Canada Assured Confidential Data Won't Be Released

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a follow-up to the sensational Norman case, the United States has sought to assure Canada that information provided about alleged Communist activities will not be supplied to Congress without Canada's consent.

The State Department made a public Thursday a note handed to Canadian Ambassador Norman Robertson on Tuesday.

The note replied to a Canadian request of April 10 for assurance that "security information" given this country by Canada about Canadian citizens would not be released from administration control unless Canada specifically approved.

The State Department reply said the United States has been following all along "procedures... consistent with the assurances you seek."

The note said also that security agencies of Canada and the United States — such as the FBI and the CIA — "abide by the restrictions" which control their exchange of information.

The note was signed by Deputy Undersecretary of State Robert Murphy, who personally handed it to Robertson.

The issue became a live one after Canadian Ambassador Herbert Norman killed himself in Cairo, Egypt, last April 4. He died shortly after the U.S. Senate Internal Security subcommittee revived a charge that Norman had once been a Communist.

There was considerable comment in Canada, and some in this country, to the effect that Norman had been driven to suicide by revival of the accusations which some Canadian officials said had been fully investigated by Canada. Some members stoutly defended the Internal Security subcommittee's action.

Fear Expressed China Visitors Will Be Puppets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four members of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee said Thursday 41 Americans making a forbidden journey to Red China are likely to wind up as puppets for communist propaganda.

But the senators said they doubt any serious punishment will be meted out to the 41 delegates to the Moscow Youth Congress who elected to take a tour to the China mainland as guests of the Peiping government. One senator said they ought to be given "a good spanking."

The 41 Americans left Moscow for Red China Wednesday despite a warning from the State Department that their passports would be taken away when they returned to the United States. The department said the group was aiding communist propaganda.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.), who has advocated sending young Americans to all foreign youth festivals, said the 41 "have fallen into the hands of the Kremlin propagandists."

Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont.) said "they have fallen for a come-on gimmick and will find themselves paraded and photographed for communist propaganda purposes."

surplus on its lines as a whole. He said that the S.P. has plenty of cars at points where it competes with other railroads, but not in Southern Oregon where it has a monopoly.

He also reported that until recently, the Southern Pacific maintained a reservoir of cars in Oregon, but that the shortage situation started last week.

Ferguson pointed out that shortages occur in Southwest Oregon almost annually, but added that there was no shortage last year.

Lloyd C. Mason, S. P. representative the Oregon Farm Bureau, said the shortage was avoided last year because "the Association of American Railroads forced the Southern Pacific to maintain its supply of cars."

Ferguson said the demand for cars will become terrific in a few days as lumber and grain shippers try to get cars on their way east before the new national freight rate increase becomes effective Aug. 26.

Mason said Oregon's chief problem is that it ships 1,200 loaded cars east and south each day, but that only 400 loaded cars arrive in the state daily. This fact forces the railroads to bring empty cars into the state.

Ferguson said the S. P. has a problem in that many of its cars are used by eastern lines which haven't built cars of their own. He also said that lumber car loadings in the state for the past three months have been practically at the same level as they were a year ago.

Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan said he has received a telegram from J. W. Corbett, San Francisco, S. P. vice president in charge of freight operations, saying that this "matter is receiving all possible attention with view to continuing maintenance of an adequate supply of cars for our Oregon shippers."

