### Postal Increase May Not Get Senate Action

letter stamp to 4 cents. Rep. Post (Ohio) said.

"The Republican administration seems to have lost sight of the fact that the postal service was set up as a service to the people," Rep. Murray (D-Tenn.), chairman of the House Post Office Committee, argued that first-class rates had not been raised since 1932 by a 106-56 standing vote, the House defeated an amendment to eliminate the raise on first class.

The increases also include: Raising air mail cards from 2 to 5 cents and post cards from 2 to 3 cents.

Boosting second class mail (Magazines and newspapers) 15 per cent a year for four years.

Raising third class mail (mostly advertising material) from 1½ cents to 2½ cents per piece on the bulk minimum rate.

The House made the third class increase effective this year instead of in a two-step increase by 1959 and put a limitation on losses incurred in handling second class mail. Additional revenue from these changes has not been estimated by the post office.

The House adopted an amendment by Rep. Rhodes (D-Pa.) which provides that if the costs in handling second class mail of any user exceed by \$100,000 the revenues received from the user in one year, the post-master general shall reset the rates for the remainder of the year so they will equal the costs.

### Teamsters Union Will Be Pressed Charges Against

CHICAGO (AP)—The AFL-CIO executive council served notice Tuesday that it is determined to complete action on charges of "complete influences" against the Teamsters before the union's convention next month.

The move against the union of Dave Beck, James R. Hoffa and 1½ million members was taken after the case had dragged on for more than four months without a decision.

Charges that the union was "dominated, controlled or substantially influenced by corrupt influences" were drawn up March 29 after Beck, Teamsters president, was accused of misusing about \$400,000 of his organization's funds.

The AFL-CIO Ethical Practices Committee arranged to hold final hearings Sept. 5 and 6 in Washington.

### Sailor In Irons After All Other Restraint Fails

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The young Marin City, Calif., sailor who shot and killed an officer aboard his ship in May has been placed in irons in the Treasure Island brig "after all other means of peaceful restraint had failed."

A navy spokesman said 29-year-old Jimmie L. Henderson, "has been guilty of 105 violations of the Treasure Island brig regulations," and added:

"He has assaulted brig guards and damaged cell fixtures and other government property on numerous occasions."

Henderson faces general court-martial on charges that he murdered Ensign Arthur L. Morris aboard the attack cargo ship Uvalde at Treasure Island on May 28. Morris was from Stow, Ohio.

After fatally shooting Morris and wounding another officer, Henderson took a hostage and defied capture on the ship's bridge more than six hours.

Thursday at a pre-trial session, the husky Negro "discharged" his civilian counsel, John H. McFeeley Jr. McFeeley declared his client mentally ill. "The Navy has no business bringing him to trial," McFeeley said. "He should be in Oak Knoll (Navy Hospital in Oakland) instead of in the brig."

Henderson had been convicted of possessing a shipmate's watch shortly before the shooting. He blamed Morris for the conviction.

### Lebanon Cabinet Of Solh Resigns

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Premier Sami Solh and his cabinet resigned Wednesday to make way for Lebanon's new pro-American government.

President Camille Chaumon, who accepted the resignation at a cabinet meeting, is expected to name Solh to head a new coalition government. Solh has been premier for eight months.

Solh heads the pro-government group of deputies who won a lopsided victory over the opposition in the recent elections. Scores were killed and wounded during the campaign in riots, and gun fights.

The pro-Syrian pro Egyptian opposition group announced it will boycott the selection of the new government.

In an obvious attempt to split little Lebanon from the United States, the Syrian government this week changed the United States had plotted to overthrow the Syrian regime and agreed if the plot succeeded the United States would allow Syria to attack and occupy Lebanon. The Syrian government charges have been labelled pure fabrication.

reach the Red Chinese border and there are some here who may change their minds and get off. A crowd of Russians swarmed over the station platform as the well-equipped train prepared to leave. Dozens of bunches of flowers were thrown through the windows of the American compartment.

Amid shouts of "Peace and Friendship," a ragtag Russian band blared out one tune after another.

The Americans were frolicsome at the station. Los Angeles' Guy Carawan and Peggy Seeger played and sang "America The Beautiful."

Sian Fukson, Los Angeles, and Richard Sherman, Chicago, withdrew entirely from the trip and declined to give a nervous Sherman seemed highly nervous.

David and Albert Maysles, brothers from Boston, said at the last moment they would not go now but "might fly out and catch the group later."

Thirty-two agreed on a statement which the Rev. Warren McKenna of Boston read from the steps of the train as a light rain began falling.

Others making the journey declined to sign the mass statement.

The statement said in part: "We the undersigned Americans wish at this time to reaffirm our belief in the right of U. S. citizens to travel, and we want again to state that our exercise of this right is consistent with loyalty to our country. We hold widely divergent political views. We reject the notion that we are a tool of Communist propaganda. We too look forward with Mr. Dulles to the day when the peoples of China and the peoples of America can resume their long history of cooperation and friendship."

