Mamie Undergoes Operation For 'Benign' Condition

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower underwent an operation Tuesday for a "benign" condition. The White House said the operation was "not serious."

The First Lady, 60, was reported to be in "good condition" following the surgery.

The operation was performed at Walter Reed Hospital by an Army gynecologist, Dr. Humbert L. Riva.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said the operation was about 8 a.m. and the surgery was concluded two hours later.

While the operation was in progress, the President was meeting at the White House with Republican congressional leaders.

The President talked by phone to Mrs. Eisenhower Monday night and again Tuesday morning before her operation.

Hagerty said he was not able to describe the actual nature of the operation beyond saying it was for a "benign" condition, that it was not a tumor.

Hagerty said it has been known for "quite a little time" that the First Lady would require surgery. He added that it was not an emergency operation and that Mrs. Eisenhower had not been in pain.

Eight-Car Collision Sends Seven Persons To Hospital

Rain-Slickened Road Blamed For Big Mixup

A rain-slickened roadway and a blind curve on Highway 99 south of Myrtle Creek Monday afternoon led to a spectacular eight-car traffic melee in which seven persons were reported injured.

The accident scene was the same at which three other persons were injured in a two-car collision Saturday night just north of Tri-City.

Injured and taken to Myrtle Creek Hospital were:

Mary Louise Moreland, 37, Canyonville, who was cut and bruised.

Shirley Lois Van Marter, 19, Canyonville, cut and bruised, released from the hospital after observation.

Robert Gordon Carley, Victoria, B.C., and his son, James Patrick, 11, cut and bruised.

Mrs. Frederick Titmus, 52, Hope, B.C., believed to be the most seriously injured.

Frederick Titmus, 62, strain of neck and chest.

Wesley James Haynes, 59, Glendale, head injuries.

Mrs. Titmus was described by the attending physician as "rallying" after received a skull fracture, fractured left arm and multiple lacerations of the head and face. Carley's injuries were to his head and right abdomen. The boy

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Four Local Youths Committed To Jail After Night Ruckus

Four Roseburg youths who allegedly challenged the authority of Roseburg police found themselves lodged in the county jail last night facing a large number of charges.

Police reported that when an officer placed the driver of a car under arrest at the Greyhound bus depot the affray started. The officer was aided by a merchant patrolman and when two other boys joined the hassle reinforcements were summoned and three other policemen joined in rounding up the boys.

David Victor Flury, 17, 1611 NW Calkins Rd., identified as the driver of the car, faces the bulk of the charges. He was booked for speeding, illegal possession of intoxicants, reckless driving, curfew violation and disorderly conduct. Bail totaling \$565 was set as the amount which must be posted before release. Flury also was cited for running a red light.

George T. Traves, 17, Box 1285, Roseburg, was charged with curfew violation and disorderly conduct. Bail totaling \$565 was set.

Police said the affair started when an officer saw Flury driving at what was claimed to be 50 miles per hour on SE Stephens Street. When he stopped behind the bus depot, officers reported, he asked to produce his driver's license. Officers claim Flury then became abusive and violent, and that he was handcuffed with the assistance of a merchant patrolman.

While this was going on, according to officers, Martin left the car and went into the cafe. He was brought out and placed under arrest.

Drake and Traves got into the act, officers stated, when they came up to the officers and threatened to fight if Flury was not released. They later ran but were caught by the reinforced police contingent.

Shell Co. Stations Equal Price Drops

The three-cent price reduction in regular gasoline at most Roseburg area retail stations over the week-end was followed up and equalled by Shell stations in the area, Monday afternoon.

After holding to their original price drop of three cents made almost three months ago, the Shell stations trimmed their prices Monday to correspond with the 30.9 rates at most other stations here.

Shell held the line at 33.9 since their initial drop May 10, until Monday. Most other stations resisted a decrease from the original 36.9 level until three weeks ago, when led by Union Oil Co. stations, they met the Shell price line.

Last weekend, most other stations dropped their prices another three cents to 30.9 while Shell held on to its 33.9 level.

