

Inmates Held In Isolation After Rioting

CHEHALIS — Ten boys at the Green Hill School for Boys were held in isolation from other inmates Tuesday for being partly responsible for Monday's disturbance, acting superintendent Elmer Lindquist reported.

Lindquist said, however, only five of them were believed to have been ringleaders in the disturbance that saw about 30 inmates on a destructive rampage, causing damages to a cottage estimated at between \$5,000 and \$7,000.

The superintendent said four of the boys still were held at the Lewis County jail. He said the fifth was in isolation at the school.

M. A. Harmon, chief of the Institutional Services, and Van R. Hinkle, state supervisor of Children and Youth Services, were at the school to investigate the cause of the incident.

A report on the disturbance will be made "in a few days" through Hinkle to Gov. Rosellini, Lindquist said.

Lindquist emphasized his previous statement that those responsible for the disturbance were "the older type that Green Hill can't help." He said earlier he would recommend that some of them be confined at the state reformatory or penitentiary.

The disturbance, in which no one was injured, was quelled in about 45 minutes after sheriff's deputies used tear gas bombs.

Police Quell Chicago Riot

CHICAGO — Chicago's police Task Force moved into the race-troubled South Side last night as threats of fresh disorders arose.

The Task Force — a special unit designed to move into any trouble spot and quell disorders — broke up a milling crowd of more than 1,000. Four parked cars reportedly owned by Negroes had been stoned and stones were thrown at others driven by Negroes. No injuries were reported.

Police seized 35 persons, including several white teen-agers, for questioning. Four Negroes were arrested for carrying concealed weapons.

MEAT INSPECTION

SALEM — The state Agriculture department has launched its program of statewide meat inspection. R. J. Steward, department director, announced Tuesday.

He said that five inspectors have been assigned to Jackson and Josephine counties, and that other areas will be added soon.

The recent Legislature authorized permanent meat inspection after a two-year trial.

Subcommittee Told IP Stock Purchased After Tax Writeoff

WASHINGTON — The Senate Antitrust subcommittee said Tuesday that considerable stock of Idaho Power Co. was bought by four purchasers just before the government gave the firm a fast tax writeoff certificate.

The subcommittee staff said a report from the New York Stock Exchange showed that 8,900 or slightly more than two-thirds of the Idaho Power stock bought between April 1 and April 24, in addition to amounts bought by "specialists and odd lot brokers," went to these four:

Standard Life Assurance Co., of Edinburgh, Scotland, 3,000 shares; Children's Hospital in Boston, 2,200 shares; Bankers Trust Co. of New York as trustee for Standard Oil (New Jersey) Annuity Trust, 2,700 shares; and Orinoka Mills of Philadelphia, Upholstery goods manufacturers, 1,000 shares.

Chairman Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said the subcommittee still is exploring how they happened to buy the stock at that particular time. His group is investigating whether there was a leak of information that the Office of Defense Mobilization was about to announce the granting of fast tax writeoff certificates to the company.

Idaho Power subsequently announced it was turning back the rapid tax amortization certificates as a sequel to the row in which it has won permission to build the Hells Canyon Dam. The certificates would have allowed fast tax writeoffs on the building of two dams on the Hells Canyon site.

Reporters asked Kefauver at the windup of the hearing what he thought the report on the purchase of the stock proved.

"We don't know yet," he replied. "The staff is asking why they bought it at that particular time."

Dave Beck Jr. Pleads Innocent

SEATTLE — Dave Beck Jr., son of the president of the International Teamsters Union, pleaded innocent Tuesday to two counts of grand larceny.

Beck Jr., 37, was arraigned before Superior Court Judge Theodore S. Turner on indictments returned July 12 by a King County (Seattle) special grand jury.

Beck was accompanied by William Wesselhoft, attorney for him and his father, who last week pleaded innocent on a grand jury indictment for grand larceny.

At Wesselhoft's request, Judge Turner granted Beck Jr. 30 days in which to move against the indictment.

The indictments accuse Beck Jr. of selling two automobiles belonging to the Teamsters Union and pocketing the profits.

Beck Sr. was charged with selling one union-owned auto under similar circumstances.

Both Becks are at liberty on the county charges on \$3,000 bond each.

Highway Commission Lists Road Restrictions

SALEM — The Oregon Highway Commission Tuesday listed the following restrictions because of construction:

John Day Highway—Construction between 8 and 14 miles south of Fossil; possible 5-minute delay.

Columbia River Highway—Construction blasting for three miles east of Mosier; possible delay of 5 to 15 minutes during mornings.

The Dalles-California Highway—Maryhill Ferry over Columbia River closed for repairs.

Pacific Highway traffic being slowed for five miles north of Canyonville, and for one mile in Ashland.

Elkton-Sutherlin Highway—Construction between 14 and 17 miles southeast of Elkton; possible delays of 5 to 15 minutes.

Olds Ferry-Ontario Highway—Closed at Malheur River Bridge; traffic detoured via U.S. 30.

Argentina's Moderate Forces Are Victorious

BUENOS AIRES — Argentina's moderate forces backing Provisional President Pedro Aramburu's drive for constitutional reform were sure today of a comfortable majority in the constituent assembly. But political leaders still argued the meaning of the election results.

The arguments ranged from victory claims by antireform forces and shouts of triumph by Peronista diehards to assurances from Aramburu that the balloting Sunday proved Argentina's will to live democratically.

Tallying of 8,231 votes—more than 80 per cent of the total registered voters—showed that 2,088, 140, or just under 25 per cent, had heeded ex-dictator Juan Peron's command to cast blank ballots.

