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Blasted Plane Up To Federal Airline Probers

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. — It remains for government and airline investigators to solve the mystery of what ripped a big hole in the side of an airliner and buried a passenger to his death.

A coroner's inquest Thursday shed no new light on the puzzle. The jurors heard eight witnesses and deliberated one hour and 30 minutes before finding that heavily insured Saul F. Binstock, 62-year-old retired North Hollywood, Calif., jeweler, died of forceful ejection from the plane, flying 10,000 feet over California's Mojave Desert.

Four of the nine jurors advised the coroner that they believed Binstock set off the blast, but they didn't say how they thought it was accomplished.

The Civil Aeronautics Board, Western Air Lines, the FBI and others still are investigating the July 25 incident.

The CAB says its report will be released in two or three weeks, after laboratory tests are completed.

Neuberger Urges Lower Payments

WASHINGTON — Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Thursday joined nine other senators in requesting President Eisenhower to launch at once the new, lower down payment provisions of the recent housing law.

The bill was signed July 12, but apparently is waiting upon a go-ahead signal from the Federal Housing Administration, which is empowered to first determine if the new provisions are in the public interest.

The new rate schedule would drop the cash down payment on a \$10,000 home from \$700 to \$300. Other comparable reductions: \$12,000 home from \$1,200 to \$600; \$15,000 home from \$1,500 to \$750; and an \$18,000 home from \$2,700 to \$1,800.

One government official has said there is a substantial case for lower down payments, but warned they also carry the threat of inflation.

President Unhappy Over Vote On Jury Trials

passed the bill much more closely tailored to the administration draft.

Hagerty did not dispute a newsman's suggestion that Eisenhower would hardly accept a bill which, in his opinion, weakened the American judiciary.

Potter reported on Eisenhower's reaction after a call at the White House to discuss another matter with the President. Without elaborating, Potter told newsmen "the President is damn unhappy" about losing the fight over the jury trial amendment.

The Senate previously had killed a key section of the administration bill, which would have given the federal government new enforcement powers in civil rights cases other than those involving the right to vote.

Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex.) majority leader, said he hoped for final Senate action on the bill by Tuesday or Wednesday, indicating he does not expect Southern Democrats to talk at length against it.

Johnson said the Senate will not meet Saturday as had been planned tentatively, but will return to consideration of the bill Monday. A number of lesser proposed changes still await action.

Five of the seven prospective House conferees voted against the jury trial amendment and there is no reason to believe they will change their views. The other two didn't vote.

The House conferees will be headed by Chairman Celler (D-N.Y.) of the Judiciary Committee, a vigorous foe of the amendment. Conferees vote as a unit, with a majority determining how the House and Senate votes shall be cast in a conference committee.

Terms In Prison Meted Slayers Of Negro Youth

CHICAGO, Ill. — Five white teenagers convicted of murder in the hammer slaying of a Negro youth were sentenced Thursday to prison on terms ranging from 14 to 30 years. Two others have been granted new trials.

The youths were among 14 originally named in an indictment as the slayers of Alvin Palmer, 17-year-old high school student. He was struck down last March 11 as he stood at a South Side corner waiting for a bus.

The five members of the gang called "The Rebels" were convicted June 29 after a bench trial before Chief Justice Wilbert F. Crowley of criminal court.

Another of the gang, Joseph Schwartz, 18, who admitted beating Palmer with a ball-peen hammer, was sentenced earlier to 30 years in prison.

Judge Crowley Thursday sentenced Ronald Rybka, 17, to 30 years. Sentences of 14 years were ordered by Crowley for Thomas Andrew Budz, 17, and Edward Gorski, 17.

Senate Votes SBA Allocation

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted unanimously Friday to revive the Small Business Administration (SBA) and give it 75 million dollars of new lending funds for another year of operation.

Sen. Clark (D-Pa) floor manager for the bill, said House leaders have promised quick action to send the bill on to the White House.

The Senate agreed unanimously Thursday night to put aside the rights bill for an hour Friday while acting on the SBA extension.

The SBA's authority to function expired at midnight Wednesday and its loan operations ground to a halt. President Eisenhower urged quick action to keep it in business.

2-Year-Old Boy Mauled To Death By Husky Dog

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — A 2-year-old boy was mauled and killed Wednesday night when he wandered into the reach of a chained husky dog at the village of Six Mile, on the Richardson Highway south of here.

Mario Antony Ferraro, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mario Ferraro, died of a throat wound inflicted by the dog, owned by Harold Allen. Allen's young son, Donnie, discovered the torn body.

The U. S. Commissioner's office said no official action will be taken until a police report of the tragedy is received.

Two Persons Killed When Auto Crashes Into Truck

GOLD HILL, Ore. — An automobile crashed into the rear end of a parked lumber truck at Gold Hill early Friday and the two persons in the car were killed.

They were identified as M. C. Hancock of Gold Hill and his wife. The truck, owned by Marks Lumber Co. of Grants Pass, was parked at the intersection of Highway 234 and the old Highway 99 at the main intersection of Gold Hill. Trucks normally stop there to check brakes and lights.

An evangelism tent is scheduled to go up in the Roseburg area this Sunday for a two-week series of gospel meetings.

The 30 by 60-foot tent will be located just west of the Huerfano School. The tent meetings are under the sponsorship of the Christian and Missionary Alliance Church. They will be directed by the Rev. Arthur Hoenisch, local pastor.