Dealers were uncommitted on what further, if any, price drops were in the making. While the line held at the 30.9 mark for most stations and at 29.4 at others, the prospect of another drop was not being ignored by any dealer in the all-out price war embracing central and southern Douglas County areas.

Robert Keith Simmons Surrenders On Charge

Robert Keith Simmons, 33, 731 SE Stephens St., surrendered to a warrant at the police station Monday night. He is charged with leaving the scene of an accident without leaving his name and address.

Signing the complaint against Simmons was Ted Williams, 543 Rice St., who claims Simmons damaged James Edward Williams' bicycle with his car and failed to stop. Williams charges that the accident occurred Monday afternoon when Simmons backed his car from a service station and struck the bicycle.

3 Indictments Against Langley Are Dismissed

PORTLAND (AP)—Three indictments against former Multnomah County Dist. Atty. William Langley were dismissed Monday by Circuit Judge Charles M. Redding.

Malfeasance in office was charged in two of the indictments and the other accused Langley of obstructing public justice by permitting gambling. That indictment named Joseph McLaughlin and Thomas Maloney along with Langley.

British Ground Forces Prepare Oman Strike

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP)—British jets swept over rebel-held territory in the interior of Oman Tuesday as ground forces prepared to strike.

The Royal Air Force Venoms and Meteors flew eight sorties against the forces of the rebel Imam of Oman Monday and claimed to have damaged two vehicles.

(At London, Britain's top military leaders conferred on plans for a quick end to the rebellion which they feared threatened to embroil their country in a new Middle East crisis.)

(While the meetings were going on in an atmosphere of rising criticism, Arab League representatives both in Cairo and the United Nations were weighing the prospects of appealing the Oman rebels' case to the world organization.)

(Critics in London are accusing the British Foreign and War Offices of mishandling and underestimating the troubles in the Arabian peninsula.)

The ground forces were reportedly drawn up for an attack against the Nizwa fort, which the British believe is headquarters of the Imam's troops.

The rebels are fighting for a religious leader who is challenging the authority of the Sultan of Muscat of Oman. The sultan has asked for British help to put down the revolt.

The British, with Oman scouts and the Oman army's northern frontier regiment, are under the command of Brig. Jimmy Roberts. He has set up a field headquarters supplied entirely by RAF aircraft.

Local Shop Prowler Escapes Despite Search

A prowler seen on the roof of the Style Shop, 615 SE Jackson St., Monday night escaped despite a heavy concentration of law officers summoned.

The prowler was spotted by John Farnsworth, a city fireman, who called city police. All city and county patrols were notified and buildings in the area were thoroughly searched.

House Committee Slashes Money Measure, Scores Air Force For Heavy Spending

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Appropriations Committee slashed \$279,158,380 from a supplemental money bill Tuesday and told the Air Force not to make its new academy "a monument to governmental extravagance."

It approved \$1,581,590,587 of the \$1,860,748,967 President Eisenhower had requested for miscellaneous programs, mainly for military construction.

Six Of Family Killed As Light Plane Crashes

MONROE, La. (AP)—A grandfather, his three sons and two grandchildren were killed Monday when the plane in which they were flying to a family reunion crashed in an empty field.

The single engine aircraft apparently stalled and dove into the soft earth, almost burying itself.

Killed were the grandfather, J. W. Johnson, 73, Monroe; William Noble Johnson, 45, and his 17-year-old daughter, Zanastalia Audrey G. Johnson, 43, Clifton, N.J., and his 5-year-old son, Robert; and A. O. Johnson, 52, San Luis Obispo, Calif., pilot and owner of the plane.

The plane left Little Rock, Ark., earlier in the day. The group was to land at Monroe and proceed to Bastrop for a family reunion.

Douglas County Timber Days Celebration Slated

Douglas County Timber Days at Sutherland will get under way at 9 p.m. Friday with a queen's coronation ball in the Veterans' Memorial Building. The queen will be crowned at 10:30 and past Timber Days queens will be introduced.

Timber Days in Melody will be the theme of a parade scheduled to start at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. Entries will be judged before the parade starts. A five division children's parade will precede the main parade.

