Britain To Fight Demand For U.N. Action In Oman

LONDON (AP) — The Foreign Office said emphatically Friday Britain will fight demands by 10 Arab states for U. N. Security Council action in Oman.

Countries of the nine-nation Arab League plus Morocco Thursday called urgently for a Security Council discussion of the British action in Oman. They described it as aggression.

At the same time British informants said the rebels, who vainly sought control of Oman with its potential oil deposits, had been "trained and armed" by elements in Saudi Arabia.

Weapons captured from the rebels have been flown to London for examination.

New Foreign Aid Chief Wins Committee Okay

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower's new foreign aid chief won Senate committee approval Friday. In comment on his new job he said he has "never set sail on any venture with so many storm signals flying."

James H. Smith Jr., 47-year-old Colorado rancher and former aviation consultant, made this observation to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee which approved his nomination to be director of the International Cooperation Administration.

It was a reference to the struggle in Congress over the amount of money to be spent on aid to U. S. friends and allies abroad.

Eight new teachers have been hired by the Dillard School District. Four of them will teach others in elementary schools at Douglas High School and the throughout the district.

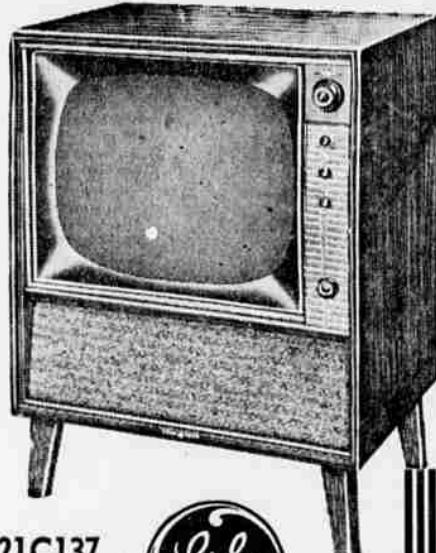

Grants Pass 'Glad' Show This Weekend

GRANTS PASS — Erection of the 30-foot high and 40-by-100 foot tent to house the Pacific International Gladiolus Show was completed today at the city park in Grants Pass where the annual Gladiolus Festival will be held Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

This year's "Glad" Festival will be the most ambitious ever attempted by the Caveman City, according to E. R. (Al) Lent, Lent was general chairman of the event in 1955.

Saturday will see the opening of the Pacific International Gladiolus Show with entries from all over the United States, Canada and the Hawaiian Islands. A water sports show will be held in the afternoon and the highlight of the three-day festival will be the lighted float parade on the Rogue River in the evening. Floats will depict Biblical scenes and be covered with gladioli.

Sunday morning will feature organ concerts, showing of prize-winning gladioli and floats.

All events will be held in the city park beside the river. There will be no admission charge.

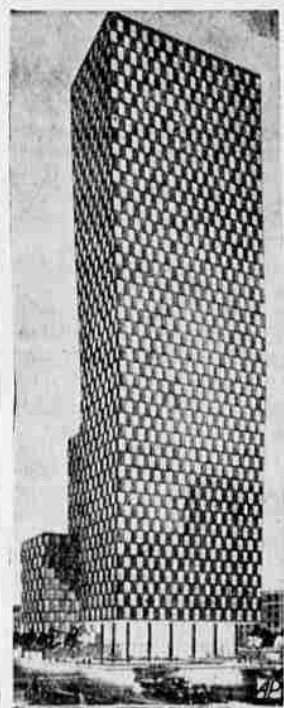
Doctor Would Close Two NY Streets Sundays

CHICAGO (AP) — A physical fitness expert Thursday suggested that Fifth Avenue in New York and Michigan Avenue in Chicago be closed to traffic on Sundays so that people could use the streets for exercise areas.

"Youth is being born into an age of sedentary habits," said director of President Eisenhower's Council on Youth Fitness.

"Everything manufactured and merchandised today is to make things easier for us," he told the National Dietary Foods Assn.

McCarthy, of Washington, D.C., said he thought it would be a fine thing if Fifth Avenue and Michigan Avenue could be set aside on Sunday for roller skating, bicycle riding and other forms of exercise. Other communities could use their main streets or shopping centers after business hours for youth activities, he said.

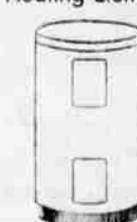
