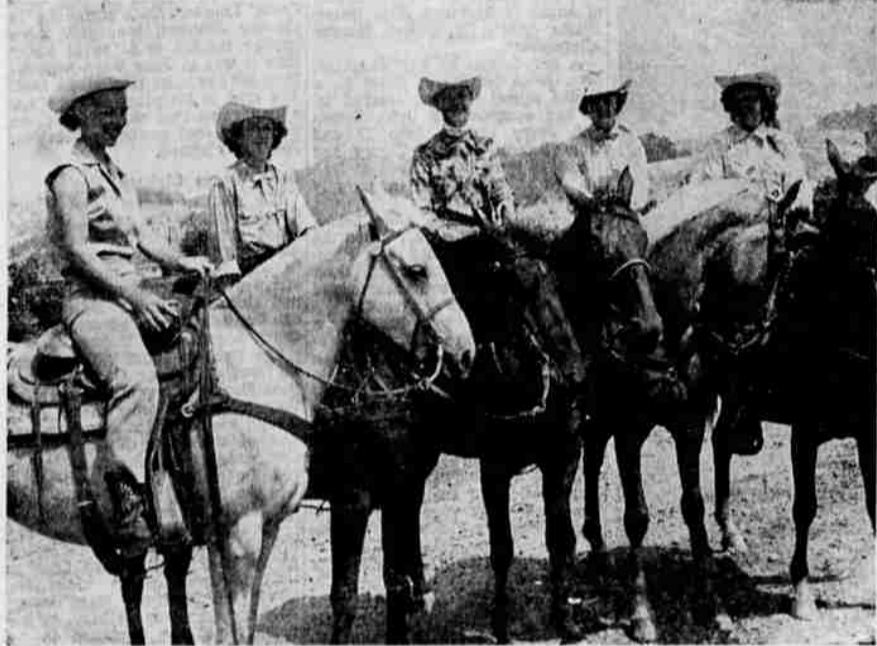

Easement Grant Given For New Sewer Line

A condemnation proceeding authorized by the Roseburg City Council last Tuesday won't be carried through because the property owner has granted a sewer line easement through his property.

Paul Hempel granted the easement after a special council meeting.

The city had requested a 16-foot-wide right-of-way 106.7 feet long through Hempel's property in Miller's Addition.

The city has filed one condemnation suit in its sewer improvement program. That is against S. L. and Mary Rose, who own land on Sherwood Avenue in the Cloake's Ferry district.

Meanwhile, according to Farrell, sewer construction in Miller's Addition, Cloake's Ferry and the Calkins, Hucrest districts is going well.

## House Committee Reports Agent's Testimony Proves Martha Dodd Was Red Spy

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The House Committee on Un-American Activities said Saturday it has sworn testimony that "clearly established" Martha Dodd, daughter of the former U. S. ambassador to Germany, as a Soviet spy.

A statement by Chairman Walter (D-Pa) said Miss Dodd, along with her husband, Alfred Stern, were named "as part of the Soviet apparatus" by Boris Morros, U. S. undercover agent who posed as a Russian spy.

Morros, a composer and movie director who played a cloak and dagger role for 12 years, said in New York earlier this week that "a prominent woman" acting for the Soviets almost betrayed him to his Russian superiors.

Committee staff investigators reported Saturday the woman was Miss Dodd, who was also dropped from sight in Mexico when U. S. authorities sought her and her husband in connection with investigation of the Jack Soble spy ring in New York. The Sterns are believed to have fled behind the Iron Curtain.

The undercover role played by Morros was brought to light at an interview this week in the U. S. attorney's office in New York after Jack and Myra Soble were convicted of espionage.

Chairman Walter said the committee has been in contact with Morros for the past six months and that he gave the committee "significant information about Soviet espionage operations" under oath in New York Friday.

