The Glendale school board is preparing a written school board policy which will be ready next month, reports correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

The board spent most of the last meeting working on the policy which will be available for anyone in the district to see at any time.

The next regular meeting of the board will be Wednesday. Meetings are being held every first and third Wednesday of the month.

Work Complete
In other action at the last board meeting, it was reported that the repair work on the elementary school building which suffered a dry rot condition has been completed. The building will be inspected by the school board and the architect before final approval of the job is given.

It was also reported that the installation of a new elementary school boiler is scheduled for next week. Board members Sid Perry and Bernie Halverson reported they had made a preliminary census of Lower Ruben Road so a decision can be made on whether a school bus run is necessary there. They plan to recheck the census about Aug. 15.

Work Progress Reported
Supt. Marlen Yoder reported on progress of work to the school grounds.

The board accepted the application of Mrs. Glen Austin as assistant cook.

Plans were made to survey the school property near the elementary school and divide it into lots to be put up for sale.

Finally, the cafeteria program was discussed, and it was decided to buy bread products from Fluhrer's Bakery.

Coolidge Homestead Turned Over To State Of Vermont

PLYMOUTH, Vt. — The Coolidge homestead — where the 30th President of the United States was sworn in by lamp-light 34 years ago — was turned over to the state of Vermont Saturday.

John Coolidge, son of the former president presented the deed to the property to Gov. Joseph B. Johnson at ceremonies which drew hundreds of spectators, and prominent figures from the political world.

The ceremonies were in direct contrast to the simple scene in the parlor of the small white-painted Coolidge home in the early morning dark on Aug. 3, 1923.

There was no pomp as Calvin Coolidge placed his hand on the family Bible and took the oath of office as President, administered by his father, Col. John C. Coolidge, a village notary.

The only light then was a single oil lamp.

There were only three witnesses to the 2:47 a.m. oath-taking, which made Coolidge the President, succeeding Warren G. Harding, who died unexpectedly in San Francisco.

Red China Attacks Aim May Be For New Church

HONG KONG — Communist China Saturday accused the Vatican of being "an instrument of imperialism."

"Politically and economically, it is now controlled by American imperialism and serves its aggressive policy," the newspaper Peiping People's Daily charged in an editorial broadcast by Peiping Radio.

The official Communist New China News Agency said Friday Red China's Catholics have formed an independent group that will cut all political and economic ties with the Vatican.

Two Accidents Cost 25 Lives, Injure 64

MADRID — Two accidents, a train crash and a truck wreck took 25 lives yesterday and injured at least 64 persons in Spain.

Four cars of a troop train were destroyed five miles south of Madrid when the train hit a locomotive. Seventeen soldiers returning from maneuvers were killed and at least 64 injured.

A truck carrying 20 women back to Pamplona from a nearby religious sanctuary overturned, killing eight. Most were nuns of the Good Shepherd order.

SAILOR AT SEAFAR

Seaman Bufford H. Jones, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bufford N. Jones, Roseburg, is aboard the naval escort vessel USS Weeden, which will visit the Seattle Seafair next weekend.

Red Skelton Not Pleased By Events On Tour Of Europe

NEW YORK — Comedian Red Skelton returned Monday from a three-week tour of Europe with his leukemia-afflicted son and sobriety told newsmen.

"Don't ever take a sick boy on a world pilgrimage."

Although Skelton and his son, Richard, 9, struck happy poses for photographers at Idlewild Airport, the father did not smile as he answered questions about certain aspects of the trip abroad.

"Everywhere we went, morning to night there were 50 to 300 people around telling us what to do," Skelton said.

The blood disease Richard has been suffering from has been termed incurable. Skelton took the youngster to Europe to give him a chance to "see some of the wonderful places he had read about."

At the airport here, Skelton said he left London abruptly because of criticism of his tour by what he termed a "scandal sheet."

"It made me sick," Skelton said.

Dulles Says Open Skies Plan Would Lessen Dangers

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles said Saturday acceptance by Russia of Western proposals for international aerial inspection would lessen "the danger of general war."

Dulles returned in mid-afternoon from a week's intensive negotiations in London. These talks resulted Friday in presentation to Russia of the new inspection proposal, including "open skies" over the United States and Russia.

The secretary said he planned to talk promptly with President Eisenhower by telephone.

With respect to the Western proposal, Dulles said, "it is now up to the Soviet Union to respond."

He recalled that Soviet representative Valerian Zorin had said in London Friday that Moscow would give the proposals careful consideration.

"I hope," Dulles said, "that the Soviet government will realize that the risk of surprise system makes us all more safe and which facilitates reduction of armaments as much to their interest as it is to ours."

If the Soviet Union accepts the Western proposal, Dulles said, "the risk of surprise attack will be greatly diminished."