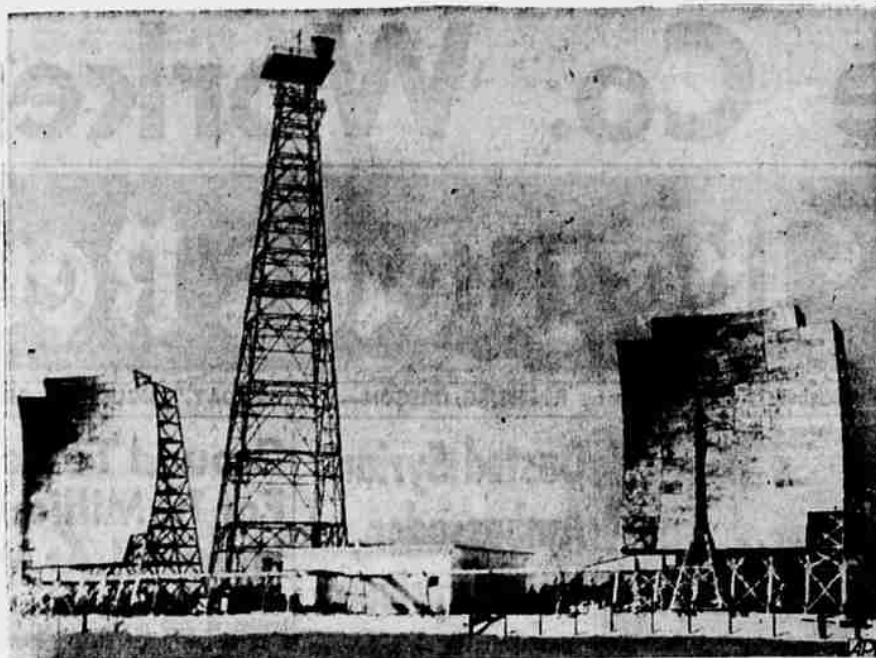
PICNIC CANCELLED

Flier Stands By Survival Story Following Crash

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Force Lt. David Steeves is standing by his story that he lived for 54 days in the rugged High Sierra after his jet plane crashed.

And in California, Supt. Thomas J. Allen of Kings Canyon National Park said rangers had found evidence that Steeves had hiked some 25 miles through what Allen called "very, very rough country."

Steeves, who emerged from the wilderness July 1, said, "I told the story as it happened." He made this statement Wednesday after the Saturday Evening Post announced its decision to cancel a scheduled article on him.

A spokesman for the magazine said Clay Blair Jr., the writer assigned to the story, had detected numerous discrepancies. Steeves said he knows of no discrepancies.

Allen said members of his staff had retraced parts of the route reportedly followed by Steeves. He said they found an open parachute and a handkerchief bearing Steeves' initials, indicating Steeves made the hike from Duxy Basin to Simpson Meadow, a distance of about 25 miles.

Steeves' wife Rita said this week she is considering seeking a divorce. She says the reasons revolve around her husband's disappearance. Mrs. Steeves is at her mother's home in Fairfield, Conn.

Fisherman Spends 14 Hours In Boat
PORT ORFORD, Ore. (AP) — George Marchman of Coos Bay, a crew member of a fishing boat anchored in Port Orford harbor, broke his paddle while trying to row to the fishing boat.

Marchman, 45, fought to keep the eight-foot row boat in the harbor by rowing with his hands. But the tide was too strong and the little boat was carried out to sea. It bobbed along the coast, with land always in sight, while Marchman tried again and again to land.

But the tide still was too powerful. The boat floated on the sea for 14 hours while Marchman tried to land. He bailed out water with his shoes.

A strong wind finally came up and blew the boat through the breakers. Marchman stepped ashore at Orford, 20 miles from where he had broken the paddle.

her to make her plea. It was innocent.

Mrs. Ott is accused of killing Wendy Kay on June 14. The child was dead when a doctor called by Mrs. Ott arrived at the Ott home. A post mortem examination revealed the youngster had died of strangulation brought about by vomiting.

On June 28, Dist. Atty. Avery W. Thompson filed petitions in juvenile court seeking to have three adopted children permanently taken from the Otts' custody. The children, Timothy, a 19-month-old Korean; Michael, 4½, and Rebecca, 5, were removed temporarily from the Ott home and placed in a foster home pending the outcome of the dependency matter.

Petitions Denied
Following a four-day hearing before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodruff, the petitions were denied and the children were ordered returned to the Otts. Judge Woodruff ruled that evidence of cruelty and mistreatment as charged by Thompson were lacking.

While the hearing was going on, a grand jury also was hearing witnesses whose names appear on the second degree murder indictment. Return of the indictment was delayed until Judge Woodruff ruled on the dependency matter on July 22. The next day the grand jury returned its indictment and Mrs. Ott was taken into custody.

She was released on \$5,000 bond pending trial.

Flying Object Thought To Be Weather Balloon
Glendale residents were craning their necks for a look at an object in the skies this morning, reports correspondent Mrs. George Fox.

But with the flying saucer hysteria going out of fashion, most observers guessed the round object to be a weather balloon. State police received no calls about the object.

Russia States Foreign Bases Must Be Ended

LONDON (AP) — Russia told the disarmament conference Thursday any agreement for slowing down the world arms race must include measures to eliminate foreign military bases and to withdraw foreign troops from East and West Germany.

Valerian Zorin declared before the five-power subcommittee of the U. N. Disarmament Commission.

"Evolution of a direct reply (to these proposals) can be regarded as unwillingness to settle these questions in a businesslike way—questions on which the establishment of a normal situation in Europe and a real lessening of the danger of war depend."

The Soviet spokesman complained that the Western powers have allowed nearly five months to go by without clearly answering these proposals.

