Guatemala's President Armas Assassinated

post equivalent to vice president. But there also was talk that a junta might take over. (Reports received by the United Fruit Co. in New York said a state of siege—a modified form of martial law—had been imposed.) Most Guatemalans went to bed last night without knowing their president had been killed. Calm prevailed through the night. The assassination came as a shock to Guatemalans. The country had been quiet in recent months after a period marked with some violence. Grief was mirrored in the faces of those who left the palace. Weeping women stood at the doorway. Mario Sandoval Alarcón, the president's private secretary and head of his dominant National party, left the palace at 11:30 p.m. with a submachinegun under his arm. But his face was contorted and he looked as though he might burst into tears. Soldiers were posted around the palace and its park grounds. Castillo Armas, in 1955 paid a state visit to Washington where he talked with President Eisenhower. There have been several plots reported against his regime allegedly masterminded by Guatemalans living abroad. Arbenz himself is in exile in Europe. But Castillo Armas said last November that such attempts were "of no importance" and that the country's economic and political foundations were sound.

Officers Not Satisfied With Story Of Death

BURLINGAME, Calif. — Investigators said Saturday they were dissatisfied with a 19-year-old secretary's story of the brutal death of her socialite roommate. Elaine Soule of Freeport, Long Island, N.Y., according to police, said she killed Catherine Elvins, 19-year-old daughter of Dr. Richard C. Elvins of Seattle, because she wanted a \$150 check made out to the dead girl. Miss Elvins, a secretary and student at San Francisco State College, was found Thursday with seven stab wounds in her chest. She also had been beaten with a flatiron. Police said Elaine told them she killed her friend Wednesday morning. She is to be arraigned on a murder charge Monday. "We're less and less interested in the check as a motive, and more and more interested in the quarrels," Chief Deputy Dist. Atty. W. Howard Hartley said. He added Elaine had money in the bank, and did not have the debts she said she had. A neighbor, Mrs. Ruth Gray, said she heard the girls "arguing all the time." She said she did not know any reason for the spat. Dr. Elvins and his wife arrived Friday to make funeral arrangements. "It's unbelievable," the doctor said. "We'd met the girl; she stayed with us once in Seattle, but we didn't know much about her. We just can't believe it."

Ike To Sign UN Atomic Energy Agency Pact

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower will sign a pact Monday afternoon taking the United States into an 80-nation international atomic energy agency. It is an outgrowth of the Eisenhower-1953 atoms for peace proposal. American officials hope that by that time either Great Britain or Canada also will have ratified the agreement, thus allowing the United States to become the power to put the atoms for peace pool into effect. Twenty nations so far have ratified, but Russia is the only one of the five major powers to have done so. The treaty becomes operative only when 18 nations ratify, including three of the five major powers. The five are the United States, Britain, France, Russia and Canada.

Argentine Vote Slated Sunday

BUENOS AIRES — Argentina's liveliest political campaign in more than a decade ended today with a final flurry of denunciations and victory predictions. Tomorrow the nation's voters will elect a constituent assembly to take up the job of rewriting the constitution of 1853. The provisional government of President Pedro Aramburu — which threw out the Peron-written constitution of 1949 — says the assembly's main task will be to limit the executive's powers and specifically to prevent the president from running for reelection. The would do away with a provision that ousted President Juan Peron put in so he could succeed himself. Aramburu has called for the constituent assembly to meet Sept. 1 and for general elections to be held next February to choose a constitutional government. Peron, now living in exile in Venezuela, has called for his followers to "vote in blank" to demonstrate the power he claims he still wields in Argentina.

BRITISH END SERVICE

INCHON, Korea — Men from 11 British Commonwealth units left aboard a troopship today, ending seven years' service under the U.N. flag in Korea. Some 12,000 British and New Zealand troops walked their posts for the last time and then boarded the British troopship Asturias for the homeward voyage. They leave behind 1,112 dead.

Attorney Says Brewster Not Dodging Jury

SEATTLE — Teamsters Union attorney Samuel B. Bassett says Frank W. Brewster has not attempted to evade a federal grand jury subpoena and arrangements are being made for the union leader to accept service of one. The attorney's comment followed a statement Friday by U.S. Marshal W. Budd Parsons that his deputies had been trying since July 11 to serve a subpoena on Brewster, president of the Western Conference of Teamsters, directing him to appear before a grand jury convening at Tacoma next Monday. Bassett said he told Parsons Brewster was in Seattle last weekend and later left town on union business but arranged to keep in contact by telephone. "I promised Parsons that I would tell Brewster about the subpoena and arrange for Brewster to be served," Bassett said. "It makes it appear we are trying to hide him out, which is ridiculous." The Tacoma jury is expected to resume an inquiry into affairs of Dave Beck, international Teamsters Union president. Brewster is one of some 40 persons the government plans to subpoena.