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Governor Leaves Leopold Term To Parole Board

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. — Gov. William G. Stratton Tuesday declined to shorten the 85-year prison sentence of Nathan Leopold, but held out the hope that Leopold may win freedom soon on parole.

The governor concurred in a recommendation of the Illinois Pardon and Parole Board that it "would not be warranted in recommending that executive clemency be granted."

However, Stratton said, Leopold is eligible to parole consideration and may file a petition for a rehearing of his case at any time he desires.

"If, in the opinion of the members of the Parole and Pardon Board a rehearing is warranted," Stratton said, "his name will be placed on a subsequent docket for a hearing, and then further consideration will be given his case on the question of his possible release on parole under supervision in community life."

"The parole procedure," Stratton said, "is generally accepted, and in this state a successful method of terminal rehabilitation."

In a two-page, 400-word statement, the governor referred to the 32-year-old Leopold as "one of the state's most notorious criminals."

Leopold has been a prison inmate for 33 years. The action

came on his plea that Stratton commute his present 85 year sentence to 64 years—which would have made possible an unconditional release before the year's end.

Chain Letter-Type Scheme Investigated

SALEM — A chain letter-type scheme involving U.S. Savings Bonds now in operation in this area is being investigated by postal authorities.

Salem Postmaster Albert Gragg said Tuesday that the scheme had been brought to his attention and that he had referred it to postal inspectors.

Involved in the plan is the mailing of receipts for U.S. Savings Bonds, although the list of names is passed from hand to hand.

The lists contain 11 names and the letter which accompanies it claims eventual receipt of bonds with a present value of \$38,000 and maturity value of \$51,000.

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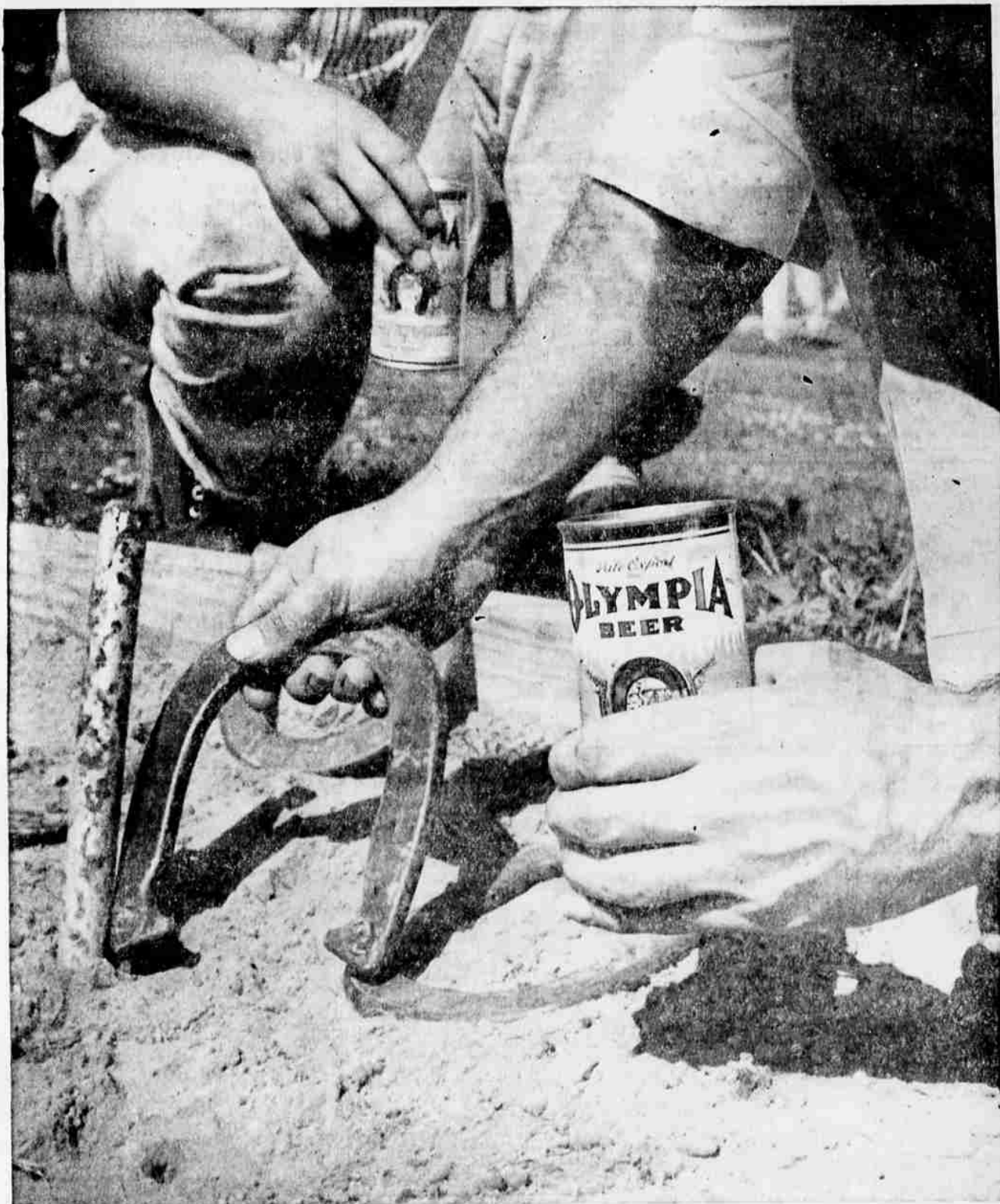


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