The text of Zorin's speech before the 14th session of the subcommittee was made available by the Soviet Embassy here. Harold E. Stassen, the U.S. delegate, presided over the meeting.

Soviet Airliner Crash Kills 23; One American
COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — A twin-engine Soviet airliner coming in for a landing plunged into Copenhagen Harbor Thursday after clipping a tall chimney in low hanging clouds. Police said one American was among the 23 dead — 18 passengers and a crew of 5. There were no survivors.

The non-Russians on the plane, which was an Ilushin 14, were listed as three West Germans, two Britons, a Norwegian and an American. Sixteen bodies were recovered.

Six badly mutilated bodies were found floating on the muddy harbor waters and were picked up minutes after the crash.

Harbor rescue services prepared to raise the wreckage from the muddy bottom with a huge floating crane.

The 270-foot chimney is four miles from the airport.

Some bodies fell from the plane before it hit the water, some of the hundreds of witnesses said.

Japanese Mark 12th Surrender Anniversary
TOKYO (AP) — Japan marked Thursday the 12th anniversary of her World War II surrender amid newspaper statements that the postwar era has ended.

The anniversary of V-J Day drew more newspaper mention in previous years. Prominent mention was made of events within the past year which editorial writers said indicated that a resurgent Japan is on the road back to the ranks of major nations.

Among the events since Aug. 15, 1945, mentioned were: Japan's entry into the United Nations and her candidacy for the Security Council; Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi's visit as an independent equal to the United States, which once branded him a major war criminal suspect, and to the southeast Asian nations, which once were overrun by Japanese troops; the exchange of ambassadors with Russia.

Bicyclist Decides it's Easier By Airliner
NEW YORK (AP) — A 14-year-old Californian who pedaled his bicycle about 6,300 miles in 34 days to visit his grandmother in Connecticut boarded an airliner at Idlewild Airport Tuesday for the trip home.

"This is an easier way to do it," said John K. Wilkinson Jr., of Hollywood.

Wilkinson, a high school sophomore, visited Mrs. Charles B. Wilkinson of Milford, Conn.

He left Hollywood on his \$200 English bicycle in mid-June and said he had little trouble on the trip. He said he usually slept in his sleeping bag. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John K. Wilkinson, arranged for him to pick up money at specified points along the way.

State Department Use Of Poll Funds Declared Illegal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Government Operations Committee says the State Department has illegally tapped the secretary's emergency fund for more than half a million dollars in the last 14 years to pay for public opinion polls.

The committee approved a made public Wednesday night a report by a subcommittee on international operations which rapped the Budget Bureau for what it termed a failure to check properly on the poll program.

State Department officials have testified the polls were used to guide them as the American public's attitude on foreign policy matters.

The report said the committee agreed with a previous finding by the comptroller general that it was illegal to finance the polls from the secretary of state's confidential fund for "emergencies in the diplomatic and consular service."

Noting that the comptroller is not now permitted to audit this fund, the committee report recommended that Congress consider authorizing an audit, on a confidential basis where required.

"The Department of State," the report said, "has contracted for seven or eight public opinion polls annually since 1944; since 1945 it has been under a continuing contract with the National Opinion Research Center (a nonprofit polling organization affiliated with the University of Chicago)."

The subcommittee cited two instances in which it said two international cooperation administration officials violated security regulations by giving reporters information from the polls.

NEW YORK (AP) — Racketeer Johnny Dio and a man described as his bodyguard, Theodore Ray, were charged in secret indictments opened Thursday with federal income tax evasion and conspiracy to violate income tax laws.

Dio, focal point of recent attention by Senate racketeers, was accused of failing to report income totaling \$63,333 and evading payment of \$20,168 in federal taxes for 1950, 1951 and 1952.

Ray was charged with evading payment of \$407 in taxes for 1950. The government said Ray's real name is Rii.

The secret indictments against the two were opened in U.S. district court.

Dio is alleged to have been the mastermind of the acid-blinding attack on labor columnist Victor Riesel in New York.

Dio, whose real name is Gioiardi, recently was convicted on state charges of extortion in labor dealings.

Pluto Discoverer Says Life Exists Elsewhere
LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) — The man who discovered the planet Pluto says many astronomers agree, purely on the basis of the laws of chance, that life may exist elsewhere in the universe.

Clyde Tombaugh, a member of the staff of New Mexico A&M College, said in an interview that our planet is one of several revolving about one of billions of suns.

"It is sheerest egotism," he said, "for man to believe that the universe was created for his special benefit, or even for life at all."
