Roseburg's Rose Bowl scorer of the 1957 Pasadena, Calif., grid classic sees another good year ahead for himself and for the Oregon State College football team.

Not unlike OSC's head tackle-sport tutor, Tommy Prothro, who recently expressed similar sentiments in a talk before the Roseburg Kiwanis Club.

Not too many days from now, Sept. 1 to be exact, Nub Beamer will be joined by local teammates Tony Arana and Dennis Brundage at the opening practice as Oregon State starts defense of its 1956 Pacific Coast Conference football title.

GRID PRACTICE at OSC, like it's been held since Prothro took over coaching there, will be held on the field before the opening game (against USC in Portland) to get ready, Prothro told his charges (who were also guests at the Kiwanis meeting) that squad games were on the docket the first week of practice.

The ex-Roseburg High all-star sees a better first-line team in the making, like the pre-season crystal-ball gazers, so-called. And off his Rose Bowl showing, spring practice and the graduation of first-string fullback Tom Berry, Nub rates the first team fullback slot this fall in the OSC scheme of things.

IN A RECENT MESSAGE sent here, OSC Sports Publicity Director John Eggers says of Beamer that "he should have a great year." He adds that sophomore Jim Stinnette, the ex-Corvallis High flash, "will be pressing him pretty closely; a fine sophomore who'll make Beamer work."

We are already convinced of Nub's ability to make him work well from his work-horse days here in high school ball-toting days. The extra intra team competition helps the college boys, though. Fighting for first-team jobs makes up a good part of the week's practices, the coach has already said.

VERSATILITY is one of the 5-11, 170-pound Arana's main selling points. The Sutherland speedster is listed as the third fullback right now, behind Beamer and Stinnette, according to pre-season calculations, says Eggers, but he can also step in as third tailback when necessary. A real good punter, too, adds the OSC publicity chief.

A sophomore-year team member is Roseburg's Brundage. Since he waived all playing time last year, Brundage has the remaining eligibility years at OSC now. Dennis should help the OSC cause in years to come and is considered a fine prospect there.

Beamer naturally looks back on the Rose Bowl game as a real playing experience. His season scoring total in that 33-19 loss to Iowa is still well remembered by local game-viewers.

Prior to the Rose Bowl, the press book for the game described Nub as an "extremely hard runner, lacking only in experience. Hard to bring down and can go all the way. In another season, could be one of the best fullbacks in PCC. Hits as hard as regular Tom Berry, but not yet as polished."

BEAMER will be in fast company filling Berry's shoes. Last year, according to the same press book, Berry was the team's work-horse with the most carries and yards gained on the ground and the team's "ironman" with 425 minutes played.

Practice begins at Linfield College on Sept. 9 and is expected to return to that school's squad after a year's absence is Dick Olson, a sophomore guard and center from Reedsport. Olson lettered his freshman season, but was not on the ball club last year.

Another local collegian, Tony Perley, who schools at Tulane University, was the winner recently in the 5,000-meter run in one of Portland's summertime AAU track meets. And in winning, Perley ran the route in 15:07 on a soggy track, defeating the previous title-holder, Roger Stout, of the University of Oregon, and also outrunning a third contestant, John Burns of Notre Dame.

THE DOUGLAS COUNTY football coaching situation should have a familiar ring to it after all the final placements are made. Of the 15 football-playing schools, 10 will have veteran coaches of a year ago back at the helm.

Ironically enough, two of the missing will be at schools which won district championships last

year. That's at Yoncalla, the District 4-B 11-man titlist, where Ron Anderson replaces Louis Maurer, and at Camas Valley, the District 4-B six-man champ, where no coach has been named yet to replace Bud Parsons.

Supt.-Principal Clyde Akey will fill in at Camas until someone is named.

New to Roseburg, of course, is Brad Ecklund, replacing Bob George. Ecklund is getting in his coaching leeks early this year as one of the mentors of the Metropolitan Shrine All-Star game team in Portland.

The other newcomers are in A-2 ranks where Lawrence Gibson, the Camas Valley coach of years ago, takes over for Harry Edwards at Glendale, and at Myrtle Creek, where Leroy Juelke steps in for Earl Miller.

