Dowager Countess Dies In England At Age 94

SUNNINGDALE, England (U.P.)—The dowager Countess of Derby, hostess to the royal families of Europe during the years before World War I, died late last night at the age of 94.

The youngest daughter of the seventh Duke of Manchester, she was married to the 17th Earl of Derby, Britain's war minister under Lloyd George. Her husband died in 1948 and since then she had lived in virtual seclusion at her home at Cowarth Park. She became ill over the weekend.
