

Grid Prospects At OSC, PCC Talked By Prothro

Amateur athletics and the prospects of Oregon State College football, two subjects close to the hearts of many of his listeners were given a handsome ride by Tommy Prothro, coach of Oregon State's 1956 Pacific Coast Conference football champions, in a talk Tuesday before the Kiwanis Club.

Prothro took a comforting approach to both subjects, venturing his opinion of an amateur athlete as "a boy who makes no profit," and OSC's football prospects as "better than last year."

The veteran of two years coaching at Oregon State digressed from the two subjects (in fact began his talk), discussing briefly the current feuding status of the Coast Conference. He talked of the disagreements existing between schools on the subject of grant-in-aid, which Prothro said is the source of the troubles between the schools.

Differences

He pointed to various basic differences among the schools themselves which contribute to the overall difficulty. Such things as a high tuition rate at Stanford for attending school, compared to the low tuition rate at UCLA and California, where subsistence is higher than at Stanford, were brought to light.

These differences basically in the schools' structure, Prothro offered, make for differences when an attempt is made to settle what the grant-in-aid program should be based upon.

"Our league has lots of differences and our conference is going to cease to exist," he drawled, "unless we get together."

Oregon and Oregon State, Tommy observed, are in a "uniquely good position" on the matter of grant-in-aid because neither the tuition nor the subsistence is a dominating factor. The tuition rates are lower in any event.

At this point, Prothro localized his talk and pointed to the fact that three of the Oregon State team's members from last year's Rose Bowl team and prospects for this year's club, were from the Roseburg area—the best represented area numerically on the entire team.

Well Represented

Prothro was referring to Nub Beamer and Dennis Brundage of Roseburg and Tony Arana of Sutherlin, who had also been introduced at the Kiwanis lunch.

He said aside from the Roseburg area, the only nearly equivalent representation on the team was from Los Angeles, San Francisco

and Honolulu, each of which had two members on this year's OSC team.

At this point, Prothro pointed to the one major disadvantage faced by the northern schools in the conference, and that is the source of much smaller population from which to draw prospective athletes as compared to the larger California centers. Prothro, whose teams have been dominated by Californians, did not labor the point aside from mentioning it.

He was reassuring in pointing out that "one of the finest arguments in favor of college athletics are the boys it produces; boys who are the greatest antidote for juvenile waywardness," in spite of the questions on amateur athletics that it raises.

To The Top

The coach, who has often been mentioned as an inviting target to California and other bigger schools in the nation in search of coaching talent, was also reassuring in promising the crowd that he has only one goal with his Oregon State teams and that is "reaching the top—nationally."

"If we keep improving like we have, we'll reach there," he stated.

After citing the "notorious record of coaches" for being "poor prognosticators," he went on to pick Southern California as the team most likely to succeed in the top—nationally.

Los Angeles Manager Clay Bryant meant business when he warned his starting pitchers they could expect no relief from the weak Angel bull pen — even against the Pacific Coast League leading San Francisco Seals.

In Tuesday night's double loss to the Seals, Bryant squirmed in the dugout as Babe Birrer was slapped for eight hits in losing the opener 5-0 and as Ralph Mau-rillo was tagged for 10 in the 8-2 nightcap loss.

Bryant squirmed, but not once did he so much as send a relief pitcher to the bull pen as the Seals buried the Angels under a barrage that put San Francisco 4½ games ahead of second-place Vancouver.

Vancouver beat last-place Sacramento 6-1 as Morrie Martin picked up his 12th victory of the year.

Hollywood dropped to fourth by losing 3-0 to the Seattle Rainiers. Seattle's Dick Ayler batted in all the Rainiers' runs with a homer — his first of the year — and a single.

San Diego moved ahead of Hollywood into third by beating Portland in both ends of a double-header 4-1 and 6-0. The Padres' 20-year-old Gary Bell allowed but six hits in winning the opener.

R. W. Smith pitched four-hit ball in winning the seven-inning opener for the Seals against Los Angeles and Tom Hurd gave up the same number of blows in winning the nine-inning nightcap. Marty Keough homered inside the park for the Seals in the first game and Bill Renna and Jack Phillips homered for San Francisco in the closing contest.

Vancouver wrapped up its triumph with a five-run outburst in the second inning. The big blow was a two-run homer by Owen Friend.

