

Damage Action Filed For Deaths In Highway Wreck

A damage action for \$20,000 filed Monday in Circuit Court was the fourth suit for the same amount arising from a highway accident

last year that killed four people and sent four others to the hospital. The suits total \$80,000.

Defendant in all the actions is C. F. Pruess, administrator of the estate of the late Kenneth C. Jordan, who was the driver of the car in which he and three passengers were killed. The accident occurred about 1:30 a.m. July 15, 1956, on Highway 99 in Josephine County. Jordan was from Eatonville, Wash.

Plaintiffs were all occupants of the other car. They include John Leroy Strange, whose guardian Marian Strange filed a complaint Monday; Edward Booth, whose guardian Willard A. Booth filed a complaint on July 29; and Rueben Moore and Lawrence E. Mullarky Jr., who had both entered their actions earlier. Mullarky, who was driving the second car, is represented by his father, Lawrence E. Mullarky Sr. Strange is from Willoughby, Ohio, and the other plaintiffs are Glendale residents.

All the complaints allege that the accident occurred when Mullarky was driving north passing another car. They claim he was in the center lane which was marked for northbound traffic. Jordan was southbound in the center lane and struck them on a curve, the complaints charge.

Injuries claimed by Strange include multiple leg fractures, face cuts, and scars. Both asks compensation for skull fractures and other injuries. Moore claims he received face cuts, a broken nose, concussion, and hip and leg injuries. Mullarky claims his injuries included a concussion, tooth injuries, cuts and scars, damage to facial and eye muscles, a broken foot, finger, and kneecap.

Tax Structure Opponents Criticized By Gov. Holmes

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) - Gov. Robert Holmes criticized those opposed to Oregon's tax structure and Secretary of State Mark Hatfield called for renewed efforts to bring industry to the state at this week's opening session of the Oregon Labor Council convention. Holmes, speaking not long after state Treasurer Sig Unander claimed the "debilitated" economy of Oregon is caused by the state's tax structure, termed critics of the structure "gloom and doom spreaders."

Unander, a Republican, said the present structure has prevented industrial expansion. He did not, however, propose specific tax changes.

The governor, a Democrat, said "I suspect that it will be discovered that the gloom and doom boys of Oregon will turn out to be professional sales tax promoters and the most eloquent spokesmen for the small in number but the rich in capital, private utilities; for a select few real estate operators and for one or two other big businesses."

He said the legislative tax research interim committee is working on the tax structure problem. Holmes also attributed the lumber market slump and economic

distress in some sections of Oregon on the federal Republican administration's money policy.

Hatfield told the 500 delegates that organized labor, along with chambers of commerce, must throw its weight "behind efforts to bring industry to our state."

On another topic, that of recent investigations of unions, Hatfield said, "Any organized attempt to break the back of trade unionism through legislation or other means because of the doubtful deeds of a handful would be a stranglehold on the continued economic progress of the country."

Council President J. D. M. McDonald opened the convention by pointing out that all "anti-labor legislation" was defeated in the

recent Oregon legislative session. product of effective ballot box work done during the voting of Said McDonald: "The good work was a direct result 1955."

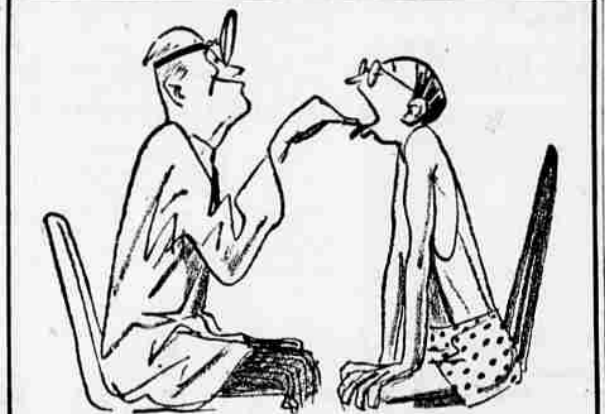