RETURNING to the fold are A-2 members Bob Williams at Douglas, Ted Zetterberg at Oakland, Frank Doyel at Drain, Chuck Pinion at defending subdistrict 6-A-2 champion Glendale, Ralph Dyson at Sathelin and Rudy Ruppe of defending state A-2 champion Reedsport.

The returnees in class B are Carl Grimsrud at Elkton, Tom Mason at Days Creek, Bill Marsters at Canyonville and Joy Smith at Riddle.

Hot Week Starts In National Loop

If you don't believe what happened in the National League race last week, pal, stick around. They are going to play it over this week.

And if St. Louis, Brooklyn, Cincinnati and Philadelphia ain't dead, now's the time for 'em to start breathing.

In six days last week, Milwaukee swept three at home from Cincinnati, then took three of three at St. Louis, moving from half a game behind into a 5½-game lead. This week, the Braves play three at Cincinnati, starting tonight and four with St. Louis, beginning Friday night at Milwaukee.

The second-place Cardinals, who skidded from the top with a six-game losing streak that started with a three-game sweep by Chicago's Cubs at St. Louis, opened a three-game series at Chicago today before the return shot at the Braves.

Redlegs Sweep Cubs
Cincinnati, in fourth place, seven games back, shook off that three-game set at Milwaukee (which left the Redlegs 11-2 to the Braves) to sweep the Cubs in three at week's end. This week, the Redlegs again wind up against the Braves, with four at Chicago beginning Friday.

Third-place Brooklyn was only 2½ games behind a week ago, then lost three of four to New York's sixth-place Giants and split four with last-place Pittsburgh to trail by 6½. This week the Dodgers play three with the Giants beginning tonight at New York, and another four with the Pirates, at Jersey City and in Brooklyn.

Philadelphia, nine games back and in fifth, split two at Pitt-

burgh and lost two of three at New York last week. Now the Phils are home, playing the first of two with the Bucs tonight and then beginning a four-game set with the Giants Friday.

Week Is Important
In short, it's a week that could give the Braves a prohibitive lead when the open their last swing through the East, next week. It's also a week that could leave the NL race all snarled up again.

At the moment the Braves are rolling, winning seven in a row (their best drive of the year), 14 of 16 and 21 of 26. They're the best in the league against contenders — 28-22 (.563) vs. the Cards, Brooks, Reds and Phils.

This is only the second time the Braves have held as much as a 5½ game lead since moving to Milwaukee in 1953. They led Cincinnati by 5½ and Brooklyn by six July 26 last year—when they finished a game behind Brooklyn's champs.

There's only a 5½-game spread between first and second at the moment in the American League too. But it looks like a mile and a half.

Yanks, Sox Set Pace
The New York Yankees have the bulge, after holding a seven game edge a week ago. The Yankees were only 3-4 for the week; but Chicago hasn't been playing the kind of ball that beats the Yankees.

New York has three games at Boston against the third-place Red Sox (12 games behind), beginning tonight, then finishes the week at home with four against Baltimore's surprising Orioles, now tied with Detroit for fourth, 18½ games behind.

The White Sox are at Cleveland for three starting tonight, then move to Detroit for four.

Detroit Lions Coach Quits In Surprise Announcement

DETROIT — Veteran assistant George Wilson will be named today to succeed Buddy Parker as head coach of the Detroit Lions.

An informed source who made the disclosure said the formal announcement would be made later in the day.

Parker, most successful coach in the Lions' 23-year history, resigned in a surprise announcement.

An official high up in the Detroit organization said today, "Parker is out and Wilson is in. It's as simple as that."

Wilson, 43, has been a Lion assistant coach for eight seasons. He played college football at Northwestern and later was a star for the Chicago Bears.

Audience Laughs
Parker, 43, made his explosive withdrawal in a terse, two-sentence announcement dropped like a bomb last night as the climax to the eighth annual "Meet the Lions" banquet.

Many of the nearly 600 persons present laughed, then sat in disbelief as the veteran coach explained, "I'm not kidding — I'm through."

Parker has "resigned" before—several times privately and once officially to Club President Edwin J. Anderson. In the past, things have been ironed out.

