Locals Get Jump In Legion Playoff

Drain Black Sox Seek ABC Win

The Drain Black Sox will go after their second win of the ABC baseball tournament in Portland Saturday night as they play The Dalles in a seven inning game starting at 9 p.m.

For Drain it will be the fifth time that they have faced The Dalles this season, winning two and losing two.

In the first game of the tournament last weekend, Drain pitcher Stan Dmoschowsky hurled a miffy no-hit no-run game against McMinnville to give Drain their third straight win of the season over them.

Dmoschowsky will come back in the Saturday night game against The Dalles to try for his ninth win of the year against two losses. Backing him up behind the plate will be Irv Roth and at first base Ron Bowen.

At second base will be Bill Levins, replacing the injured Wimp Hastings; at third, Manager Ray Stratton, and at short Dan Luby, son of the Eugene Emeralds' manager, Huby Luby.

In the outfield for Drain will be Pat Wohlers in right field, Norval Ritchie in left and Jerry Gregg in center.

Other pitchers on the team include Noel Aronson with a 3-1 record, Jack Henkie with a 2-0 mark, Jerry Pflug with a 1-1 mark and Jerry Bartow with a 1-0 record.

Drain takes a winning streak of 12 games into the key game and a season's record of 18 wins and five losses.

Drain takes a bye in this week's Rogue Valley League schedule. They will also have another bye next week as Butte Falls, their next opponent on the list has dropped from further league play for the remainder of the year.

The Drain Black Sox will be at Portland Saturday night against The Dalles in the second round of the ABC baseball tournament. In a first round game, Drain defeated McMinnville 4-0 on the no-no pitching of Stan Dmoschowsky.

On Sunday, Drain will return home where they will play Klamath Falls in a doubleheader starting at 1:30 p.m.

Heavyweight Rivals Continue Workouts

SEATTLE — Floyd Patterson worked out in a baggage car and Pete Rademacher in a fire station Saturday — 12 days before the professional and amateur heavyweight champions get together in the baseball stadium here in the first pre-amateur title fight.

Titleholder Patterson, on a 30-hour train trip to Seattle from New York, was trying to dispense with part of the five pounds he picked up since he disposed of Hurricane Jackson July 29. Patterson weighed 189 before starting the baggage car routine.

Patterson gets here in time for a workout Monday. He'll set up training quarters at Kent, 20 miles south.

It was the fourth day of sparring and bag punching in the fire station setting for Rademacher. That's the location of his training quarters at Issaquah, 15 miles east.

The Olympic champ from the Yakima Valley boxed four rounds Friday, shadow-boxed two rounds and spent four more at the punching bags.

Rademacher's handlers said he'd work Saturday and Sunday, taking Monday off.

TRACK MARK SET

OSLO, Norway — Josh Culbreath, formerly of Morgan State, bettered the listed world record for the 440-yard hurdles Friday with a time of 59.5 seconds. The listed mark is 51.3 seconds by Yuri Latuyev of Russia.

Both teams lost Friday night as Hollywood and San Diego continued their running battle for third place.

San Francisco got seven runs in the first inning and whipped sixth place Los Angeles, 12-6. Fourth-ranked Seattle eked a 2-1 victory over Hollywood, and Bob DiPietro slammed two homers to drive in all of San Diego's runs as the Padres defeated the Beavers, 3-1.

Vancouver pitcher George Bamberger won his 12th against eight defeats. The Solons took a one-run first inning lead and lengthened it in the third with Tom Agosta's home run. But the Mounties evened it up in the fourth with Jim Marshall's 18th home run of the season with a man on. Marshall and Lenny Green singled in the sixth for the winning runs.

The Hollywood Stars had tying and winning runs on base in the ninth, but Seattle reliever Bill Kennedy protected Larry Jansen's ninth victory. It was later Hugh Pepper's fifth straight defeat.

San Diego's victory earned a 4-2 edge in the series with Portland. Luis Marquez homered over the left field wall for the only Beaver run. Winning pitcher Hank Aguirre gave up only five hits.

