Miss Roseburg Posts Group Contest Record In Prizes; Astoria Girl State Winner

Miss Roseburg, Judith Hensley, 17, took honors this weekend not only as runner-up in the Miss Oregon contest, but also by setting a contest record winning three of the six trophies in the preliminaries at Seaside.

Judith cornered all the prizes in her group Friday and Saturday. She won trophies in the bathing suit, evening gown and talent judging. Later in a field of six finalists, including winners from the other group of girls, she went through all three contests again and took second place in the Miss Oregon contest for her fourth trophy.

The winner crowned Miss Oregon was Judith Hansen, Miss Astoria. She is a 19-year-old, blue-eyed blonde with measurements 36-24-35. Miss Oregon won a \$500 college scholarship, merchandise prizes, a one-week vacation in Hawaii, and a shot at the Miss America competition in Atlantic City, N.J., later this summer. She was not in the same group that Miss Roseburg competed with in the preliminaries.

Other finalists were Dorene Morasch, Miss Eugene, third; Janet Sanderson, Miss Hermiston; Patricia Hughes, Miss Yamhill County; and Darlene Ward, Miss Lincoln County. There were 11 contestants.

The livestock industry of the Far West, including both growers and processors, faces a serious threat to its future if freight rate reductions on fresh meat and packing house products from the Midwest to the West Coast, which are scheduled by the Interstate Commerce Commission to go into effect on August 15, are made permanent.

These reductions are based on the principle of the one-way street. That is to say, they apply to west-bound shipments but not to east-bound. They will open up the West Coast market to Midwest shippers but they offer no corresponding opportunity to West Coast livestock producers and packers to get into the Midwest markets at reduced rates.

This proposal is so utterly unfair to West Coast livestock interests that it must be presumed

Worst Blow To Region Hits Capital

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Soldiers blocked off many of this capital's major streets Monday as demolition squads began tearing down buildings dangerously damaged by the worst earthquake in local memory.

Sunday's quake rocked thousands of square miles and caused damage of millions of dollars but took a surprisingly low death toll. Here and in five other cities 42 were known dead. No U.S. citizens were among them.

A young mother was rescued alive from beneath seven feet of crumbled debris of a five-story apartment building at Concepcion Monday. Mrs. Osorio de Anguilar, 25, was saved by the mattress under which she was found 28 hours after the quake. Her husband, 19-month-old daughter, and her father lost their lives.

Despite forecasts that further tremors might be expected, none was registered during the night. Thirty tremors were recorded Sunday after the main shock.

At least 50 buildings were toppled in the capital.

Capital Hardest Hit

In bright sunshine, volunteers began the clearing of tons of rubble. Steel-helmeted soldiers directed a snarl of traffic caused by the closing of streets and the blocking of many buildings to owners and tenants until engineers can check the safety of walls.

The capital, with its population of four million, was hardest hit. The state of Guerrero, with famed Acapulco and its capital of Chilpancingo, was next. Thirty-two bodies were dug out of ruins in the capital, 6 in Chilpancingo, 2 in Acapulco, 1 in Atlix, and 1 in Huamantla.

President Adolfo Ruiz Cortines ordered emergency relief aid for the stricken areas. But schools resumed as usual.

Roseburg Girl Chosen Myrtle Ck. Rodeo Queen

A Roseburg girl Sunday was named queen of the Myrtle Creek Rodeo, Aug. 17-18, and four, instead of two, princesses were elected to be in her court.

Fourteen-year-old Donna Esselstrom is the queen and will be crowned Aug. 17 with white Stetson in the tradition of the rodeo. The four princesses are: Gerry Garrett, 14, Roseburg; Jenny Shelton, 14, Myrtle Creek; Roxanna Hanneman, 14, Myrtle Creek; and Betty J. Patrick, Riddle.

The Misses Esselstrom and Garrett are members of the Winston Riding Club. Miss Shelton belongs to the rodeo-sponsoring Myrtle Creek Saddle Pals, while the other two are unattached, according to Ruth Evans, News-Review correspondent.

