Democrats Open Drive To Finance Current Expenses

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democrats launched Monday their nationwide drive to help finance their party through small contributions from regular annual donors.

It is called a "sustaining membership" drive and national committee chairman Paul M. Butler went to Independence, Mo., to present former President Truman with "charter sustaining membership" card No. 1.

Each contributor of at least \$10 a year on a semiannual, quarterly or monthly basis will receive a party membership card and a free subscription to the "Democratic Digest," the committee's official publication.

The new drive will raise funds to help pay the day-to-day operating costs of the national committee, which still has a \$860,000 deficit left from the 1956 campaign.

Separate plans are under consideration to clean up this debt. The present drive will be followed by a door-to-door solicitation of funds on Oct. 11-12, called "Dollars for Democrats Day."

This will be an annual event, as will the membership program.

Four Historic Buildings Destroyed By Big Fire

EPHRATA, Pa. — Four historic buildings on the Thomas Drumheller sheep ranch near here were destroyed Monday by a fire which also blackened 4,500 acres of grazing land.

The buildings, a huge hay barn, a machine shed, a shop and an ice house, were constructed before the turn of the century by Lord Blythe, an early day settler, near Rocky Ford Creek between Ephrata and Moses Lake.

The ranch house also caught fire several times but firefighters extinguished the flames. Drumheller, whose father purchased the ranch from Lord Blythe in 1906, said he was unable to make an immediate estimate of damage. He said many antiques and articles of historical value were lost.

The blaze was believed to have been started by sparks from a tractor.

Navy's Arctic Supply Ships Off Point Barrow

SEATTLE (AP) — The Navy's 46-ship Arctic supply expedition has arrived off Point Barrow, Alaska, and started threading through ice-strewn waters to reach radar stations along a 1,750-mile stretch of northern coast.

A message on the progress of the ships, which left Seattle July 13, was received here Monday night from the flagship Eldorado, commanded by Rear Adm. Frederick C. Steller Jr.

The supply ships, led by icebreakers, will move eastward through the narrow gap of navigable waters between the polar ice cap and the northern coast of Alaska.

They are carrying 193,000 barrels of petroleum and 19,655 tons of general cargo to supply the Dew Line (Distant Early Warning Line) of radar stations.

Vagrants Leave Estates Totalling Nearly \$100,000

PORTLAND (AP) — Two brothers, who for the past 10 years have lived among the vagrants on Portland's skid road, left estates totalling nearly \$100,000.

They were Arthur Kneubehler, 76, who died June 6, leaving an estate of \$75,000, and his brother Julius, 78, who died July 22, leaving \$20,000.

They made most of their money in the stock market, said attorney Karl F. Glos, administrator of the estate. Glos said their only known survivor is a sister who is a patient in a state mental hospital at Salem.

Glos said Julius came to him for advice recently, seeking aid in probating his brother's estate. He said the brothers had operated a family farm in Cowlitz County, Washington, until they sold it and moved to Portland 10 years ago.

Glos said the brothers kept their money in a dozen banks, apparently thinking that was safer.

Julius lived a quiet life, Glos said. "Just sitting around, living off his interest. And now and then he drank a little wine. I tried to talk him into living a little better, but he said he liked it down there" on skid road.

Prisoners Beat Jail Guard, Fail In Escape Plan

CHEHALIS, Wash. (AP) — A Lewis County jail guard was brutally beaten and a would-be rescuer was scalded with hot coffee Saturday by three young prisoners who made an unsuccessful attempt to escape.

Ernie Runke, 69, was clubbed on the head with a heavy piece of wood when he entered a cell to give the evening meal to four young prisoners being held for the Air Force.

Runke was attacked by three of the prisoners, DeWitt Swartz Jr., Claremore, Okla.; Harold C. Black, Alabama City, Ala., and James Blackmore, Idaho Springs, Colo., all 18.

The fourth occupant of the cell, Kenneth Rock, 27, went to Runke's aid. The others threw a pot of hot coffee over Rock's back and shoulders, scalding him.

BODY RECOVERED

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — Rescue parties returned here late Monday from the slopes of 14,137-foot Capitol Peak with the body of 22-year-old John Hecker of Wilmington, Del.

The young climber was killed last Thursday in a fall down a snow field while descending the rugged peak.

Morse Refuses To Aid Crosby In Dismissals

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Morse (D-Ore) refused Monday to help Oregon Teamster chief Clyde Crosby get a dismissal of the remaining charges against him in the Portland vice investigations.

Morse said it would be improper for him to intervene with Oregon law enforcement officials on behalf of Crosby.

Crosby was acquitted recently on a bribe conspiracy charge and asked Morse to help him get the remaining charges at Portland dropped. These include perjury, extortion and conspiracy to obtain a copy of a wiretap.

Morse explained his refusal in a letter to the union official, saying: "Under the circumstances, it would be improper for me, or anyone else, to seek to have the charges dropped by attempting to bring pressure of any kind upon the attorney general of the state or the prosecutor's office or the governor's office."

The senator concluded, "It is my judgment that both you and the Teamsters Union have more to gain by insisting that justice run its full course in a judicial determination of the indictments."

Bendix Air Race Won By Jet Ace Chandler
WASHINGTON (AP) — Jet ace Kenneth D. Chandler won the Bendix Air Race Sunday with a record speed performance — but he almost ran out of fuel at the end.

Piloting a Convair F102 interceptor, Air Force Capt. Chandler averaged 679 miles an hour in flying the 620 miles from Chicago's O'Hare Field to Andrews Air Force Base in nearby Maryland. Elapsed time of the flight was 54 minutes 45 1/2 seconds.

Chandler bested five other Air Force pilots, all of whom flew delta-wing F102s.

Chandler's record was 13 miles an hour faster than the former mark set last year by Maj. Manuel (Pete) Fernandez.

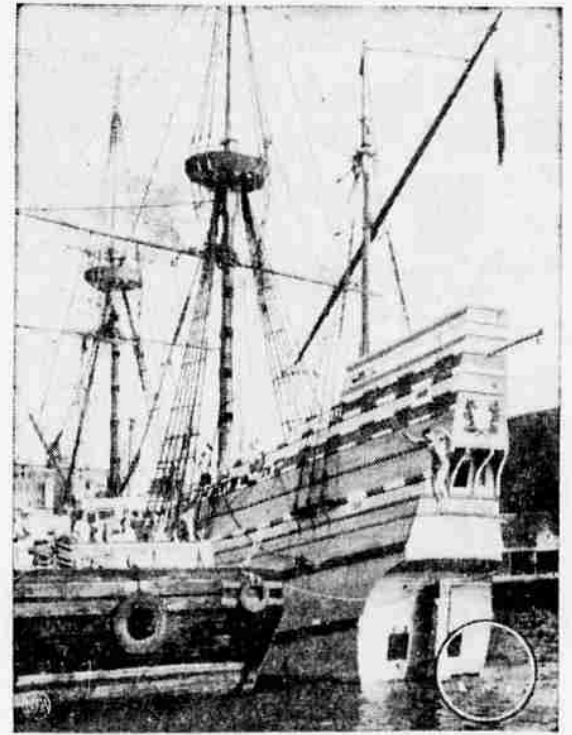
