

Boeing To Reduce Employment Up To 12,000 Men

SEATTLE (AP) — The Boeing Airplane Co. said Tuesday its work force at plants in Washington State and Kansas will be reduced by "from nine to 12,000" employees in the next six months.

William M. Allen, company president, said further reductions were possible after the first of the year but "cannot be projected at this time."

Allen said reductions in Washington "result from completion of certain tooling projects, assignments of the advanced B52G (improved jet Stratofortress) production to Wichita, certain schedule adjustments brought about by changes in Air Force procurement policies, and declines in manpower requirements usually experienced once production is well under way."

There will be no layoffs, Boeing said, but employees who leave in normal turnover will not be replaced.

Allen said the work force in Washington would be reduced 6,000-8,000 bringing employment in the Seattle-Renton, Moses Lake and Everett areas "to something less than 60,000."

He said employment at Wichita would be reduced 3,000-4,000.

Bohemia Lumber Timber Buyer

Bohemia Lumber Co. of Culp Creek bid the appraised price for 10,400,000 board feet of Umpqua National Forest timber in a sale at the Roseburg supervisor's office Tuesday.

The sale price was \$270,000. The tract, 26 miles southeast of Cottage Grove, contains 8,900,000 feet of Douglas fir and pine appraised at \$28.15 and 1,500,000 feet of western hemlock and other species appraised at \$3.80.

Meanwhile, it was reported that a tract of cedar up for auction earlier had drawn no bids. The tract, containing 60,000 lineal feet of western red cedar poles and unestimated volumes of cedar sawlogs and posts, is appraised at \$6,000. It will probably be held open for the rest of the summer at the appraised price.

The next Umpqua National Forest sale in Roseburg is scheduled Thursday.

Meany Ousts High Teamster From Union Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — AFL-CIO President George Meany ordered Paul Dorfman, a close friend of Teamsters vice president James R. Hoffa, removed from office in a Chicago labor union Wednesday.

Dorfman previously had been suspended as secretary-treasurer of Waste Materials Handlers Union No. 20467. Meany's action made the ouster permanent.

The action was based in part on findings that Dorfman's wife Rose—and thus Dorfman himself—realizes profits running to about \$100,000 a year from handling Teamsters and Electrical Workers Union welfare accounts controlled by Hoffa and other union leaders.

Dorfman was in almost daily attendance at the recent federal court trial here in which the 44-year-old Hoffa, heir apparent to Dave Beck as Teamsters Union president, was acquitted by a jury of charges of bribing a Senate Rackets Committee staff member to act as a spy.

Meany announced his decision permanently ousting Dorfman from union office as the AFL-CIO Ethical Practices Committee resumed hearings on corruption domination charges against the Bakery Workers Union. A similar hearing is due Thursday on charges against the teamsters.

Dorfman's Waste Handlers Union, with approximately 900 members, is directly affiliated with the AFL-CIO. Thus the case was handled directly by Meany without consideration by the Ethical Practices group.

Main Barn At WCTU Home Destroyed By Fire

CORVALLIS (AP) — The main barn at the W.C.T.U. children's farm home five miles north of Corvallis was destroyed by fire Tuesday afternoon.

Corvallis Fire Chief Percy Tallman estimated the damage at \$15,000 to \$20,000, but farm home officials said \$30,000 would be needed to replace the building at present costs. They added that the structure was insured.

The fire department could find no cause for the fire. Twenty calves and most of the milking shed and its equipment were saved. The 128 children at the home helped Corvallis firemen fight the blaze.

Rev. Pine Accepts Green Community Church Pastorate

The Rev. Laurence Pine of Covina, Calif., has accepted the pastorate of the Green Community Church. His ministry at the church starts this Sunday.

He and his family will move to Green this week to live in the parsonage.

For his Sunday morning topic, he has selected a topic entitled "Pressing Toward the Mark." In the evening his subject is entitled "The All-Sufficient Christ."

For the past four years, the Rev. Mr. Pine has been associated with Pacific Bible College of Azusa, Calif., as registrar and instructor. While there, he taught survey courses in history and in the field of Bible.

He holds a bachelor's degree in theology from Pacific Bible College and a bachelor of arts degree in history from Pasadena College. He has taken graduate work at Claremont Graduate School in California and at Los Angeles State College.

Before being with Pacific Bible College, he pastored churches of the Missionary Church Assn. of which Green Community Church is a member. His pastorates were at Culver City and Duarte, Calif.

Cancellation of the scheduled Golf Tournament, Sept. 6-8, has been announced by Roseburg Country Club Pro Ed Oldfield.

No immediate explanation was given, but Oldfield did say that the event may be held again in 1958. The 72-hole tournament had been successful in drawing top players and purses through its four years and in 1955 the host pro, Oldfield, took the top prize money.

Other winners included Bob Duden, Portland; Al Zimmerman of Scottsdale, Ariz. and Tom Boucher of Walla Walla, Wash.

Another golf development Wednesday was the announcement that Carole Jo Kabler will play for the state women's links title Sunday in her postponed match with Grace DeMoss. The event is scheduled for the Oswego Country Club.

Miss Kabler insisted on a delayed playoff after Miss DeMoss had injured her side and was unable to play on the originally scheduled date of June 29. It will be a 36-hole match.

Shipyards Strike Appears With Wage Rejection

PORTLAND (AP) — Rejection of the latest shipyard employers' offer and the setting of a strike date was decided upon Tuesday by delegates at a division meeting of the Western States Conference of Machinists.

The conference unanimously voted to recommend those actions to their locals. Announcement of the vote was made by Harold J. Gibson, Portland, international vice president of the International Association of Machinists.

No specific date was disclosed. Gibson said the new offer "is inadequate and not sufficient for today's cost of living." The offer consisted of a wage boost of 15 cents an hour and five holidays.

The machinists delegates, said Gibson, will recommend a strike date be set to close down West Coast shipyards. Delegates represented about 1,000 of the 11,000 shipyard workers from San Diego to Bellingham, Wash.

He said about 350,000 members in 14 Western states are represented at the conference. Some 300 delegates, most of them representing California aircraft factories and automotive shops, will be in Portland for the conference until Thursday, said Gibson.

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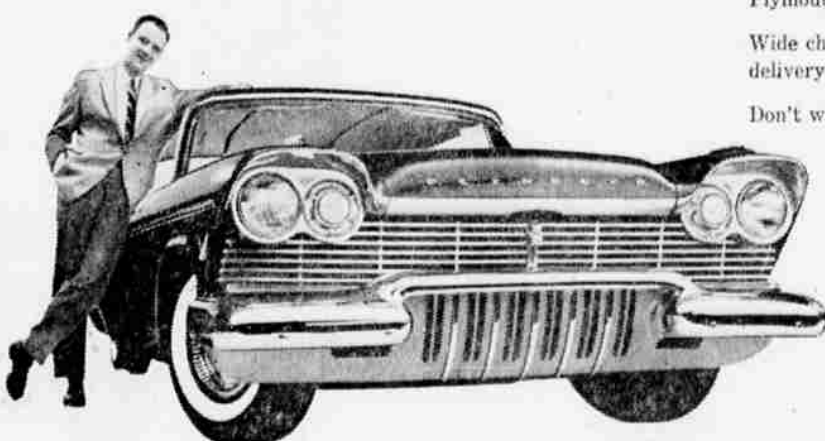
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
