Revolutionary Plane Urged By Air Experts

LONDON — A group of air experts said Thursday Britain should develop an airplane that can cross the Atlantic in two to three hours and take off and land vertically.

A special committee of the Air League of the British Empire said it was satisfied that such a plane "is a practical proposition within the next 12 years." It suggested that leading British aircraft firms form a syndicate to work on the project.

"It is for us an economic necessity, as well as a matter of prestige," the committee said in a report to the league. "With such an aircraft we should increase enormously our aircraft export market, and, under the new defense policy, be in a position to market our military forces anywhere."

Portland Seeks Land To Trade For Vanport

PORTLAND — A search for land to trade the Air Force for the government-owned Vanport site got under way Wednesday.

The Air Force met opposition from Portland officials and Oregon congressional members when it announced a plan to build a rocket-storage depot at the Vanport site, near Portland. So it offered to trade the site for an alternate site if a suitable one could be found.

The City Council is backing the survey to find another site. It favors the Vanport site for industrial development.

Most grass seeds have been harvested in Union County, where second cuttings of alfalfa already are being put up.

Western Oregon farmers reported that fruit and truck crop harvests also are moving along steadily.
