Legal Tangles Snarl Confidential Trial

LOS ANGELES — The much-ballyhooed criminal libel case against Confidential Magazine had its premiere Friday — complete with Hollywood stars, cameras and adoring fans. The case got off to a slow start, however, because of legal technicalities and a courtroom miscap. When the session ended the selection of the jury had started, but apparently it will be well into next week before 12 jurors are chosen. The trial has been recessed until Monday.

Eager fans jammed the courtroom and corridors to catch a glimpse of witnesses such as actors Tab Hunter, Buddy Baer and Alan Nixon, the former husband of actress Marie Wilson; Mrs. Josephine Dillon, Clark Gable's former wife, and screen extra Stella Shoulet. Defendants are Confidential, its sister publication, Whisper, Robert Harrison, publisher; Fred and Marjorie Meade, operators of Hollywood Research, Inc., Confidential's West Coast office; four other individuals and four corporations involved in the production and sales of the magazines.

Minister Of Youth Picked By Church

Dewayne H. Howell has been elected to serve as minister of youth at First Christian Church in Roseburg. Girard Not To Pay Visit

MAEBASHI, Japan — A Japanese attorney said Saturday U.S. Army Specialist William S. Girard has decided "at least for the time being" not to pay a visit to the family of a Japanese woman shellpicker he is charged with slaying. Itsu Hayashi, Girard's lawyer, said Girard's scheduled visit to the family of Mrs. Naka Sakai to express his regrets over her death in the Jan. 30 shooting incident at Somagahara firing range was cancelled because "Mr. Sakai has told us indirectly that he is not yet prepared to receive him (Girard)."

Girard goes on trial Aug. 26. In Japan it is customary for someone charged with a crime or involved in an accident to visit the victim or the victim's relatives to apologize. In many cases they take along "sympathy" money. In the past, several Americans tried by Japanese courts have followed this procedure and have been acquitted or received very light sentences. To appear repentant in the eyes of a Japanese court is considered helpful to the defendant.

Portland Man Passes While Visiting Here

Alfred James Dawson, 71, of Portland, died at a local hospital this morning while in Roseburg on a visit with his son, James Y. Dawson. He had been visiting here about two weeks.

The victim was born in Birkenhead, England, on June 1, 1886. He was a retired automobile dealer in Portland.

He is survived by his son and one daughter, Mrs. Charles Raimondi of Portland. The body will be sent to Portland to Holman & Sons Funeral Home for services, under the direction of the Long & Orr Mortuary.

Second Man Arraigned On Kidnaping Charges

EUGENE — A 35-year-old man was arraigned here Friday on a charge of kidnaping, and his bond was set at \$7,500 by Dist. Judge Edward Leavy. Leavy set 1:30 p.m. Monday as the time for the preliminary hearing of James Adam Repp, who is charged with a part in the abduction of two elderly persons Tuesday from a Jasper, Ore., store.

The other man indicted on a charge of kidnaping in the case is William Harry Eckels, 35. Both men were taken into custody at Tillamook shortly after the release of Mrs. Alda Lorene Wright, 62, and Thomas Aubrey, 81.

11 Right Wing Hungry Politicians Arrested

BUDAPEST — The arrest of 11 right wing Hungarian politicians by the Communist regime was announced Saturday. Three of them were said to be connected with Josef Cardinal Mindszenty. It was the second time this week that the names of jailed persons were linked with the cardinal, a refugee at the U.S. legation here since Russia crushed the Hungarian revolt last November. On Thursday the Interior Ministry announced that it had completed investigation of a major group of "counterrevolutionary priests," including the cardinal's former secretary.

Glendale Girl Crowned Queen Of GP Festival

GRANTS PASS — Sally Jo Thompson, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Thompson of Glendale was crowned Queen Gladys XVII in ceremonies on the Grants Pass High School football field Friday night. The queen and her court of six princesses from Grants Pass, Rogue River and Glendale and Illinois Valley high schools will rule over the 1957 Gladiolus Festival to be held in Grants Pass City Park August 16 to 18. The 1957 festival will include the Pacific International Gladiolus Flower Show; a water sports exhibition; a street carnival staged by local organizations; and on Saturday, August 17, a lighted boat float parade on the Rogue River at the park. The queen is a graduate of Glendale High School, where she is valedictorian last spring. She plans on attending Oregon State College in September. While attending school she held offices in the Girl's Pop Club and Girl's Athletic Assn. She also served as secretary of the senior class.

Robert Errion Gets Sentence For Mail Fraud

PORTLAND — A man who was accused of mail fraud and securities act violations in setting up two plywood cooperatives was sentenced Friday to 12 years in federal prison.

He is Edgar Robert Errion, a 56-year-old promoter who has called Seattle, Salem and Portland his home. The sentence was imposed here by U.S. District Judge Gus Solomon, who told Errion, "You siphoned off thousands of dollars from little investors, many of whom, like yourself, had larceny in their hearts."

Errion earlier had pleaded guilty to two counts charging mail fraud and securities act violations in selling \$350,000 worth of memberships in the Mount Hood Hardboard and Plywood Cooperative at Estacada, Ore.

Friday he pleaded guilty to two counts of an 11-count indictment charging mail fraud in setting up the Beaver Plywood Cooperative at Salem. Solomon then dismissed the remaining 18 counts in the two indictments. "You have made many widows destitute," Solomon told Errion. "Society is entitled to protection from such as you."