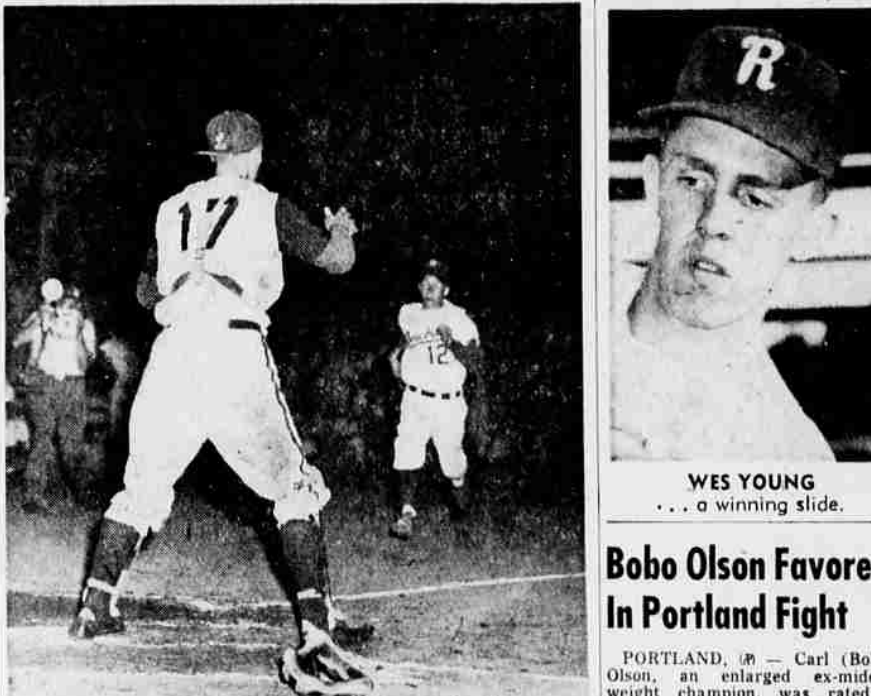

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Home Plate Steal In 11th Nets 4-3 Win Before 2,119

A thrilling end to a tight ball game was the treat of 2,119 fans at the Roseburg-Portland State Junior Legion baseball playoffs Friday night as Wes Young of Roseburg stole home in the last of the 11th inning at Finlay Field to give Roseburg a 4-3 win and the first game of the best of five series.

The bases were loaded with two outs and a two strike count on batter Bill Eswine, when Young, on orders from Coach Bill Harper, flew down the line and slid under the tag by Portland catcher Terry Lenchitsky for the winning marker.

Roseburg saw a 3-2 lead go down the drain in the top of the eighth inning when Ken Scales blasted a drive to right field that skipped past Wayne Kennaday and before the ball could be run down, Scales had rounded the bases with the tying run.

Bradford's of Portland had opened the scoring in the top of the first inning as Vernon Brazier opened with a walk, the first of 10 given up by Beamer and went on to second on another walk to Pete Verdurmen.

Leading pitcher Mickey Lolich then singled into center field for the first run of the game and Verdurmen went all the way to third base. He then scored on an infield out by Lenchitsky.

Roseburg had threatened in the last of the first inning, when with two outs both Beamer and Byron Baker had walked, but Kennaday struck out to end the threat. They did score a single run in the second inning as both Bill Eswine and Mike Hatfield walked and Don Wells smashed a single into right field to score Eswine and make the score 2-1.

Both pitchers were in trouble most of the time as Lolich walked 14 batters during the night and Beamer 10, but when the chips were down they came through with the needed pitch.

Lolich in losing the game had a full count of three balls and two strikes on 16 batters and Beamer on 13. Both pitchers struck out 16.

The big inning for Roseburg was the fifth, when they scored two runs without the benefit of a single hit.

Baker led off the inning with a walk and stood on base as Kennaday and Allen Smith struck out. Eswine, Hatfield, Wells and Mac McClellan then walked in that order to force across two runs before Young went down on strikes to end the inning, but saw Roseburg with their first lead of the game at 3-2.

After a bunt single by McClellan in the last of the fourth inning, Roseburg was shut out in the hitting department by Lolich as only one ball was hit out of the infield the rest of the game. That was a fly ball to right by Beamer in the sixth.

The only inning of the game in which two hits were made was in the Portland eighth, when Scales led off with a home run and Underwood singled with two outs.

In the 11th innings for Portland they had a base runner in every inning, while Roseburg had runners on base in every inning but the seventh, eighth and ninth.

Top batter for the Jaycees was Don Hagedorn with 2-3, including a home run and a double, while Buck Weekly with 2-2 was tops for the Riddle Lions, followed by Mark Griggs with 3-4, including a home run and a double and Leon Neis with 2-3.

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Roseburg's Ward Cummings Takes Senior State Golf Title

PORTLAND — Ward Cummings of Roseburg Friday notched a 4 and 3 victory to win the Class A championship of the Oregon Senior Golf Tournament.

Cummings, who won the title in 1954, rolled to his championship over Bob Smith of Portland. The Class AA is for golfers over 60 years of age.

Cummings never was behind in his match, and got two birdies over the title route. Smith, champion the last two years, also got two birdies, but found himself in troublesome spots more often.

The 65-year-old Cummings snaked in a 10-foot birdie putt on the 12th hole and came up with another on the 15th after a neat approach shot.

Cummings picked up his first margin on the initial round on the ninth hole.

Smith went out of bounds on two tee shots, and twice was bogged down in traps.

The Class A title (50-60 years of age) went to Marty Leptich of Portland, who trounced Bob Henningsen of Astoria 8 and 6.
