The favored "big three"—Milwaukee, Brooklyn and Cincinnati—are on the move and this could be the beginning of the end for the pretenders among the contenders in the hot National League pennant chase.

Milwaukee's first-place Braves, crippled and hampered, have found ways to win even without hitting Hank Aaron and slugging Joe Adcock. Brooklyn's defending champs have become the hottest team in the league, with Duke Snider back, jumping from fifth to second.

And Cincinnati has quit fifth to move within one percentage point of third place St. Louis.

The Philadelphia Phillies, meanwhile have collapsed with four defeats in a row and now are fifth again. St. Louis' Cardinals have blown a three-game lead and now are third, two games behind.

Roots Youth
The Braves made it four in a row last night, beating the New York Giants 3-1 as old-timer Andy Pafko smacked two home runs and cracked open a tie ball game with a two-run belt in the ninth.

Brooklyn moved up by beating Chicago's last-place Cubs twice, 6-3 in 10 innings and 5-3 for the Dodgers' first doubleheader sweep of the season. Pittsburgh routed St. Louis and the Cards' young sensation, Von McDaniel, 7-0. Cincinnati clobbered the Phils and 12-game winner Jack Sanford 7-2.

The American League race, already draped with crepe, showed the New York Yankees with a six-game haul after whipping Cleveland 9-1 as Boston disposed of the second-place Chicago White Sox 5-2. Detroit defeated Washington 4-1 and Baltimore beat Kansas City 4-2.

Gene Conley won his third in a row with a seven-hitter as the Braves finally beat ex-mate Johnny Antonelli. The southpaw had blanked the Braves on three singles after Pafko's second-inning home run until Andy parked one following a walk in the ninth. Conley is 3-4; Antonelli 9-3.

The Braves are 7-3 since the All-Star game, the Dodgers are 8-1.

Snider Slugs Two
Duke Snider homered in both games for the Brooks last night, for seven in nine games. His 22nd hit opened the 3-1 in the 10th before rookie John Roseboro bagged it with a three-run homer.

Reliever Clem Labine won it for a 4-5 record after losing five in a row. The Cubs had only four hits in the opener, but three were homers—two by Lee Walls.

A pinch slug by Randy Jackson broke a 3-1 tie in the nightcap sixth, giving Sam Maglie a 4-2 record.

Pittsburgh swung for nine hits off McDaniel, who lost his second in a row for a 4-2 record, in 5 1/2 innings as the Cards lost their seventh in the last nine. Vern Law walked none and scattered nine singles for his sixth victory. Ex-card Bill Virdon had three hits.

Sanford, who has lost three, two to the Redjacks, was smacked for 11 of his 15 hits—all singles except for George Crowe's 21st home run with a man on. Joe Nuxhall won his fourth.

A bases loaded balk by Don Mossi helped the Yankees to a 2-0 lead in the first inning, and they really got away in a five-run seventh as Bill Skowron hit a three-run homer.

Batteries averaged in the Roseburg camp boomed during the past two weeks as six players are now over the .300 mark. Last week there were only two players above the .300 mark, but a field day against Eugene and two games with Prineville boosted almost everybody's averages.

Leading the parade is Bill Eswine with an even .400 average on eight hits in 20 times to the plate. Larry Bissonnette is the second top man and tops for the regulars with a nifty .367 average on 25 hits in 68 times to the plate. Ted Bruno, state racing commission chairman, is attempting to mediate the dispute.

World Mile Mark Lowered To 3:57.2 By Englishman

LONDON — A laughing Yorkshire lad who runs for the joy of it has set the athletic world wondering today just how fast a man can run a mile.

Derek Ibbotson of Britain, a 24-year-old paint salesman, last night shattered John Landy's 1954 world mark of 3:58 with a majestic 3:57.2 clocking at the White City Stadium.

He won what must be regarded as the greatest mile race ever run. The first four finishers bettered four minutes and the fifth man was timed in 4:00.6. It marked the 15th time that the 4-minute mark has been broken.

Ron Delaney of Ireland finished second last night. The Czech 1,500-meter world record breaker, Stanislav Jungwirth, finished third in 3:59.1. Ken Wood of Britain came home fourth in 3:59.3. Poland's Stefan Lewandowski was fifth in 4:00.6.

Broken Again
In Stockholm last night, Dan Waern of Sweden ran the classic distance in 3:59.3 and said he felt he could do better.

Ibbotson finished roaring home 10 or so yards ahead of Delaney. Ibbotson's last quarter was run in about 57 seconds.

What made the race slightly wild in tactics was the presence of a small British runner named Michael Blagrove. This miler carried the field through the first quarter in an unbelievable 55.3 seconds and the half mile in an incredible 1:55.8.

The field wasn't even stretched out at the half mile. But the scorching early pace forced a slow third quarter. Jungwirth reached the start of the final lap in 3 minutes flat.

Ibbotson said he believed he might have done 3:55 if it hadn't been for the hot early pace. Ibbotson waited for the last 300 yards to make his move. He accelerated and left the front runner, Jungwirth, a sitting duck for Delaney to pass.