The spotlight at the meetings will be on "The Country Preacher" evangelist Demcy Mylar and his wife, Ginny Lee, of Vancouver, Wash.

The Mylars are a husband-and-wife gospel team which preaches and sings the Christian message in a dramatic way. The Rev. Mr. Mylar was called to the ministry at the age of 14. His wife, a singer, is known as "the girl with the smiling song."

The public is invited to all services. They will be held nightly at 7:30 through Aug. 18. Each Sunday, the Sunday school at 9:45 a.m. and the 11 a.m. worship service will be held in the tent and not at the Labor Temple auditorium where they are usually conducted.

Postal Workers Resort To Prayer For Pay Raise

Postal workers — honor bound not to strike — held prayer meetings throughout the nation yesterday, seeking "divine guidance" for a bill pending in Congress which would raise their pay.

The House has passed a bill to add \$546 a year to the \$1,340 average salary of the nation's 518,000 postal workers. The bill is awaiting action in the Senate.

President Eisenhower strongly opposes the bill in its present form. The prayer meetings were suggested by President William C. Daugherty of the National Assn. of Letter Carriers which claims 110,000 members.

Home Loan Interest Rates Increase Seen

WASHINGTON — Another increase in FIA home loan interest rates is imminent, congressional sources said today.

They said they expect a boost from 5 to 5 1/2 per cent in the interest rate to be announced soon along with approval of lower down payments and new controls on the amount of discount — or premium — which may be charged borrowers on mortgage loans insured by the Federal Housing Administration.

No time was mentioned in connection with the rate increase, but reports were current that an announcement might be made before September. Firm loan commitments already made presumably would not be affected.

Ruth Hedrick Dies At Salem

Ruth A. Hedrick, Drain, a life-long resident of northern Douglas County, died at a Salem hospital Wednesday at the age of 61.

She was born at Elkton Sept. 22, 1895, the daughter of the late Eustice and Sarah Schad, and was married at Roseburg in 1930 to Roy F. Hedrick who survives her. Mrs. Hedrick was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors besides her husband include three sons, LeRoy and Frank of Drain, and Ralph Sawyers of Elkton; three grandchildren; three brothers, Phillip and Elmer Schad of Elkton, and Jess Schad of Portland; and one sister, Mrs. Annie Madison of Kellie.

Funeral services will be held at the Methodist Church at Elkton Saturday at 2 p.m. with vault interment at the Sunnydale cemetery near Drain. Mills Funeral Service of Drain is in charge of arrangements.

Morse Labels Ike 'Immoral' Politically

WASHINGTON — Sen. Morse (D-Ore.) told the Senate Friday President Eisenhower is "politically immoral" and violates the spirit of the conflicts of interest law by accepting gifts worth "thousands and thousands of dollars."

"I think the President of the United States sets a very bad example," the Oregon Democrat said. "He is not going to acquit himself by saving he was within the letter of the law."

Morse called attention to the President's comments at his news conference Wednesday when questioned on a series of articles that estimated Eisenhower's personal financial worth "at about a million dollars."

The President drew a laugh by replying that if the author of the articles "will offer me a million dollars to sell out, he is going to make a sale in a hurry."

Morse said these and other comments show the "Eisenhower administration will permit acts of immorality within the limits of the law."

There was no immediate comment from the White House on Morse's remarks.

The Rev. Rinke A. Feenstra, former minister of the Dillard-Winston Methodist Church, will be the guest speaker at "family night" at the church this Sunday at 6 p.m.

The Rev. Mr. Feenstra, now pastor at Falls City, Ore., will greet friends in the social hall before the meeting.

Meanwhile, the present pastor, the Rev. William O. Walker, returned recently from the College of Puget Sound in Tacoma, Wash., where he attended a week-long pastors' graduate training school. Methodist ministers from Idaho, Oregon and Washington were in attendance.

Also returning to Dillard recently were Mrs. Walker who attended the "missions school" at Camp Magruder near Rockaway. She was in charge of the music for the annual conference of the Oregon Conference Wesleyan Service Guild.

Blast Rocks 6-Car Subway Train; Many Hospitalized

PHILADELPHIA — A blast rocked a six-car Broad St. subway train during the morning rush hour Friday, injuring scores and causing panic in the underground tube.

The three hospitals to which the injured were taken said none had been hurt seriously. Many suffered cuts from smashed subway train windows. Others were treated for shock.

The Philadelphia Transportation Co. said the blast came after the motor of the lead car on the passenger-jammed train short circuited, causing a circuit breaker to explode.

The blast and minor fire in the lead car caused many of the passengers to smash windows in the subway cars and scramble out to the Erie Ave. platform. Many wandered to the street level and were given sedatives at nearby drug stores.

Edward Caswell, 40-year-old motorman, said the blast derailed the lead car, which was jammed with work-bound passengers, many of them standing.

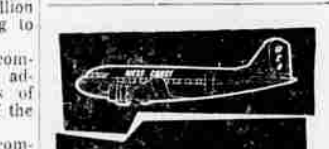
Caswell said he was temporarily blinded by the flash from the explosion, but recovered quickly and opened the subway train doors.

A fire alarm was sounded shortly after the blast occurred and fire equipment rushed to the busy intersection, traffic was disrupted, both on the surface and in the subway itself.
