While the Milwaukee Braves have been building a nine-game streak for a 7 1/2-game bulge in the National League race, look what's happened to the New York Yan-

kees. Their lead is down to 4 1/2 games and their pitching staff, once considered "unbeatable," is hurtling.
Whitey Ford, the erstwhile Yankee ace, the Don (Perfect Game) Larsen both had the miseries as Boston's third-place Red Sox rapped New York 6-4 Wednesday, opening the door for Chicago's second-place White Sox to whittle the Yankee lead.
And for a change, the White Sox didn't boot it, beating Cleveland 8-3 as Dick Donovan won his 13th and his fifth in a row.
In the NL, Milwaukee again clobbered Cincinnati, winning 13-3 as Bob Buhl beat the Redlegs for the first time in a five-year career.
Buhl Wins No. 16
It was Buhl's 16th (tops in the league and matching Chicago's Billy Pierce in the AL) and seventh in a row.
While the Braves breezed, second-place St. Louis was bopped 3-1 by the Chicago Cubs. The Cardinals now have lost eight in a row—their longest slump in 10 years.
Third-place Brooklyn just did manage to break a three-game skid, beating the New York Giants 7-6. Last-place Pittsburgh whipped Philadelphia 10-3.
In the other AL games, Baltimore defeated Washington 4-2 and Detroit beat Kansas City 7-4.

The Wenatchee Chiefs, leading the Northwest League pennant chase by four and a half games, won again Wednesday night to give their chances another shot in the arm as time runs out for the contenders.
The season winds up Labor Day and the Chiefs, if they can hold on to the lead, will earn a shot at the Eugene Emeralds, winners of the first half of the split season, if they are on top come Sept. 2.
Wenatchee thumped Lewiston's Broncs 3-2 Wednesday night while second-place Eugene was taking the Yakima Bears 4-2 and third-place Salem was trouncing the Tri-City Braves 10-3.
Marty Rosell was credited with all of Wenatchee's runs. He got a two-run homer in the first inning and drove in the Chiefs' third run with a single in the seventh frame.
The Emeralds packed three of their runs in the fourth inning on a walk, a single and doubles by Carl Hutzler and Bob Gauthier. Ted Tappe powered out a solo homer in the fourth inning for the Bears.
Salem batters smashed out 13 hits in beating the Braves. The Senators connected for three runs each in the second, fifth and seventh innings and one in the fourth.

Patterson 10-1 Favorite Week Before Title Battle

SEATTLE (AP) — The Floyd Patterson camp indicated Thursday Pete Rademacher is not being taken lightly in his quest for the world heavyweight championship although most boxing experts agree the Olympic Games titlist hasn't a chance and the odds are almost anything you want to call them.
Rademacher, who won the Olympic Games heavyweight medal last year, will make his professional debut when he steps into the ring against Patterson Aug. 22. Patterson rates generally as a 10-1 favorite a week before the engagement.
Cus d'Amato, Patterson's manager, is one who says he refuses to regard Rademacher as an easy mark.

Professional Termite Control Is Preferable, Says Expert

Today there is an over-emphasis in many publications and in advertising of "do-it-yourself" techniques. This is particularly and adversely true when it comes to termite control, claims an internationally known entomologist, Dr. Thomas E. Snyder, a recognized authority on termites and the author of the "Our Enemy The Termite" and other publications.
With most of the present types of construction, especially buildings erected on concrete slabs, the control of termites is not a simple operation. The average homeowner does not have the "know-how" or the special equipment for drilling and injecting chemicals under pressure; nor does he, as a rule, have the patience to "follow through."

Other Agents
The home owner often believes that termites are infesting his house when some other agent of destruction is involved. Rot or decay may be mistaken for termite damage. Many kinds of borers, "powder-post" beetles, carpenter ants and bees cause the deterioration of construction timbers. Flying ants are frequently misidentified as termites.
Homes on the Pacific Coast or in southern Florida may be infested by three types of termites: the subterranean, the damp-wood, and the dry-wood termites.
Control for these kinds of termites is quite different for each type.

Moisture Content
Where damp-wood termites damage buildings, the probable source of infestation and spread can be determined by obtaining the moisture content of construction timbers. This is accomplished in Florida by the use of an electric moisture meter.
The excessive moisture can sometimes be eliminated by covering the soil with roll roofing if the house is on piers. Killing the termites present, in Florida, before they penetrate the roof and cause leaks, requires special skill and equipment. It would be too costly for the home owner to purchase such meters, motors, drills, hose, etc. for use only in the case of one building. It is quite likely moreover that his treatment will not be successful.
The control of dry-wood termites also requires special skill and equipment no matter what method is used. The injection of liquid or dry poisons into infested wood, or fumigation with lethal gases, is too specialized and dangerous for the homeowner to undertake by himself. As a matter of fact, fortunately, only licensed fumigators are permitted to use lethal gases.

Price Reasonable.
An effective service of termite control at a reasonable price is available to the public by commercial firms which have been established in business for many years. Such firms have long lists of satisfied customers. They have good local reputations. Why not use such a valuable service?
Avoid the mess, work and hard work of trying to "do-it-yourself." You will be better satisfied eventually and it will probably cost less. Furthermore, you need not remember about inspections. The yearly maintenance service will take care of this for you and see that your home is kept free of termites.

Timber Company Allowed To Make Special Cut
WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower signed legislation Tuesday to allow the McCloud River Lumber Co. to cut and remove timber it owns on a 160-acre tract within the Shasta National Forest of California until Sept. 20, 1959.
The extension, spokesmen said, is necessary to complete an exchange transaction. Under the transaction, the timber would be conveyed to the United States in exchange for national forest timber of equal value elsewhere.
