Governor Orders Bonds For Positions Of Trust

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Gov. Harold W. Handley ordered all state officials and employees in positions of trust to be bonded Thursday, following his accusation Wednesday that an ousted tax collector had embezzled "thousands of dollars."
The State Board of Revenue immediately approved the order. Handley called state funds "loosey-garanteed" under present bonding regulations, which authorize but do not require bonds for responsible workers.

WAGE AVERAGE UP

SALEM (AP)—The average weekly wage of Oregon production workers was \$89.98 last year, compared with \$88.25 in 1955, the state Employment Service reported Thursday.
Oregon ranked sixth from the top among the states, while it had been at or near the top before 1955.
