This came not too long after the disclosure that Miss U.S.A. was very much a missus, working on her second marriage, in fact, and was a mother of two—violating another entry rule that contestants must be unmarried.

Sheppard Will Not Get Detector Test

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Ohio Gov. C. William O'Neill said Monday Dr. Sam Sheppard will not receive a lie detector test until the "confession" of a Florida prisoner that he killed the doctor's wife is determined to be true.

The governor announced his position after a telegram from the unofficial "Court of Last Resort," headed by mystery writer Erle Stanley Gardner, cast doubt upon the validity of a confession by Donald Wedler.

MAY RECOGNIZE DAMASCUS, Syria — Prime Minister Sabri Assali declared Monday Syria will recognize Communist East Germany if West Germany and Israel establish diplomatic relations.

GROUP PROTESTS BERLIN — Hungarians' Communist Pioneer Youth, a youth organization, has protested against the "forced detention" of Hungarian refugee children, the official East German news agency, ADN, said Monday.

TO INVESTIGATE AUCKLAND — New Zealand's director general of agriculture, Ernest James Fawcett, is making a special air journey to the United States to discover why recent consignments of New Zealand meat have been rejected by United States authorities.

WIN ELECTIONS JAKARTA, Indonesia — Reports from central Java Monday said the Communists won a strong but not unexpected victory in recent provincial and municipal elections.

Sen. Francis Chides Gov. Holmes For Veto

DAYTON, Ore. — State Sen. Carl Francis, Republican from Dayton, said in a statement Sunday that Gov. Holmes was "wrong on the facts, wrong on the law and wrong in his veto" of the bill to establish a state-wide system for identification of criminals.

Miss U.S. Banished

Officials banished Miss U.S.A.—right into a windfall of publicity—but allowed Miss Peru to keep the title she won over beauties from nearly three dozen countries.

Miss Peru, statuesque Gladys Zender, accepted her diadem graciously. However, her father Eduardo Zender, a wealthy Lima industrialist, threw a contest official into another tizzy when he at first refused to allow his daughter to accept promotional trips sponsored by a bathing suit manufacturer and cosmetic firm.

Finally, Zender consented, provided his raven-haired daughter be accompanied by her mother.

Then Miss Universe settled down to a quiet reign that included Mass yesterday at St. Anthony's Catholic Church here followed by a dinner-dance with other contest lovelies at the swank Beverly Hilton Hotel in nearby Beverly Hills.

There was also solace for Miss U.S.A.—Mary Leona Gage Ennis of Maryland, who was showered with offers for television appearances and showgirl jobs.

In Baltimore, Mrs. Ennis admitted her marriage to Air Force Sgt. Gene H. Ennis, 28, was her second. Her first, at the age of 14, was annulled, the 18-year-old beauty said.

She appeared on the Ed Sullivan television show last night and said her ambition is to become a dramatic actress.

Contest officials, meanwhile, promised no such snafus at next year's pageant. Rules will include specific dates between which a contestant must be born in order to enter, officials said, and complete records will be kept on all girls competing.

Aphid Spreading In Forest Land

WASHINGTON — More than 200,000 acres of timberland in Washington and 150,000 in Oregon have become infested by the fast-spreading balsam woolly aphid, Richard E. McArdle, chief of the U.S. Forest Service reports.

McArdle advised Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) Saturday no direct means of controlling the pest has been found, but tests are being made of the value of a parasite fly destroying the aphid. The flies were released July 8 by the Pacific Northwest Forest Experiment Station in infected areas.

The aphid has spread through 47,880 acres of the Gifford Pinchot National Forest alone and infested some 753 million board feet of fir.

Most of the trees affected are white fir and other true firs which grow mostly at higher elevations in the Cascade Mountains.

Porter Comes Under New Fire From Tennessean; Says Revolutions Approved

By STANFORD BRADSHAW WASHINGTON — Rep. Reece (R-Tenn.) Saturday accused Rep. Porter (D-Ore.) of giving his "personal seal of approval" to Latin American revolutionaries.

The Tennessean also hinted that Miss Rosita Bennett, Library of Congress expert who accompanied Porter on two recent Latin American trips, may have violated laws requiring the registration of foreign agents.

Porter has been hammering at the Trujillo regime in the Dominican Republic in connection with the mysterious disappearance of Dr. Jesus de Galindez and Oregon flyer Gerald Murphy. He also has been critical of some other Latin American governments which he describes as dictatorships.

