Charles, now retired, arrived in town for Monday's fight at the Polo Grounds while the two boxers were nearing the end of their long training grind.

Patterson was due to finish his boxing sessions at Greenwood Lake, N.Y., today and Jackson's unpredictable schedule called for sparring today and tomorrow. The champ remained a solid 5-1 favorite.

Still puzzled about his two 1955 defeats by Jackson, the former champ tried to analyze the Hurricane's "style."

"You keep waiting and waiting for that one good shot," he said. "You're sure you are going to flatten him when you get that one good shot. First thing you know, it's all over and he beat you."

The Wenatchee Chiefs, riding a seven-game winning streak that's within one of matching their string at the opening of the second half, turned back Salem again Thursday night, 5-3.

Eugene's Emeralds kept in step with a 3-0 shutout over the Lewiston Braves. At Yakima, the Tri-City Braves thumped the Bears, 11-3.

The Chiefs were up against one of the league's top pitchers in Salem's Chuck Lybeck, and proceeded to snap his personal victory streak at seven. Lybeck's record is now 16-4.

Louis Zayas was the Wenatchee star with a triple and single that figured in both of his club's scoring innings. Salem got all of its runs in the eighth when Cal Bauer drove in two with a triple and then scored on a sacrifice fly.

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Celler 'Convinced' Sports Law Needed

WASHINGTON — Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.) said today a House investigation has convinced him the business side of professional sports "certainly must" be placed under antitrust laws.

Celler heads the House Antitrust Subcommittee, which is inquiring into the legal status of major league baseball, football, basketball and ice hockey.

Hearings, now in the football stage, recessed yesterday after a group of past and present grid greats testified that pro football's player draft is essential to the sport.

The subcommittee plans to hear from other players and President George Halas of the Chicago Bears after the inquiry resumes next Wednesday. Commissioner Bert Bell of the National Football League also will be called back for additional testimony.

Angling Termed Slow In River

Trout angling has been slow in recent days in most north coastal streams, the Oregon Game Commission reported Thursday in its weekly bulletin.

Lake Lytle and Spring Lake are fair for trout and good for largemouth bass. Yaquina Bay salmon fishing has been fair. Crabbing has been good at Alsea Bay. Fishing continues fair in the upper Willamette Valley streams but reservoirs are poor to fair. Clear Lake has been fair to good and other Cascade lakes have been generally good for evening fly fishing.

Southwest
Summer steelhead angling slow on the Umpqua but should pick up. Trout angling has been fair on the upper Umpqua and on Lemola and Toketee reservoirs.

Coos Bay salmon fishing has been excellent. Salmon angling on the lower Rogue has been fair to good. Floras Lake was stocked last week with trout.

Coos Fishing Good
Fishing outside of the Coos Bay entrance was good last week for chinook and silver salmon as the weather during the first part of the week was fair and warm. The long range weather report also shows that there will be real good weather for this week also.

The bar was good during the flood tide last week for small boats and as the low tides will be early in the morning this week the fishing from the smaller boats will be real good all morning.

Reports on the catches showed that all the boats who fished out side of the entrance buoy over the weekend caught their limit. Several of the larger chinooks brought in weighed over 20 pounds. They have also been catching plenty of striped bass in the upper bay and all kinds of good bottom fish are around the Lower Bay and in the Coos Bay entrance.

Tides this coming week will be real good for clam digging as they are expected to be a little better than last week.

PUC Commissioner Demands Hearing On PNP License

SALEM — Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan telegraphed the federal Power Commission Thursday a demand that it reopen public hearings on the application of Pacific Northwest Power Co. for a permit to build the Pleasant Valley and Mountain Sheep dams on the Snake River.

Acting in behalf of Democratic Gov. Holmes, Morgan protested the recommendation by a Power Commission examiner that the company be permitted to build the two dams.

Morgan, who favors federal construction of the dams, called the examiner's recommendation "astounding."

His telegram said: "The conclusion of your examiner that upstream storage is not urgently needed is directly contrary to massive and well-known facts. Neither the private power companies nor the general public can sustain much longer the failure to develop the largest possible amount of upstream storage in the Columbia Basin."

The failure of the Corps of Engineers to protest, Morgan continued, "may be accepted as a commentary on the loss of engineering initiative and independence by the corps."

Morgan pointed out that the states of Washington and Oregon also failed to protest during the hearings, but Morgan said the reason was that both states were under Republican control at that time.

"The record," he wrote, "should be reopened at once for the introduction of economic and engineering testimony on behalf of the people of this region."

French Accused Of Torturing Algerian Rebels

PARIS — An international commission which toured French prison camps in Algeria reported Friday French troops had been guilty of torturing Algerian nationalists. But it added that such practices were not general.

The commission said it had been allowed maximum freedom in Algeria, and it found "on the part of the legal authorities a very genuine concern for individual freedoms and the rights of the individual."

The commission toured 25 French prisons and camps. Its report concluded that in general terms the French had tried to respect judicial procedures in handling the Algerian insurrection but that there were cases of mistreatment and torture.

The commission was made up of three representatives of the "International Commission Against Concentration Camp Regimes."

They were Dr. Georges Andre, a Belgian wartime resistance leader; Mrs. Lise Borsum, a Norwegian newspaper woman, formerly interned at Ravensbruck; and Cornelius Van Rijn, a Dutch lawyer and municipal councillor of Amsterdam. Their investigation covered June 19 through July 5, and was given the French government this week.

The question of torturing of Algerian nationalists has become a burning issue in France. The governments of Premier Guy Mollet and his successor, Maurice Bourgoin-Maunoury, have denied that such practices were widespread, and have said steps were taken to punish the guilty in the few cases known.
