

Rules Established For Dump Ground At Camas Valley

Two rules have been established by the Douglas County Health Dept. for use of the Camas Valley dump, Joseph M. Gates, sanitarian, announced.

In an appeal to the people who use the dump, the department states that dead animals must be buried and garbage and refuse must be dumped in the garbage pit. Putting garbage in the pit will reduce the need for expensive bulldozing and allow easier burning. A sign will designate the site of dumping, he said.

The dump is sponsored and maintained by members of the Camas Valley Grange. Due to the relatively small group in the grange, proper maintenance of the dumping area is extremely difficult, and made more so by improper use of the dumping area, health department officials said.

St. Bernard Dog May Be Doomed For Execution

KENTON, Ohio — Unless an appeal is made in her behalf within the next 17 days, Annie, a young St. Bernard dog, appears doomed for the execution chamber.

Annie, owned by Mrs. Joanna Perkins of Kenton, is accused of killing six sheep belonging to Emerson Fay, a Hardin County farmer, last February.

The dog was ordered destroyed, but court appeals have thus far spared her life. Last Saturday, however, Judge Arthur D. Tudor of the Hardin County common pleas court denied a motion for a new "trial." If an appeal to the third district court of appeals of Lima is to be made, it has to be filed within the next 17 days.

Hardin County authorities have said they will execute the dog in a humane way if no appeal is made.

Committee Oks Alaska, Hawaii Statehood Bills

WASHINGTON — The Senate Insular Affairs Committee unanimously approved Tuesday bills to grant statehood to Alaska and Hawaii.

On both bills the committee gave its approval with voice votes. Action on the Hawaii bill came quickly and with little discussion after the committee took nearly an hour to discuss the Alaska proposal.

Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.), territories subcommittee chairman, said it was hoped that the Alaska bill would be considered by the Senate early next year.

He made the statement after Sen. Church (D-Idaho), questioned whether committee approval at this time might jeopardize the Alaska bill by making it possible for the measure to be brought up in the Senate in the final days before adjournment.

There was general agreement in the ensuing discussion that no effort would be made to bring the bill before the Senate this year.

The motion to report the bill was made by Sen. Goldwater (R-Ariz.), and seconded by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore). The measure was approved without change.

Portland Man Killed In Highway Collision

SALEM — A grinding head-on collision Monday claimed the life of Mrs. John Rodemaker, Salem, the driver of the other car, was injured in the wreck on the Dallas-Salem Highway. She suffered cuts and a possible arm fracture.

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Government Plans To Let First Atomic Powered Ship Contract Early This Fall

WASHINGTON — The government plans to let the contract for building the first atomic-powered merchant ship early this fall and have it at sea in 1960.

This was announced Tuesday at a meeting called by the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC), the Maritime Administration and the Commerce Department and attended by representatives of the maritime industry.

Clarence G. Morse, maritime administrator, said the timetable calls for laying the keel for the ship in the spring of 1958. Launching "should follow a year later," he said.

Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the AEC said the projected passenger-cargo ship will "carry to all corners of the earth the idea of President Eisenhower for the peaceful use of atomic energy." Details of the new ship were described by Douglas C. MacMillan of George C. Sharp Inc., which has been designated to design the hull.

Among other features, the plans

call for a 350,000-mile range with the first load of nuclear fuel. Refueling would be expected in about three years.

The government already has started a project for development and construction of a prototype merchant ship using a nuclear engine. Congress provided 42½ million dollars for the program.

The power plant for this test craft will be a pressurized water system, similar in design to that used in the first nuclear submarine, the Nautilus, and in other submarines now being built.

The general design of the prototype merchant ship will meet requirements of a commercial vessel.

Government officials already have suggested that at the outset costs for nuclear fuel will be greater than for standard fuel—about 70 cents per million British Thermal Units (BTU) as compared with an average of 35 cents for fuel oil. However, government experts believe these higher operating costs in initial operations will be more than offset by the increase in revenue.

Ike Orders Slash In Imports Of Oil East Of Rockies

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower Monday told oil companies east of the Rockies to cut back oil imports by 10 per cent, starting at once, or face the possibility of mandatory controls.

Eisenhower acted on the basis of a special cabinet committee's report that increased crude oil imports threaten "to impair the national security."

The special committee, headed by Secretary of Commerce Weeks, was set up last June 26. It was instructed to study whether the United States was overly dependent from a security standpoint on oil imports which might be cut off in the event of a war.

The President approved the committee's recommendation that all importing companies except those in the Far West "be requested to cut back 10 per cent below their average crude oil imports for the years 1954, 1955 and 1956."

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said failure to comply "could lead to mandatory controls." The President has the power to fix quotas under the trade agreements extension act of 1955.

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Admiral Halsey Suffers Stroke

NEW YORK — Retired Fleet Adm. William F. (Bull) Halsey, 74, was reported "feeling very well" Tuesday in Doctors Hospital, where he is undergoing a physical checkup.

The World War II hero was reported Monday to have suffered a stroke, but a hospital spokesman said Tuesday "his condition had been exaggerated."

"The admiral is not in bed," the spokesman said. "He is walking around and enjoying regular meals. He is feeling very well and came to the hospital primarily for a checkup."

Fifth Successful Rocket Blasted 140 Miles High

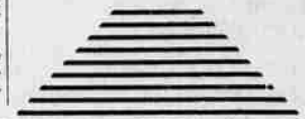
FT. CHURCHILL, Man. — The fifth successful rocket in the K. S. (International) Geophysical Year program blasted 140 miles into the air Monday from its launching tower near this U. S.-Canadian army base.

The Aerobee-Hi rocket's altitude was 20 miles short of the local record of 160 miles, set July 4 by the initial rocket fired in the IGY program.

The rockets transmit by radio information on air pressure, densities, temperatures, X-ray absorption and cosmic rays.

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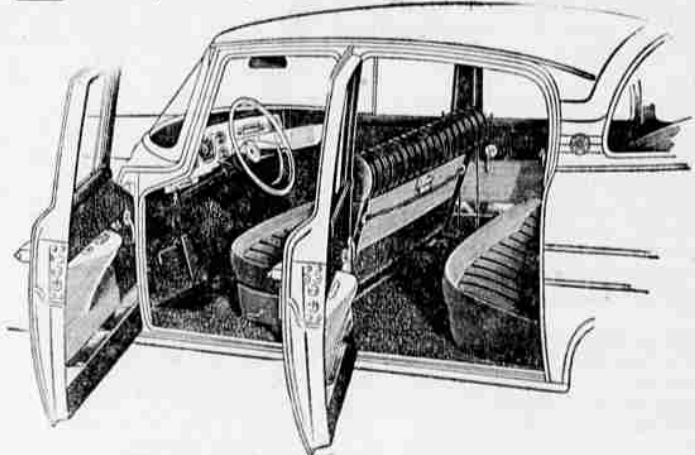
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
