not think the London conference is about to break up, but that the department is concerned about the heavy Russian propaganda assault on U.S. proposals. These attacks, it was believed here, might be part of a plan to blame the United States should the talks break down. Represented at London, besides the United States and Russia, are Britain, France and Canada. The talks are recessed for the weekend, but will be resumed Monday.

Pius Composes Prayer For 'Church Of Silence'

VATICAN CITY — Pope Pius XII has composed a prayer asking Jesus to strengthen "our brothers of the church of silence"—the name the pontiff has given to the Roman Catholic Church in communist countries. Directed to Jesus, "king of martyrs and comfort of the afflicted," the prayer asks that Roman Catholics in communist countries be strengthened so that they will "never become faint in the battle" and that they may experience consolation in their trials. It concludes with a plea that communist oppressors of the church may be converted. "Grant, O Lord," it says, "that the days of trial will be shortened so that very soon all—with the oppressors converted—may freely serve and adore you." The prayer was published this week by the Vatican's L'Osservatore Romano.