"And since a major war is not apt to be launched unless the aggressor can count on surprise, the danger of general war will have lessened," he added. "Then it will be more possible safely to reduce the burden of armaments."

U. S. Yields To Allies On Red China Trade Link

WASHINGTON — The United States has agreed under pressure from its allies to ease still further Western trade controls on shipments to Red China.

American representatives, acting under State Department instructions, approved this move at a meeting last week of 15 key trading nations in Paris.

The action frees limited quantities and types of machine tools, chemicals and metal products for shipment to the China mainland.

The United States government will continue to ban all American trade with the Chinese Reds, however, under its existing economic diplomatic boycott of the Peiping regime.

Spain Cracks Down On Any Rise In Prices

MADRID — The Spanish government announced Saturday measures to halt unauthorized price rises, which have brought rumblings of discontent throughout the country.

The Ministry of the Interior directed Spain's 50 provincial governors to study recent price increases and to take immediate action where they were unjustified.

During the past two weeks food increases varied from 50 to 150 per cent, although this is the season when they should be the lowest.

Assessment Of Oregon Utilities Upped 11 1/2 Pct.

PORTLAND — The State Tax Commission assesses the value of utility company property in Oregon at \$289,287,409—a gain of 30 million dollars over last year's figure.

Chairman S. W. Horn said the 11 1/2 per cent increase resulted from expansion of facilities by utility firms.

U. S. Expresses Keen Interest In Russ-Tito Talks

WASHINGTON — U. S. Officials expressed keen interest Saturday in the Moscow announcement that President Tito of Yugoslavia and Russia's Nikita Khrushchev agreed on closer "cooperation" in a meeting this week.

Authorities were inclined to believe that whatever the specific steps worked out may be, Tito has succeeded in preserving his position as an independent Communist leader free of Moscow control.

But they said evidence bearing on this point would require the most careful study.

News of the two-day meeting which occurred in Communist Romania came as a surprise here although something of the kind was not wholly unexpected.

It was announced last Tuesday that Russia had agreed to go through with a 250-million-dollar economic aid pledge to Yugoslavia, on which it had backed down last winter after the anti-Communist uprising in Hungary.

The Soviet action indicated a substantial improvement in Soviet-Yugoslav relations.

Officials said furthermore that an effort to overcome the Soviet-Yugoslav split was expected as a result of the Kremlin purge in which Khrushchev, the Soviet Communist boss, ousted former Foreign Minister Molotov and other critics of his policies.

The issue of relations between Russia and Yugoslavia was one of the policy disputes involved in the fight within the Kremlin.

Pittsburgh Bakery Hit By \$125,000 Fire

PITTSBURGH — Fire swept through the basement and first floor of a bakery warehouse on Pittsburgh's North Side early Monday, causing an estimated \$125,000 damage and injuring 12 firemen.

Deputy Fire Chief Charles J. McDermott estimated the damage to the J. R. Lloyd Co., a wholesale bakery firm.

WAR VETERAN DIES

FT. THOMAS, Ky. — Brig. Gen. Dana True Merrill ret., 80, a veteran of the Spanish-American War and World War I, who retired in 1940 and served as civil defense coordinator for the Greater Cincinnati area during World War II, died Saturday.

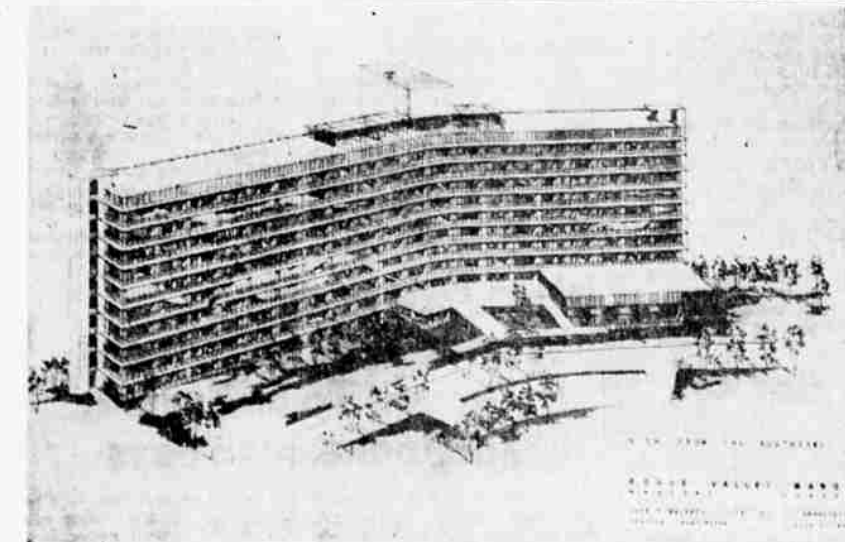