Games Scheduled
At noon, mounted games and a peewee ball game will be held at Sutherland High School. From 1 to 2 p.m., children from 6 to 16 will participate in relay, sack and three-legged races, pie-eating contest and catching of a greased pig.

A trophy will be presented to the winner of a log rolling contest scheduled for 2 to 5:30 p.m. At

3:30, a truck rodeo will be held, with the winners receiving cash prizes. Other events of the day are: 4:30, power saw elimination; 7 p.m., queen's banquet at the Old Fellows Hall; 9 p.m., dance at the Veterans' Memorial Building. A street dance will also be held at 9 p.m.

After the dances Saturday night, persons may have a loggers' breakfast anytime until 11 a.m. Sunday. More mounted games will be held from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Sunday. Main events in loggers' contest will start at 1:15 Sunday afternoon. The events include chopping, hand bucking, power saw bucking, speed climbing, axe throwing, log rolling and a lady log rolling exhibition. First, second and third place cash prizes will be awarded in most events. The prizes range from \$5 to \$100.

Accusations Specific On Death Means

Arraignment Pending In Korean Infant's Death On New Charge

The Douglas County grand jury Monday returned a second degree indictment against Mrs. Edith Ott revised to meet objections her attorneys had to the initial one.

The rephrased indictment spells out that the grand jury does not know the exact means by which Mrs. Ott is supposed to have killed an adopted Korean girl, Wendy Kay Ott, on June 14. The first indictment returned alleged that death had been caused by Mrs. Ott striking the 22-month-old girl "with violence upon her head."

Monday's indictment adds to the wording of the faulty indictment these words: "with the defendant's hands or with an instrument unknown to the grand jury."

Indictment Sent Back

Last week, following arguments to a demurrer filed by Mrs. Ott's attorneys, Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly sustained the demurrer and ordered the indictment referred back to the grand jury for correction. He said at the time that there was no point in holding a lengthy trial with the chance that a supreme court appeal might be upheld because of the wording of the indictment.

Monday's indictment, unlike the first one returned, was not secret. It was openly read by Judge Charles S. Woodrich after Dist. Atty. Avery Thompson informed him that the defendant was technically in custody because her bail bond of \$5,000 had not been refunded when the indictment was found faulty.

The next step, unless other legal moves are made by her attorneys, Robert G. Davis and J. V. Long, will be for Mrs. Ott to be brought back before Judge Wimberly for arraignment. This had been started when Davis asked for a delay in order to prepare his demurrer.

No Date Set
No time for Mrs. Ott's appearance.

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Three Indicted For 'Kangaroo Court Slaying'

REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (AP)—The San Mateo County grand jury returned murder indictments Monday night against three young prisoners in the "kangaroo court" killing of a fellow jail inmate July 27.

Robert Young, 38-year-old Illinois-born transient, was found hanging by a towel from an overhead pipe and deputies first thought it was suicide. Investigation revealed he had been gagged and choked to death.

Indicted were Dan Lee Howard, 18, Los Angeles, Jose Delbert Veitenheimer, 19, San Jose, and Vern Williams, 20, San Francisco.

Sheriff Earl Whitmore said the trio admitted they convicted Young in a kangaroo court of "being inhospitable" and strangled him.

Young was reported as responding to jibes of Howard, "I'm a 'judge,'" with "I'm just up here on a vagrancy charge and you are a criminal. I don't want to associate with you."

Coroner Paul B. Jensen said Young's aloofness, to which his younger cellmates objected, may have been the cause. He wasn't wearing his hair and it was found later in his effects.

Pan American Highway Completion Is Planned

PANAMA (AP)—The Pan-American Highway Congress last night approved preliminary plans for the last major, 100-million-dollar link in the hemisphere thoroughfare. The United States is expected to foot two thirds of the bill.

The committee approved an engineering report saying it was feasible to span the 465 miles of jungle between Panama and Colombia. Then it adopted a formula for the financing of the reconstruction surveys. The formula is expected to be applied also to construction costs.