Speech Unexpected
Called upon as the final speaker of the evening and expected to review his 1957 club, Parker made a single introductory remark and then said: "When you get to a situation where you can't handle football players, it's time to get out—and that's what I'm doing tonight. I'm through with football in Detroit."

It left the Lions without a head coach just one day before they open the exhibition season in Detroit against the Cleveland Browns Wednesday night.

Anderson told newsmen "I don't understand this man. He's well paid, he has the best coaching job in pro football and he always has operated the team without any slings or whatsoevers."

Two Titles Won
Succeeding Bob McMillin in 1951, Parker guided the Lions to 50 victories against 24 losses and 2 ties. His teams won three Western Conference titles and two world championships.

Last night he said, "I can't handle this team," and called it "the worst team I've ever seen in training camp."

He said the material is good but that "there has been no life... no go... It's a completely dead team. I'm not satisfied with the way the team is moving. I don't want to get in the middle of another losing season. I think somebody else could handle it better."

He said he wasn't referring to individuals but rather to the team in general.

Bradford's In Series Lead As Play Continues Tonight

Bradford's Clothiers of Roseburg won the third game of the best of five series for the state Junior League baseball championship with an easy 7-1 win over Roseburg's Lockwood Motors team at a game field Monday night in Portland.

For Monday night, it gave them a 2-1 edge in the series with the fourth game scheduled to be played tonight at Lents Park in Portland. The winners have now taken two straight contests in the series, also winning 18-14 at Roseburg Saturday night, after losing Friday night's game 4-3.

Although Roseburg was out only 7-5, Portland's hits came when they counted, but both teams pulled their pitchers out of tough spots as each club came up with two double plays.

Portland opened the scoring in the top of the first inning as starting pitcher Ron Beamer hit a mild wild streak and walked three batters. These, along with a two-run throwing error by Beamer and another boot by Allen Smith at first base, gave Portland a 2-0 lead after one inning of play.

Lolich Handcuffs Locals
Mickey Lolich, on the mound for Portland, was back in top form for his second try at Roseburg, holding them to only five hits. The first hit of the game for Roseburg was by lead-off batter Bill Eswine as he smacked a 3-2 pitch over the second baseman's head for a clean single. With two outs, Byron Baker walked, but Kennaday popped out to the first baseman to end the first threat of the game for Roseburg.

After the two first-inning runs for Portland, Beamer settled down and didn't allow another run until the last of the fifth inning. With two outs, Pete Verdurmen homered into left field on a line shot for the third run of the game for Portland.

Roseburg threatened again in the sixth inning when Mac McClellan dropped a perfect bunt down the third base line and beat it out for the third. Roseburg hit the game. McClellan was then forced at second by Beamer, but Baker came through with a single to center field to put runners on first and second with one out.

Strikeouts End Threat
Lolich again settled down and struck out Wayne Kennaday and Wes Young to end the threat.

The eighth inning was the big frame of the contest for Portland as they pushed across four runs on four base hits and one Roseburg error.

As the first batter in the inning, Lolich grounded out to Eswine for the first out. But catcher Terry Lenchitsky tripled into right field and Ken Seales walked.

bouncer, his second hit of the game, to fill the bases.

John Simich, pinch-hitting for Lou Wright, hit the ball to Don Wells at short, who relayed it to Mike Hatfield at second for one out. But the throw from Hatfield to Smith went through Smith to score both Seales and Haag.

Smith Takes Mound
Another line single to center by centerfielder Vernon Brazzle scored Simich with the fourth run of the inning. Then after Beamer had issued a walk to Loren Underwood, Coach Bill Harper replaced him on the mound with Smith, who struck out Verdurmen to end the inning.

Brazzle, with 2-3 and three walks, was the top Portland batter, followed by Spencer with 2-4. For Roseburg, Baker was the only one able to collect more than one hit as he had 2-3 with one walk. McClellan had 1-2 and two walks to rate as the second Roseburg hitter.

Beamer, in losing his second game of the year against eight wins, struck out only four batters and walked eight, while Lolich set down 13 batters on strikes and walked seven.