### O & C Counties Timber Share Down \$2 Million

PORTLAND (AP)—Eighteen Western Oregon counties will share nearly 10 million dollars from the sale of timber on Oregon & California railroad grant lands, the Bureau of Land Management said Wednesday.

The figure is about two million dollars below a year ago.

The \$9,805,664 to be distributed represents 75 per cent of the total receipts from this year's timber sales, minus \$4,495,000 used to build and maintain timber access roads, Virgil Heath, state BLM supervisor, said.

The government's share of the \$19,067,532 total was \$4,766,888.

The past year, 62½ million board feet of O & C timber was sold, compared with nearly 695 million feet last year.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lynd of Yakima, Wash., who were fishing in a boat nearby, rescued the men. The four had been traveling together in separate planes. The Lynds flew Fimmel and Wang here.

First word of the incident came from Pilot Mervin Hess of Pacific Western Airlines, who spotted a plane upside down in 10 feet of water. Hess taxied to the beach and found footprints, but before he could follow them he learned by radio the party had flown here.

Takla Lake is 200 miles east of Prince Rupert in north-central British Columbia.

### Congress Leaders Spurring Action For Adjournment

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate's Democratic and Republican leaders laid out a program today for action on half a dozen major measures and adjournment of Congress next week—if the House breaks its Civil Rights stalemate.

Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn (D-Tex.) already has closed the door to reconsideration by the body of any new legislation.

Republican leader Knowland of California said that "leaving aside Civil Rights, if everything goes well, we should get out of here by a week from Saturday."

Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas indicated he agreed.

Despite talk of a presidential veto, Johnson said he will bring before the Senate House-passed bills to increase the pay of postal workers and government civil service employees.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) told the Senate he doesn't think Eisenhower would veto the postal pay measure if it passed. The House approved a \$346 yearly increase for postal workers. It would cost 317 million dollars yearly. The House also voted an 11 per cent increase for civil-service employees, costing 530 million dollars yearly. The Senate has not acted on either.

### Roswell Couple Shot To Death

ROSWELL, N.M. (AP)—A Roswell couple was shot to death early Tuesday and Police Chief Tommy Thompson said their killer apparently drove around with the bodies for more than two hours after the slayings.

The victims were Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. McGuffin, 69 and 67, owners of a Roswell shoe store and antique shop.

Held in connection with the deaths was a youth identified as Fletus Ray Cecil, 18, Roswell. Chief Thompson said attempted robbery was the apparent motive.

Cecil, driving an automobile with the couple's bodies sprawled inside, was arrested about 3 a.m. on a country road south of this northeastern New Mexico city. Three men had reported he acted suspiciously.

The chief said investigation showed that the McGuffin home was entered Monday afternoon. Apparently the intruder remained concealed there until the McGuffins returned home some 1 1/2 miles later. Police received a report of shots being heard in the area about midnight but nothing was found by officers answering the call.

### Most Stricken Students Okay

NEW YORK (AP)—Only 15 persons of the approximately 200 who caught a touch of flu on a transatlantic ship crossing still were laid up Wednesday. The rest were well, and on their way.

Most of them were foreign exchange students. All but 29 were over the seas by the time the ship arrived Tuesday and by Wednesday, the number had dwindled to 15.

The ship, Arosa Sky, docked Tuesday with 847 passengers and 273 crewmen. There were about 200 cases of flu aboard ship during the crossing from The Netherlands.

All but two cases were among 647 teen-aged students coming to this country to spend a year with American families and attend American high schools.

Dr. Morris Greenberg of the city health department described the malady as a mild form of influenza.

### ELECTRIC SHOCK FATAL

PORTLAND (AP)—Joseph D. Grimes, 35, Portland, apparently died of electric shock Tuesday night as he worked on his boat with an electric drill while standing in Blue Lake. The Multnomah County coroner's office said Sheriff's deputies said Grimes' body was recovered from the water by a friend.

### INDIAN'S BODY FOUND

TOPPENISH (AP)—The nude body of Pendleton, Ore., Indian woman Myra McKay, was found in an irrigation canal near here Tuesday and the Yakima County coroner's office said her neck had been broken. The FBI and Indian Service police are investigating.

### Thomas Turner Pleads Guilty To Check Charge

Thomas Guy Turner, 34, Sutherlin, pleaded guilty Tuesday to a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses and was sentenced to three years in the state penitentiary. The charge was changed from forgery.

Specifically, Turner was charged with passing a worthless \$250 check at Marks, Inc., although Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich informed that Turner had scattered about \$2,000 worth of such checks about the country. This had been fully admitted to law officers, Turner's court-appointed attorney, Gordon Carlson, told the court.

The court was told that because Turner had used a check writer which was transported across state lines the FBI was interested in the case but would be satisfied if the defendant received a stiff enough sentence here.

Turner had originally pleaded intention to the forgery charge but changed his plea when the charge was reduced.

### Ross Exonerated From 'Wrongful' Contract Acts

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House Military Operations Subcommittee Wednesday found Robert Tripp Ross free of any "wrongful act" in connection with military contracts to a family firm while he was assistant secretary of Defense.