Desert Town Inundated By Heavy Flash Flood

GRANTS, N.M. — A bright sun shone on the desert country of western New Mexico Saturday where last night all was flood waters, stalled cars and the downpour of rain. The city of Grants awoke to mud-choked streets where the water of creeks—usually but a trickle in the dry sand—had spilled over banks in the wake of violent desert thunderstorms late Friday. Traffic was moving east and west on U.S. Highway 66 Saturday morning after 1,800 cars had been trapped by waters rushing over the road.

Beck Pleads Innocent To Larceny Of Funds

SEATTLE — A plea of innocent to a charge of grand larceny in the use of funds derived from the sale of a union-owned automobile, was entered in King County Superior Court yesterday by Dave Beck, president of the Teamsters Union. Beck's brief appearance was restricted to a formal entry of the plea. He had been scheduled for arraignment next Tuesday but the date was moved up because he leaves for Florida today on union business. Dave Beck Jr., indicted on two similar charges, will enter his plea Tuesday.

Hungarian Exile Joins Wife In Portland

PORTLAND — Mike Fedorov, 27, a sandy-haired exile from Hungary, Friday was reunited here with his wife, Eve. The couple had been separated since last November, when Fedorov fled Hungary after taking part in that nation's brief revolt against Communism.

Constable Wins Bout With Leopard

GRANBY, Que. — A 125-pound leopard tangled with a hefty police constable at the Granby Municipal Zoo Friday night. The constable came out on top after unloading his 28-calibre revolver into the beast. The zoo was crowded with visitors shortly after 8 p.m. when the leopard leaped suddenly and somehow managed to squeeze through a seven-inch opening between the bars covering his enclosure. As men, women and children stared in horror, the animal jumped to the roof of a nearby building when it roamed about and snarled menacingly. Then there was a rush for the exits. Constable Marcel Naud was among police summoned. When he sauntered too close, the leopard leaped on him. Quickly Naud drew his revolver and fired six shots into the animal, which drew away cowering, then collapsed. Naud received superficial face, chest and leg wounds from the animal. Two sharpshooters then fired rifle bullets into the animal to make sure it was dead.

California Man Dies At Motel Of Heart Attack

A guest at a Roseburg motel died from a heart attack Friday night after an attempt to revive him with a resuscitator failed. Roseburg Rural firemen were called at 11:20 to apply the resuscitator to Lanny Guest, 15843 Valley Woods Road, Sherman Oaks, Calif. With him at the time of his death was his wife, Virginia, and daughter, Linda, 13. The family was traveling north on a vacation. Guest was an auctioneer of heavy machinery in Los Angeles. The 40-year-old Southern California resident was born in Boston, Mass., Oct. 25, 1916. The body is being returned by plane to Los Angeles for funeral services and interment. Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral Home, is in charge of local arrangements.

Masked Bandit Robs Family, Rapes Woman

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — A husky bandit, his face hidden by a mask and dark glasses, broke into a Sacramento motel room early Saturday and raped a woman, Los Angeles housewife in front of her husband and three young sons. Police said the rapist escaped after robbing the husband, Donald Beckett, of \$70. The attack occurred at about 3 a.m. approximately five hours after the family checked into a vacation trip to Seattle. Beckett said the bandit ordered him to throw his wallet, containing \$70, on the bed. The man scooped out the money and then ordered Beckett and his three sons, aged 7, 6 and 4, to lie face down on the floor. He then raped Beckett's wife, Marjorie, 28, and escaped. The family resumed their trip to Seattle after reporting to police.

Javelin Pierces Chest Of Former Olympic Star

LONDON — A hurtling javelin pierced the chest of a former British Olympic runner Saturday as he judged competition in the event at a track and field meet at Hurlingham Park. Rushed to London Hospital, Stan Cox, 29, was listed in critical condition. Cox, a marathon runner, represented Britain in the 1948 Olympic Games in London and the 1952 Games in Helsinki. He was the British six-mile champion in 1948.

Veterans Loans Policy Changes Told Realtors

Recently adopted policies of the Veterans Administration toward shortening the delays in processing direct loans to veterans for home and farm home building were explained to members of the Douglas Realty Board at its meeting late this week. The board heard a request from H. E. Wilson, VA assistant chief loan officer from Portland, for the realtors cooperation and assistance in the processing of the direct loan applications in order to aid in the over-all process of the loans. Speed-up in obtaining the loans has been secured in the new VA policy toward direct loans which eliminates some of the prerequisites which have been demanded in the past before the loan was approved. Such things as the title report and the engineer's survey may now be submitted at a later date. He explained that the VA needed to streamline its processing because of the steady backlog of applications which averaged up to 200 regularly. Through the new policy, it is hoped to trim the backlog down to about 50. Wilson said that he was contacting the board and explaining the new policy in order that interested veterans could come directly to the realtors for processing their applications.

Four Thousand Mexican Couples To Be Married

MEXICO CITY — Four thousand couples are slated to get married here Sunday in a mass wedding ceremony. The Social Security Ministry will hold its ninth — and probably largest — wedding service at the National Auditorium. The civil ceremony will legally bind poor couples who have been living together on a common law basis but who have been unable to afford civil or religious rites.

