Committee Kills Neuberger Plan

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate Agriculture Committee Wednesday killed a proposal by Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore) to withdraw government price supports from tobacco.

Sen. Talmadge (D-Ga.), a member of the committee, said the action was taken on his motion at a closed door committee meeting.

Neuberger, a nonsmoker, introduced a bill that would have removed price supports and all other government aids for tobacco. He said he proposed this because some scientists believe there is a link between cigarette smoking and cancer.

Tobacco now is classed as one of the six price-supported basic crops. The others are cotton, wheat, corn, rice and peanuts.
Talmadge said he offered a motion to indefinitely postpone committee action on Neuberger's bill. He said this was approved unanimously.

PRIEST SENTENCED

JERUSALEM, Israel Sector (AP)—The Jerusalem district court sentenced Father Joachim El Anthony, former head of the Coptic Christian community in Israel, to 12 years in prison for espionage Wednesday.
The court was told incriminating material was found on the priest as he was returning from Jordan through the official border post at Jerusalem's Mandelbaum Gate last October.

Police State Tactics Claimed

PORTLAND (AP)—Delegates at the closing session of the Western States Conference of Machinists Wednesday adopted a resolution saying "police state tactics" were used by the Senate rackets investigating committee.
In another resolution, delegates went on record against the appointment of former Interior Secretary Douglas McKay as United States chairman of the International Joint Commission.
In condemning the rackets committee, a resolution was approved which said "The objectives sought by the committee and their supporters would, if passed into law, establish a semi-dictatorship in this country."
Other resolutions voiced approval of a high federal Hells Canyon dam and the civil rights bill. The resolution on civil rights said Oregon senators should vote for the bill pending in congress "without any crippling amendments."