But it said government contract awards to members of a high government official's family "are repugnant to public policy," and Ross' fault lay in a "failure to realize" this.

The subcommittee findings, approved unanimously by the parent Government Operations Committee, followed an inquiry touching on some 75 contracts worth more than 25 million dollars that went over the past eight years to companies connected with Herman D. Wynn and his family.

Particularly under scrutiny was an \$834,000 Army contract last year to Wynn Enterprises Inc. to produce cotton trousers. Claire Wynn Ross, Wynn's sister and Ross' wife, was president of the firm.

Ross resigned last Feb. 14 as asst. secretary of Defense for legislative and public affairs after the contract became an issue. He denied any wrongdoing but said implications in news stories had impaired his effectiveness in his job.

### Innocent Plea Entered To Charge Of Assault

Arrested on a warrant charging assault and battery, Claude Crabtree, 25, 1654 Alder St., pleaded innocent in district court Tuesday. Judge Warren A. Woodruff set Aug. 26 at 9:30 a.m. for trial.

Bail was set at \$250 which had not been posted by this morning so Crabtree remains in the county jail.

He was accused in a complaint signed by H. E. Nichols, who claims he was assaulted by Crabtree on July 27. Crabtree had been free on \$1,000 bond on a charge of larceny of personal property valued at more than \$75.

### DOCTOR CHARGED

PORTLAND (AP)—A Multnomah County grand jury indictment charging conspiracy to commit abortion led to the booking of Dr. Jesse B. Helfrich, 51, into the county jail in Portland Tuesday. Helfrich, of Portland, was released later on \$2,500 bond.

### Group Of Young Americans Brush Aside Objections, To Make Visit To Red China

A number of young Americans brushed aside Wednesday objections of their parents, as well as warnings from the U.S. State Department, to board a train in Moscow for a Communist-sponsored trip to Red China.

However, parents of some of the others in the 41-member traveling group took the stand that their children were capable of deciding the question without a ny prompting from home.

The young Americans had been in Moscow to attend the Communist-sponsored World Youth Festival. The Red Chinese government had extended the trip invitation at the close of the gathering last week.

Forty-six at first expressed intention of accepting, but there was some watering subsequently and a few backed out following a State Department warning Tuesday that the three-week trip could land them in serious trouble.

In some cases, parents pleaded with their children not to go.

Mrs. Harry Avedisian of Pasquett, Ill., put through a telephone call to her 27-year-old son, Sahag, and pleaded with him to come home.

She said, however, he seemed determined to go to China. She said he told her not to worry. "He just wanted to see the world," she said.

A Brooklyn father, Hyman Bronstein, asked the State Department to contact his son and bid him not to go. Bronstein said he has received no response from his son, Eugene, 23, graduate student at the University of California in Los Angeles.

Other parents took varying views.

One outright declaration in favor of the trip came from Gabriel Bloksberg of Midvale, N.J., whose son, Harry, is in the Moscow group.

"The idea is terrific and I would go if I had the opportunity," said Bronstein. In 1955 the father had refused to tell a committee whether he ever had been a Communist.

the military and civil trucks which had kept the 700,000 population moving.

Some arrests were reported after a clash early Wednesday on Piotrkowska, the city's main street.

An official communique—the first news of the strike to be given nationwide publication—said: "The Polish government cannot afford a further wage increase for transport workers apart from 50 million zlotys a ready promise."

"Further increases would affect other groups of workers."

This promise of 50 million zlotys was announced Sunday.

A main complaint among the strikers was that after months of pressing for an increase they still did not know exactly how much they would get individually from the 50 million zlotys fund.

Women played a notable part in the strike. Many woman conductors of street cars and the wives of other strikers were in the forefront of several fights at the car barns during the night.

Officials were openly concerned as reports spread that the Lodz dispute had touched off sympathy strikes in other Polish cities.

### Reclamation Bill Passed By House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House approved Tuesday a 182 million dollar compromise reclamation construction program for the fiscal year which began July 1.

The program was agreed upon by a conference committee which settled differences between the House and Senate in the final version of the \$888,094,323 public works money bill.

Quick Senate adoption of the conference committee report was expected.

Final project allocations, to be financed by \$141,878,223 in new appropriations and \$20,121,777 of carryovers from past grants, included:

Washington—Chief Joseph Dam, Foster Creek division, \$1,138,000; Columbia Basin \$12,850,000; Yakima, Roza division, \$697,000.

Oregon—Crooked River \$850,000; Rogue River, Talent division, \$6,041,000; Wapinitia \$400,000.

California—Central Valley, Little Trinity River division, \$8,038,400; Trinity River division \$17,107,600; Santa Maria \$5,627,000; Salano \$3,672,600; Ventura River \$12,000,000.

Idaho—Little Wood River \$400,000; Michael Flats \$1,297,000; Minidoka, north side pumping division, \$1,465,000; Palisades \$1,500,000.

Drainage and minor construction \$893,000; improvement and repair of existing projects \$3,530,000.

The final allocations followed Budget Bureau recommendations in almost every instance.
