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Yoncalla Athletics Take Softball Playoff Crown

Two stellar pitching performances by Phil Telford enabled the Yoncalla Athletics to take the Roseburg city softball title from City Drive in two straight games Saturday and Sunday.

In the Saturday evening game, played on the Vets diamond, Yoncalla got a two-hit pitching job out of Telford and a 9-2 victory. Telford came back Sunday at Yoncalla and outpitched Don Hess to win a one-hit 1-0 game.

The Sunday game at Yoncalla saw Hess and Telford lock horns in one of the finest title duels seen in this area in several years, as Hess in losing gave up only four hits and lost the game when a bad throw in the second inning allowed Layton Deitz to score all the way from second after doubling.

The only safe hit for City Drive in the second game was by Don Curron, the shortstop. Fred Doffler and Deitz with 1-2 paced the Yoncalla attacks.

Kidder Loses Game
The Saturday night game played in Roseburg saw more runs scored as Yoncalla came out on top 9-2, with Bob Kidder the losing pitcher.

Yoncalla jumped into a 3-0 lead in the top of the first inning as Bob Risteen singled home two runs and then scored himself on a passed ball. They added a single run in the third inning on a single by Risteen, a stolen base and a fielder's choice by George Johnson.

In the meantime City Drive in had scored a single run in the top of the first inning as Dave Saun-

ders was hit by the pitcher and scored on a single by Hess.

A two-run rally in the sixth inning for Yoncalla sent them into a 6-1 lead as Johnson, Deitz and Doffler all singled for the two runs.

The final three runs for Yoncalla came in the top of the seventh inning on a walk to Telford, an error and a three run by Risteen.

City Drive Scores
The second run of the game for City Drive in was scored in the fifth inning on a combination of two walks, an error and a fielder's choice.

Risteen with 3-4 was the big gun for Yoncalla, followed by Deitz with 2-4 and Telford with 1-1. Don Hart and Hess each had 1-3 to pace City Drive in.

Yoncalla will now play Medford in a best of three series for the right to meet Klamath Falls for the right to enter the state softball tournament in Oregon City.

The first game of the series will be played Wednesday night in Roseburg starting at 8 on Finlay Field. The final two games will be played Sunday either in Roseburg or in Medford.

Drain Black Sox Tip Portland Ball Clubs In Weekend Series

The Drain Black Sox stretched their winning streak to seven games in a row over the weekend as they downed West Linn 6-2 on Saturday night and Archers Pipe and Blowers of Portland 6-0 on Sunday afternoon. Both games were played in Portland.

In the Saturday night game against West Linn, Noel Aronson pitched a sparkling four-hit job to win his second game of the season against no losses, while Drain was collecting 11 hits off two West Linn pitchers.

Drain opened the scoring with a three-run first inning, sparked by a two-run homer off the bat of Ted Bowen. Wimp Hastings and Manager Ray Stratton had doubled as the first two batters in the inning before the hit by Bowen.

They added single runs in the second and third innings before adding their final run in the top of the ninth.

A fielder's choice by Dan Luby after a single by Irv Roth accounted for the second inning run, while singles by Wimp Hastings and Pat Wohlers and a double by Bowen accounted for the third inning run.

The only inning in which West Linn could dent the plate was in the second inning, when they

scored on a double by Gordon Hammerle and a single by Gail Perkins and in the seventh when Perkins lined a home run into the left field seats.

Hastings Leads
Hastings with 2-3 was top batter for Drain followed by Stratton and Bowen with 2-4 and Wohlers and Jerry Gregg with 2-5. Perkins nabbed half of the West Linn four hits at a 2-4 day at the plate.

In the Sunday afternoon game against Archers, Stan Dmoschowsky threw the second four-hit game in a row against Portland opponents as Drain made it two in a row over them, this time by the score of 6-0.

Archers used three pitchers trying to stop the big bats of the Drain team, but no one lasted for more than three innings.

A big three run second inning started things rolling for Drain as Bowen, Gregg and Wohlers all started with a walk to load the bases followed by a fielder's choice by Nory Ritchie for one run, a passed ball for the second run and a sacrifice fly by Luby for the third run.

Singles by Hastings and Bowen and walks to Wohlers and Roth accounted for the third inning run for Drain and two sacrifice flies by Stratton accounted for the single runs in the sixth and eighth innings.

Ten walks by Archers pitchers caused most of the damage, but the seven strikeouts by Dmoschowsky also helped in a big way.

Bowen was the only player in the game able to get more than one hit as he had 2-4.

The next game for Drain will be this Saturday night when they will host The Dalles in a double-header starting at 7 p.m.

For the second straight time in less than two weeks the Roseburg Lockwood Motors Junior American Legion baseball team won a district series in two straight games by defeating Medford 13-1 Saturday night in Roseburg and 7-6 at Medford.

The win for Roseburg now puts them in the semi-final round of the state championships and their third straight crack at the state title.

Saturday night, big Ron Beamer set Medford down on only two hits to pick up his sixth win of the season against one defeat and Sunday the one-two punch of Bill Eswine and Allen Smith set Medford down with six hits and a close 7-6 win. The win went to Eswine, his sixth of the year against no defeats.