The rodeo is being held in conjunction with the Myrtle Creek Fair Festival this year.

To raise money, the Saddle Pals are sponsoring a "Coast Shows" carnival this week. The show will move into the city today and stay through Sunday. The money will be to offset the cost of recent repairs to the rodeo grounds.

Four princesses, instead of two, were chosen because the five contestants were so close in the judging, Mrs. Evans said.

Accidents In Nation Over Weekend Claim 36 Lives

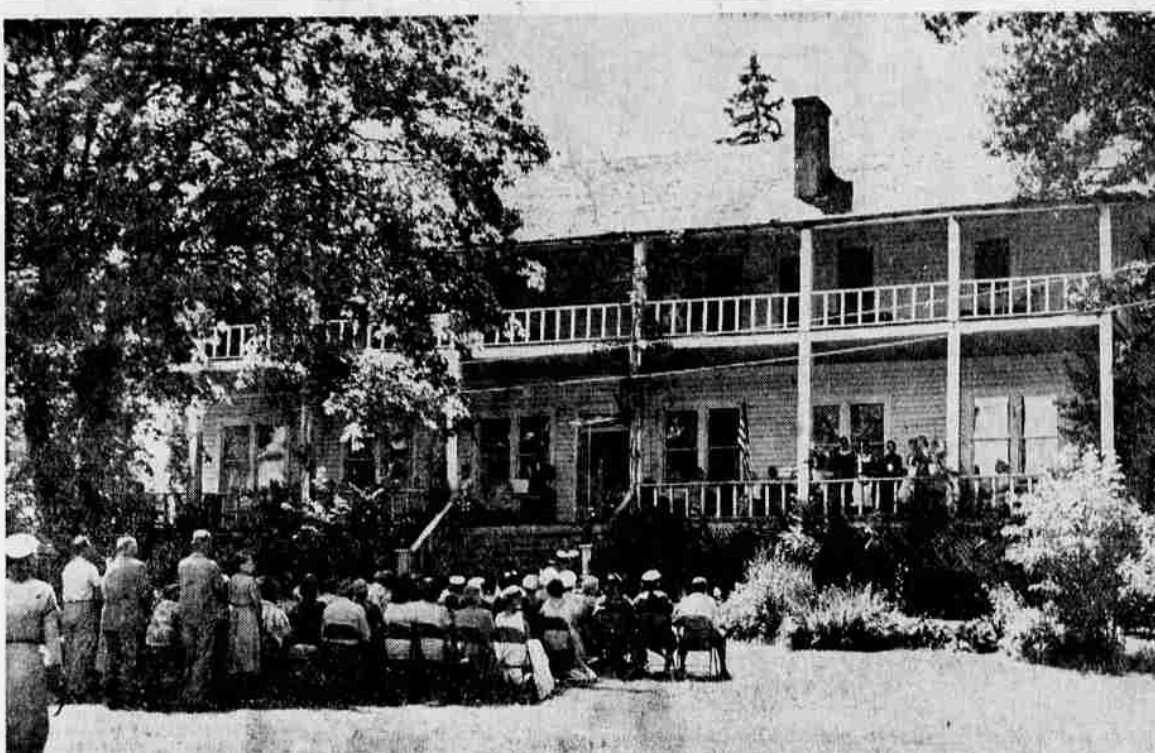
A head-on collision on a sunny Texas highway... a fiery smash-up near a New York summer resort... a capsized boat on Puget Sound... a car in a muddy Virginia pond... plane crashes in Florida and Maine.

Six went the grim story of wholesale death and multiple disaster across the nation over the weekend. Thirty-six men, women and children died. Whole families were wiped out.

The worst accident came on a straight stretch of highway near Kennedy, Tex., on a sunny Saturday afternoon. A head-on collision of two cars claimed nine lives. The dead included five members of a single family.

