

## Portland Gunner Takes 1st In Local Shoot

The ninth annual Roseburg 30-caliber Rifle Tournament was held last weekend on the Roseburg National Guard Range with entrants from most of the top cities in Oregon participating.

During the two day tourney, 10 different matches were held, the first four on Saturday and the final six on Sunday.

Top individual winner of the tournament was Cecil Wolf of Portland, who won five of the 10 events and finished second in another one. He took first place in the 200 and 300 rapid fire, 500 yard slow fire, Saturday aggregate, 200-yards standing and the grand aggregate. His second place finish came in the Sunday aggregate, and Dude Sattlem of Roseburg nabbed first in that event. His winning grand aggregate total was 587 x 600.

Sattlem on top of his first in the Sunday aggregate, also nabbed first in the 200 & 300 Rapid Fire of 10 shots each.

The Mac Wood team trophy, which Roseburg had held for four straight years, was taken by the Redmond team this year with a score of 1,144 x 1,200, while Roseburg was second with 1,141 x 1,200.

Two individual Roseburg trophies were nabbed by Sattlem as the high Roseburg shooter in the tourney with a 581 x 600. He was awarded the Hugh Harrison Trophy. Bill Jones won the long range aggregate with a perfect 200 x 200 and received the Umpqua Gun Store Trophy for his effort.

## Northwest Open Won By Tacoman

TACOMA (AP) — Now king of the Pacific Northwest's golfers is a 46-year-old Tacoma professional who never before had even won a minor tournament.

Al Feldman, pro at the Meadow Park course here, won the Northwest open championship Monday with a 72-hole total of 283 — one under par for the toughened Fircrest Country Club course. The victory earned him \$800.

Feldman, who trailed by four strokes going into Monday's final 36 holes, fired a 70 on the morning round and came back with a par 71 in the afternoon to finish three strokes ahead of the field.

Dick Haskell, Seattle pro, ballooned to a horrendous 81 on the final round to plummet from his three-stroke, 54-hole lead to a tie for 11th place with Ken Storey, Seattle amateur. Both finished with 290.

The 1955 and 1956 winner, Ockie Eliason, Tacoma pro, shot a last-round 69 to come from far down to a tie for second place at 287 with Ken Still, 21, another Tacoma pro. Both won \$450.

Rademacher's bout with Patterson at Seattle next month hinges on a successful title defense by Patterson against Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson July 29.

## Major League Pennant Races Have Melodramatic Tinges

Will the Braves be able to hold the lead despite injuries? Can the Cardinals win at home? Will the Dodgers, loaded with walking wounded, be able to hold their own in the West? Can the Redlegs avoid another long slump? Will the Phillies hang on?

Even Helen Trent never had it as rough as the five clubs in on that soap opera the National League is staging as a pennant race these days. And after the St. Louis Cardinals were rapped 13-4 by the Chicago White Sox in yesterday's Hall of Fame game, the pennant pursuers get back to business today with the Western teams at home to the East.

In the AL—where the only real question is "If the Yankees are so great, why aren't they playing 700 ball?"—first-place New York gets another chance to wrap it up early, returning home with a 4½-game lead for the three-game set with the second-place White Sox.

Milwaukee's Braves, who left home July 1 with a half-game lead, slipped to third and three games behind only to get hot again and win nine of the last 13, are back home again for a 16-game stay. They open tonight with a one-game lead against Philadelphia, with the Phillies in fifth, 5½ games behind, after leading the league by half a game a week ago.

The Dodgers, hottest club in the race at the moment with a 10-2 record that has hoisted them from fifth, five games behind, to second, open the trip at St. Louis.

The Cards, blowing a three-game lead with a 4-7 trip through the East, are third, 1½ games back, as they open a 2½-game stand at home—where they're only 202-20 for the season.

Cincinnati, at home for a 13-game stay, is fourth, two games behind, as it opens against seventh-place Pittsburgh tonight. New York's sixth-place Giants, who tore the West apart with a 10-5 record on their last trip, are at Chicago for a day game with the last-place Cubs.

In other AL games, it's Kansas City at Boston, Cleveland at Washington and Detroit at Baltimore. All are night games.

Braves' Manager, Fred Haney has made the best of a makeshift lineup to overcome injuries to Joe Adcock, Hank Aaron, Felix Mantilla and Billy Bruton.

Brooklyn's bandage boys are Duke Snider, brace on left knee, Elmer Valo, pulled groin muscle, Carl Furillo, stiff shoulder, Don Newcombe, sore finger and John Roseboro, broken finger.