Bud Podbielan was the winning pitcher in Seattle's victory over Hollywood, his second shutout against the Stars. He allowed only four hits. Umpire Emmett Ashford had to separate the Rainiers' Maury Wills and Hollywood shortstop Leo Rodriguez, who mixed it up after Wills attempted to break up a double play.

San Diego unleashed an 18-hit attack in its second win over Portland. All the Beavers could manage against the Padres' Dick Brodowski, who won his 10th victory, was five hits.

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Hatchery Fish Killed By Disinfectant Leak

Loss of approximately 50,000 spring chinook fingerlings at the Rock Creek hatchery east of Roseburg was reported today by James Vaughn, regional game director. The fish were killed when disinfectant leaked through a defect in the concrete wall of a rearing pond. Frantic efforts are being made to save approximately 10,000 fish rescued from the pond, but it is still too early, Vaughn says, to know how many will survive.

The fish hatched from eggs taken last fall were from 3½ to four inches in length, Vaughn reported.

This year, he says, has been one of the "bad" years hatcheries experience from time to time when bacterial diseases and parasites seem to be hard to combat. Extreme care has been used in disinfecting ponds and in using antibiotics and various controls over diseases.

A rearing pond adjoining that in which the fingerling salmon were kept had been emptied of rainbow trout. As has been done many times before, a strong disinfectant was put into the pond to clean it thoroughly prior to its being used for other fish.

Although the same procedure has been used a number of times in the past, it was found that a small leak had developed between the two ponds. Vaughn states, and some of the poison worked through into the water in which the salmon were held.

The leak was not discovered until about five hours had passed. By that time the concentration in the pond filled with salmon fingerlings was so heavy that fish had started dying.

The disinfectant, instead of being trickled out from the hatchery as is normal, was quickly dumped into Rock Creek, causing death of some fish between the hatchery site and the mouth of Rock Creek.

There is no evidence of any great damage in the main river where dilution was sufficient to reduce lethal effects of the poison, Vaughn said.

Examination revealed that a hole, approximately the diameter of a match stick, had opened in the concrete dividing wall between the two ponds, it was stated. Although both ponds have been cleaned in an identical manner in the past, the hole apparently had not opened previously, as this is the first time, Vaughn said, that such an accident has occurred.

The fish were being held as a part of the annual "booster shot" given the salmon population of the river as a part of the rehabilitation program.

The Game Commission has been hatching spring salmon at Rock Creek every year and have released the fish to add to the natural run. Counts at Winchester indicate that the hatchery supplement has averaged from seven to 20 per cent of the annual migration.

The salmon destroyed in the accident would have returned with the 1961 run.

Bob Rush and Ron Kline, a pair of right-handers with the National League's cellar chums, don't win very often, but when they do it sure raises hob with the pennant contenders.

Neither had won in two months, but when they got the job done last night the race had a new leader and its biggest gap between first and fifth since June 2.

Rush, Chicago Cubs' 31-year-old veteran who hadn't won since June 2, gained a 2-12 mark with a six-hit performance that beat St. Louis 8-2 and ended the Cardinals' five-day stay

in first place. Milwaukee's Braves moved back into the lead by half a game with a 5-4 victory over Cincinnati.

Kline, now 3-15 with Pittsburgh, junked the Pirates' losing streak at eight games with his first victory since June 9, tossing a five-hitter that beat Philadelphia 3-5 and pushed the fifth-place Phillies 6½ games behind.

Third-place Brooklyn fell three games back, losing 5-0 to the New York Giants as rookie Curt Bar-clay gained his first shutout with a five-hitter.

In the American League, the New York Yankees jumped to their largest lead yet, picking up a seven-game bulge as Bob Turley blanked Washington 4-0 on four strikeouts while Kansas City socked the second-place Chicago White Sox 3-2. Baltimore won its fifth in a row and took over fifth place with a 2-1 decision over third-place Boston. Cleveland broke a fourth-place tie with Detroit and plunked the Tigers to sixth 5-1.

The seventh-place Cubs rapped Sal San Jose for two runs in the first on Walt Moryn's sacrifice fly and a wild pitch. Jones, now 9-5, left in the seventh when three Cub runs made it 6-1.

COACHES NAMED
