Portland finally won its first doubleheader of the year, and climbed out of the Coast League cellar Sunday with a 2-1 and 4-2 victories over Sacramento.

It was the first time the Portlanders have won both games of a doubleheader since the team left Portland a half game ahead of Sacramento.

Portland defeated Mike Coen of Sacramento in the first game, 2-1, pinning a 10th defeat on Coen against 2 wins. Coen pitched well, but was a victim of a first-inning error, when the Sacramento infield booted away a doubleplay ball, opening the way for both Portland runs. Coen blanked Portland thereafter. He gave up only three hits and struck out nine men.

Portland also swept a doubleheader, downing Los Angeles, 6-3 and 8-7.

San Francisco held first place, but other clubs changed position. San Francisco maintains 11 1/2 games ahead of the Coast League cellar, but changes mark the rest of the standings.

Vancouver knocked San Diego out of second place by winning Tuesday 3-2 and 1-0, the Padres tumbling to fourth.

Hollywood hung on, just one percentage point behind second place Vancouver, by splitting a pair of extra-inning games with San Francisco. The Stars won a 12-inning first game 4-3 while the Seals took a scheduled seven-inning nightcap 7-6 in nine innings.

Joe Frazier's 11th home of the season accounted for all three Vancouver runs and the first game victory over San Diego.

Montie Charlie Beamon and Padre Hank Aguirre duled for eight scoreless innings in the nightcap. Dolan Nichols replaced the weary Aguirre with a 2-0.