Tax Levy Cut For New Fiscal Year Given City

An increase in property valuation of 6 1/3 per cent brought a decrease in tax levy millage of 8 1/2 per cent for Roseburg residents for the new fiscal year. Valuations from the county assessor's rolls for 1957 are \$11,485,052 for Roseburg, \$25,389,237 for School District 4, and \$102,231,312 for the county. The county valuation which only increased a little over 1 per cent will cause the only increase in millage levy over last year, from 5.4 to 5.6 mills. The Roseburg levy is down from 24.4 to 22.1 mills. The School District 4 levy is down from 60 to 54.5 mills.

Green Sanitary District Gets U. S. Loan Priority

The Green Sanitary District has been informed by the State Sanitary Authority that it has given priority to the district in its request for a federal loan to construct a sewage system. The district has requested \$36,000 in federal aid, the most which could be allowed for construction of the size of Green's proposed project. The district has voter approval of the sale of \$355,000 in bonds for the project.

The priority approval from the State Sanitary Authority is necessary before a grant can be made by the U.S. Public Health Service. A similar grant has been approved for Roseburg for construction on its sewage disposal system.

In reporting the approval, Curtis M. Everts, chief engineer of the State Sanitary Authority, said the priority rating will not be sent to the U.S. Public Health Service until bonds are sold. The bonds must be sufficient to cover the district's share of the cost and they must be sold before Dec. 1. Construction must start before June 30, 1958, before the grant would be forthcoming. The application will be sent to the federal agency when the bonds are sold.

Edward Murphy, attorney for the Green Sanitary District, said no plans have been made yet for advertising for sale of the bonds.

Planned Crippled Children's Hospital Dedication Draws Throng To Boswell Springs

With a crowd of several hundred persons joining in festivities, the proposed Southern Oregon Crippled Children's Hospital at Boswell Springs was dedicated in appropriate ceremony Saturday afternoon.

A 45-minute program was emceed to the crowd gathered around the lawn in front of the main 22-room building by Mrs. Gladys Workman of Scottsburg, a victim of many hardships herself, who has been a working force in the realization of the project from its beginning late last year.

Dignitaries of many high Douglas County offices were present either in official capacities or as spectators and after Ernest Seaton of Drain, trustee of the hospital board, had introduced the program, the distinguished persons were presented to the gathering by Mrs. Workman.

Folks mainly from northern and central Douglas County communities who have contributed the greatest share to the realization of the effort were mainly in attendance, but the list of visitors and honored guests covered many points from throughout the county.

Principal speaker and representing Gov. Robert Holmes was the Hon. State Sen. Dan Dimick who addressed the group in a dedication talk entitled "Neither Will Our Crippled Children Be Forgotten."

"We are not proud of some parts of our modern civilization," Dimick observed, "but fortunately for all of the people in the world there are leaders with vision who lift themselves from the toil and the mire of everyday problems and do wonderful things for humanity's sake."

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Roseburg Man Fatally Hurt In Traffic Crash

COQUILLE (AP) — Andrew Ross Knott, 75, Roseburg, was fatally injured Saturday when his car went out of control and crashed into a bridge abutment on Highway 42 some three miles east of here.

Knott died in a Myrtle Point hospital where he was taken by his son-in-law, William Leon King of Remote.

State police said Knott was alone in his car, following King's truck. They were going clammity. When King noticed his father-in-law was not behind him he went back to investigate and found Knott fatally injured.

The body was removed to Long and Orr Mortuary here, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Ex-Convict Confesses Knife Killing Of 2 Boys

BROCKTON, Mass. (AP) — A 29-year-old, pasty-faced ex-convict, released only seven weeks ago from a reformatory, was held on a murder charge today in the brutal woodland slaying of two young brothers last Friday.

Raymond F. Ohlson, slightly built and wearing sideburns, was accused of slaying John Logan, 12, and his brother Edward, 11, after allegedly marching them at knifepoint into the woods from a public pond.



City Annexation Statute To Receive Court Test

PORTLAND (AP) — The League of Oregon Cities will make a court test of the constitutionality of the 1957 Legislature's city annexation statute.

The bill, which provides tax and service differentials as a spur to annexation, was favored by the league.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton has questioned the constitutionality of the statute, a spokesman for the League said at Sunday's meeting of the League's executive committee. The committee decided that a test case will be sought soon to resolve the issue.