Solomon Friday handed down a 15-month prison term to Frederick Alan Wright, 42, Salem, who had pleaded guilty to mail fraud and securities violations in sale of Estacada memberships. Four other persons earlier were convicted of mail fraud violations in the case, and sentenced to terms ranging from one to seven years.

Russia Hesitant At Making Reply To Open Skies Plan

LONDON — Secretary of State Dulles' outline of a two-part Western plan for air and ground arms inspection of the Soviet Union and most of North America and Europe has drawn a cautious first reaction from the Russians. Dulles flew back to Washington to report to President Eisenhower after terming the Soviet reaction "not as bad as had been feared and about as good as had been hoped."

Soviet delegate Valerian Zorin told the U.N. disarmament subcommittee the plan presented yesterday by Dulles would receive careful study. But he suggested that it was unfair to Russia and favored the West. Under the Western proposals, Russia and the West would exchange permission for inspectors to search on the ground and by air for warlike moves. The first proposed area would take in all the Soviet Union, North America above the Rio Grande and Europe except for a fringe of Ireland and southern parts of Spain and Portugal, Italy, Albania, Greece and Turkey.

He was graduated from the University of Oregon in 1951 with a Bachelor's degree. The native of Kalispell, Mont., is transferring his membership in the Salem Junior Chamber of Commerce to Roseburg. He is residing at 781 NE Alameda Ave. with his wife, Marilyn, and two children, Robin 4, and Michael 1.

Surgeon General Warns Of Asian Flu Danger

WASHINGTON — This country faces the "very definite probability" of a large outbreak of Asian influenza this fall or winter, Surgeon General Leroy E. Burney says. But he reported yesterday that production is being rushed on a vaccine to combat the disease. He urged full use of it when it becomes available starting next month. The head of the Public Health Service said there have been about 11,000 cases of the new strain of flu reported in the United States. He added undoubtedly there has been "widespread seeding of virus throughout the country."

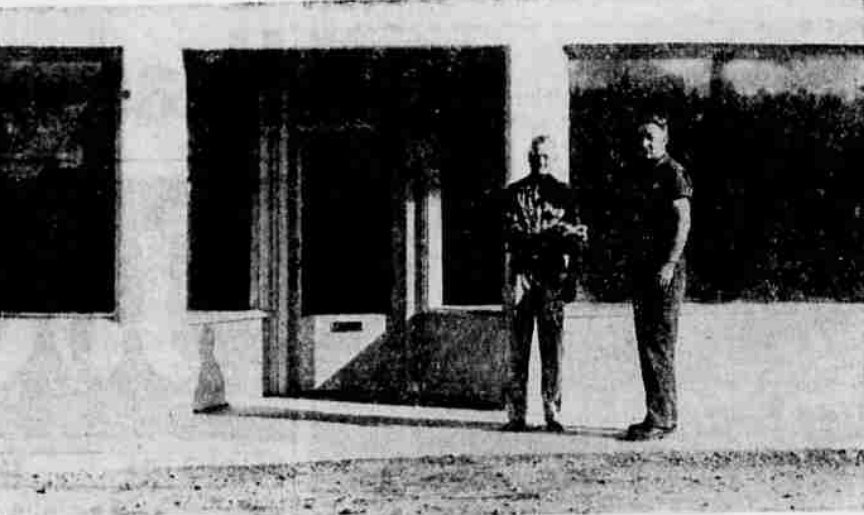
British Ground Troops Strike In Muscat, Oman

MANAMA, Bahrain — British ground troops and armored cars today moved by sea and air into revolt-hit Muscat and Oman to aid the pro-British sultan. Reports from London said a detachment of Scottish Highland troops already had entered the sultan's restive Arabian Peninsula domain. A foreign office spokesman said the troops were being used "in support of the sultan's forces."

Reports reaching the British capital said seasoned Cameronian troops had reached Ibbi, a fort in west Oman still loyal to the sultan. The rebels have claimed the fort, manned by British-led Trucial Oman scouts, had been surrounded.

GRENADE WOUNDS FIVE

ALGIERS — French authorities Saturday an Algerian rebel band hurled grenades at an army scout car on the Tunisian border, wounded five Frenchmen, and then fled into Tunisian territory. The incident occurred Friday. Other French reports said 13 rebels who entered Algeria from Tunisia were intercepted and killed.

Use Of Building Is Donated As Glide Community Center

Glide now has a community building. A three-year project of the Glide Kiwanis Club to establish such a community center was realized this week when it obtained a building from Mack Brown Sr., a Glide realtor. Brown donated the building for use by the club for a six-month period rent free. The club plans to make the 30 by 100-foot concrete block structure available for many community affairs, including Kiwanis activities. Hopes for the future are also to develop it into a teen-age center. A fee for use of the building will be set to cover the cost of maintenance and utilities. Such a fee will also cover the rent of the building if it is used after the end of the rent-free period. The building has been painted inside and out, but the club plans to do additional painting and renovation.

VIENNA, Ga. — Former Sen. Walter F. George, near death from a heart ailment, is "showing remarkable endurance," his physician said Saturday. Dr. M. L. "Alloy" friend and physician of the George family, reported "not a great deal of change" in the condition of the 79-year-old statesman and President Eisenhower's special ambassador to NATO. The physician added that "we can certainly say he is losing ground. He is running a high fever and his pulse is more rapid and weaker." Malloy had reported Friday night that George had lost too much strength to rally.