Trowbridge Low Bidder

SEATTLE — Trowbridge Electric Co. of Roseburg, Ore., was low bidder at \$45,700 on a project to improve electric power facilities at the Burns, Ore. Air Force Station. Army Engineers reported Friday. Second low was Steck Electric Co. of Medford, Ore., at \$48,000.

Oregon Game Commission Sets General Buck Deer Season Sept. 28 To Oct. 18

PORTLAND — The Oregon Game Commission Saturday set the general buck hunting deer season for the state to run from Sept. 28 through Oct. 18 and an either-sex season from Oct. 19 through 21. These dates were tentatively set two weeks ago and were discussed by interested parties at two public hearings, the last of which was held in Portland Friday. There were these changes in the tentative regulations announced earlier. A week-long elk season, opening Oct. 26 on the east and west side areas was decided upon. Closing dates will remain the same as announced earlier—Nov. 11 on the Coast Range and Nov. 24 in the Cascades. In addition, Josephine County was included in the spike bull area. The pheasant, quail and partridge season was moved ahead one week, opening on Oct. 19 and extending through Nov. 4. The commission said that because of excellent brood counts, Jackson and Josephine counties will be opened for valley quail, the season to run concurrent with the pheasant season dates. Bag limits were set at five a day and not over ten in possession. The commission heeded the urging of Jackson County sportsmen and opened an area to dove shooting which had been closed under the tentative proposals. An additional closure on either sex deer was put into effect in a small portion of Lake County. Another controlled deer shoot was set up for Nov. 16-17 on tree farms in Central Lane County and portions of Linn County. A total of 2,000 tags will be issued for this controlled shoot. The commission also granted a proposal by Clatsop County hunters and extended the buck season there for three days. In this area the general buck season was set from Sept. 28 through Oct. 21. The commission said a complete synopsis of the regulations will be available to the public in three or four weeks. At Friday hearings, these changes were suggested: The Oregon Wildlife Federation called for a ban on doe hunting in all of Central Oregon. Medford's Oregon Sportsmen's Club urged a one-year closure on hunting of does and fawns. State Sen. Harry Bovin of Klamath Falls protested the proposed either-sex season in Klamath County and Francis Sell of Riverton asked that only buck deer be hunted in the Coquille Valley. A buck season from Sept. 28 through Oct. 21 and a doe season from Oct. 19 through 21 was recommended by the Oregon Wildlife Federation. The group also urged an elk season from Oct. 26 through Nov. 17. W. L. Bach, Lakeview, asked that Southern Lake County be closed to all deer hunting. The Booth Kelly Lumber Co. asked for a longer season in Eastern Lane County tree farms, claiming excessive damage to young trees. A petition with 526 names, supported by the Jackson County Izak Walton League, protested the proposed closure in dove hunting in the county. The Wildlife Federation also asked that the Red Hat Day program be changed to the Yellow Hat Day program. They said that yellow is the safest color to wear while hunting and that red is one of the poorest.

Martin Mol New Eagles President

NEW YORK — Martin Mol of Detroit is the new grand worthy president of the Fraternal Order of Eagles. Mol was elected Friday at the organization's 59th international convention. He succeeds Lawrence Leahy of Wenatchee, Wash. In a speech to the convention, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore) urged a change in the social security law to include a system of medical care and protection in addition to existing compensations. Neuberger proposed financing such care through an additional 2 per cent payroll level shared equally by employer and employee. The senator suggested that the social security eligibility age for women be lowered from 62 to 60. He recommended income tax relief for persons over 45 by permitting a deduction of 1 per cent of total income for each year beyond that age. Neuberger also called for reinstatement of the GI bill of rights for those now entering the armed services.

David R. Schnurstein Draws Five-Day Sentence

David Ralph Schnurstein, 22, who gave his address as Seattle, was sentenced to serve five days in the city jail this morning when he pleaded guilty to disorderly conduct. Schnurstein was delivered to the Roseburg police station Friday night by a man who signed the complaint against him, Donald Schoultz. Schoultz, police said, had tried to break up a scuffle on a Roseburg street Thursday night.

Youth Must Pay Cost Of Sign

A 17-year-old Winston boy was ordered to pay the cost of a new "no parking" sign on Mosher Avenue this morning when he pleaded guilty to destruction of city property. The destruction came Friday night when Stanley Milo Sherman, the accused, lost control of the car he was driving and hit the sign, which was driven through the windshield of the car. Judge Randolph Slocum told the youngster that a \$25 fine would be suspended on payment for the replacement of the sign. A \$5 fine for driving without an operator's license also was suspended. The owner of the car, Lenzy D. Young, 48, of 2120 SW Landers Ave., was fined \$15 on his plea of guilty to disorderly conduct. However, Young pleaded innocent to furnishing liquor to a minor. Slocum set bail at \$50 and the trial Oct. 9.