The committee also reported that Ben West, mayor of Nashville, Tenn., and president of the American Municipal Assn., will be speaker at the League's annual meeting in Portland, Oct. 20-23.

Apparent Suicide Seen In Elkton Man's Death

ARTHUR MACK, 81, Elkton, died Sunday of a self-inflicted bullet wound, and Coroner L. L. Powers termed it an apparent suicide.

Mack lived with his son, Francis, on a farm near Elkton. The son had been away Sunday. When he returned about 5:30 p.m., he found his father's body. Powers said death probably occurred about 1 p.m.

The weapon used was a .25-20 rifle.

The son apparently was Mack's sole survivor, Powers said. The body was taken to Stearns and Little Mortuary, Oakland, where funeral arrangements are being made.

Horse-Thrown Man Discovered Lifeless

GRANTS PASS (AP) — Searchers Sunday found the body of Leonard L. Miller, 38, who apparently was killed Saturday when he was thrown from a horse.

The body, with the head and one leg crushed, was found at Holcomb Peak, 16 miles south of Grants Pass.

Miller lived near Applegate and was a beacon maintenance man for the CAA. He operated a small cattle ranch on the side.

Pledge Made At Meeting In Berlin

Disarmament Accord Rejected Unless Free Election Guaranteed

BERLIN (AP) — The United States, Britain and France pledged today they will not sign any disarmament agreement that would "prejudice the reunification of Germany."

A declaration signed by the ambassadors of the Western Big Three and West German Foreign Minister Heinrich von Brentano stated that Germany can be reunified only after free elections are held in both parts of the country split by the Iron Curtain.

The declaration rejected any idea of imposed neutrality or demilitarization for a reunified Germany. It promised that the reunited country would be free to decide its own military policy.

People Must Decide
It said it would be up to the German people, "through their freely elected government," to decide whether their reborn nation should join the North Atlantic Alliance.

The Western powers promised that if a reunified Germany should plump for the Western alliance, they would offer the Soviet Union a European security pact of significant and far-reaching character.

The West has rejected previous Soviet proposals for an all-European security pact, contending that this would be unrealistic and unworkable unless preceded by settlements of such major East-West issues as the division of Germany.

Progress Bid Offered
The Western three offered to meet with the Russians on the question of German unification "at any time that there is a reasonable prospect of making progress." But the Allies said, "If negotiations are to be fruitful, both sides must approach in a spirit of accommodation and flexibility."

Kangaroo Court Held In Jail Slays Prisoner

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP) — A kangaroo court of six cellmates tried and convicted Robert Young, said Sheriff Earl Whitmore, and then executed him by hanging in the San Mateo County jail.

Sheriff Whitmore said the killing Saturday night first seemed a suicide, but investigation revealed Young, 38, had been gagged and choked to death.

After Young was dead, Whitmore said, his body was strung up in a simulation of hanging.

The sheriff said other prisoners had identified Dan Lee Howard, 18, Los Angeles, as the kangaroo judge and Joe Delbert Viethenheimer, 19, San Jose, as the prosecutor.

Young, arrested while sleeping in a car in a used car lot, had been sentenced for vagrancy. Whitmore said the six cellmates were vague on the kangaroo court's charge against Young. One prisoner said Young was charged with impersonating an officer; another said he was accused of being inhospitable.

Forest Lookout Wounds Cougar

A Douglas Forest Protective Assn. fire lookout, Colleen Tinsino of Roseburg, is watching the surrounding terrain, but a wounded cougar may be watching her.

Sunday afternoon the cougar came close to the lookout and Tinsino shot and killed it, wounding the animal. She phoned the Roseburg DFFA headquarters who contacted Eston Dumont of Glendale, Dumont took his dogs to the Chivigny Mountain lookout in the Little River area, but because of hot weather the dogs could not pick up the cougar's scent.

Another attempt to find the wounded cougar will probably be made, DFFA Dispatcher Wayne Miller said. Miss Tinsino has been the lookout since June 4.