Reece said Porter had addressed a group of exiles from the Dominican Republic in Puerto Rico last June, and he quoted Porter as saying later: "I told the Dominican exiles that if I were a Dominican I'd be a revolutionary."

When an American congressman addresses a revolutionary group and states that if he were

one of them he would be a revolutionary, he is most certainly exciting them to action and stamping their revolutionary activities with his personal seal of approval.

Slaps At Women As to Miss Bennett, who Reece said accompanied Porter on later trips to Costa Rica and Colombia with expenses paid by the Bogota government and the Bogota newspaper "El Tiempo," respectively, the Tennessean added: "No federal employee can be engaged in official duties on behalf of the U. S. government and at the same time accept compensation from foreign governments in the performance of such duties."

Rep. Porter, asked for comment on the new Reece speech, said he plans a detailed response next week.

The foreign agents registration act, he continued, "requires that all individuals or organizations accepting monies from foreign government or nongovernment entities must register as a foreign agent."

Know In Advance He added that Miss Bennett's superiors at the Library of Congress knew in advance the details of her trips.

Miss Bennett has said she acted as translator for Porter, and on occasion briefed him on the country being visited.

The implication that Miss Bennett might have to register under the act is "fantastic," Porter said, adding: "What if all the congressmen and their friends, invited to visit the Dominican Republic by (Generalissimo Rafael) Trujillo were listed?"

Three Roseburg Schools To Greet New Principals

Three Roseburg schools, one of them a new elementary school, will have new principals when classes start in September, Supt. M.C. Deller announced Saturday.

Robert E. McKee will assume duties in August as principal of Central Junior High School. He replaces Clifford C. Norris, who will be superintendent of the Month-Independence School District.

Among other promotions in the Roseburg School District is that of Jim R. Hayden. He will assume duties as principal of the Benson and new Eastwood elementary schools.

Principals Boosted The new principal at Central Junior High served as sixth-grade teacher at Rose Elementary School and, for the past four years, as principal at Benson. McKee has also been vice principal at Roseburg Junior High School, which is now known as Central Junior High.

McKee's experience and educational background will stand him in good stead in his new position. We have all the confidence in the world that Central Junior High School will continue to progress under his guidance," Deller said.

Hayden served as an elementary principal at Pavette, Idaho, principal of Rogue River High School and vice principal of Douglas High School. He resides at 425 NE Housley Ave. with his wife and four children. He holds a bachelor's degree from the College of Idaho and did graduate work at the University of Oregon.

Hayden will take over as principal at Benson and the new Eastwood School about mid-August.

Commenting about Norris leaving the Roseburg School District, Deller said, "Norris brought many new ideas to the school district and we regret the loss of him and his fine family." Norris holds a bachelor's degree from Montana State College and in 1937 served as captain of the college football team.

Norris has also served as chairman of the State Education Association, public relations committee, president of the Douglas County unit of the OEA and vice president and president elect of the Oregon State Elementary Principals Assn.

CLIFFORD NORRIS will take over as principal this fall at the Month-Independence School District. He has been principal of the Central Junior High School. (See story Page 1.)

Biggest Non-Atomic Blast Crumbles Cliff In Utah

LITTLE VALLEY, Utah — Heavy equipment was at work today, beginning a six-month task of hauling away rubble blasted yesterday from a cliff in the biggest non-atomic explosion ever set off in the United States.

The blast of 1,700,000 pounds of explosives tumbled an estimated three million tons of rock only a few hundred yards from the shore of Great Salt Lake.

Protection Of Vote Rights Gains Support In Senate

WASHINGTON — Senate sentiment jelled swiftly Monday in the direction of paring the Eisenhower administration's civil rights bill down to a measure providing solely for protection of voting rights.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, majority leader, predicted to reporters that unless this action is taken the Senate may pass no civil rights bill at all.

Sen. Saltanall of Massachusetts, chairman of the conference of all Republican senators, announced he will support a move by Sen. Anderson (D-NM) and Aiken (R-Vt) to strip the bill of proposed powers to enforce racial integration in the schools and public places in the South.

Approves Amendment Sen. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) also announced that he will vote for the Anderson-Aiken amendment.

Smith called this "not a compromise, but constructive selectivity."

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SUIT FILED

COQUILLE — A \$127,125 suit has been filed against the state of Oregon by the Coos Bay Oyster Co-operative.

The co-op contends in the circuit court suit that its oyster beds were damaged by construction of a highway at the mouth of Haynes Slough, near Coos Bay.