Walter said Morros testified that Vassili Zubilin, former second secretary in the Soviet Embassy, took Morros to the home of Stern and his wife Martha Dodd, in Connecticut.

When Zubilin left the United States, according to Morros' testimony, Jack Soble became Morros' superior in the espionage operation and sent Morros to Moscow in 1950 to meet Soviet spy chiefs and receive assignments.

Walter said Morros testified the Soviets told him they had 55 business firms in the United States as espionage covers, and asked him to establish a television firm as another one.

The committee said that among other things, Morros was asked to plant a secretary in the office of Cardinal Spellman in New York as a spy to report on the Cardinal's activities.

He was also asked to obtain "compromising information" about high United States officials, including President Eisenhower and Gen. Lucius Clay, at that time U. S. military governor in Germany.

Morros also told the committee that Soviet consulates and embassies in the United States and other nations serve as espionage centers, and that Soviet diplomatic personnel are specifically trained for espionage.

Malenkov, Other Ex-Soviet Heads Again Assailed

MOSCOW, (AP)—After almost two weeks' respite, Pravda returned Monday to the attack on former Premier Georgi Malenkov and three other Kremlin leaders purged last June by Communist Party boss Nikita Khrushchev.

The antiparty group which had been torn away from the life of the party and country did not want to understand new conditions and new situations," a frontpage newspaper said.

Students of Communist methods of expression said the editorial did not necessarily mean the four had been deprived of their party membership. No such moves by their local party units have been announced.

Malenkov, ex-Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and Dmitri Shepilov, and Deputy Premier Lazarus Kaganovich lost their party and government posts after being accused of a revolutionary plot against Khrushchev.

The editorial accused the group of stubbornly clinging to forms and methods which served themselves and did not answer Communist demands.

Edward Renfro, Retired Railway Conductor, Dies

Edward Renfro, 78, of Roseburg died Sunday at a Roseburg hospital after a long illness. He was born Oct. 18, 1878, at Bethany, Mo., and came west in 1890 to settle in Roseburg. He was a retired railroad conductor employed by the Southern Pacific Co. from 1898 to 1956. He was married to Millie Ellen Norman at Roseburg on Aug. 17, 1901, and they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary six years ago.

He was a member of the South Umpqua Lodge Number 72 of the Masons in Canyonville.

He is survived by his widow; two sons, Alva N. and George S., both of Portland; three grandchildren; eight great grandchildren; and two brothers, Chester of Portland, and Eldon of Los Angeles.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary 3 p.m. Tuesday with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Concluding services and burial will follow in the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

## Rep. Edith Green Raps Eisenhower Administration

DENVER, (AP)—Rep. Edith Green (D-Ore), speaking at a Democratic banquet here Saturday night, said the Eisenhower administration had developed a "new art of government by indecision."

Mrs. Green, en route to her home in Portland for a short stay, called it "the most dangerous addition to the political scene in many years."

The administration, she said, had hurt or killed bills on federal aid to schools, foreign aid, the budget and civil rights.

She said the President "can crack the whip over Congress when he desires and is thus guilty of duplicity when he fails to do so."

She cited, as an example of the administration's influence, its role in blocking a bill to authorize a federal high dam at Hells Canyon on the Snake River.

"The Eisenhower administration," she said, "becomes incensed at the very thought of public power, then gives a fast write-off to the Idaho Power Co. so the consumers will pay for the privilege of paying higher utility rates."

Actress "Husband Sues Confidential For \$1,000,000

LONDON, (AP)—Dennis Hamilton, 32, husband of British actress Diana Dors, said Monday he was bringing a million dollar suit for an article on him appearing in the American magazine Confidential.

Hamilton said "I've cabled my lawyers in America instructing them to sue Michael Mordant-Smith and Robert Harrison for a million dollars for the damage done to me by the article."

Mordant-Smith, an Englishman, is a European agent for the magazine published by Harrison. Mordant-Smith is now in Los Angeles ready to testify in the Confidential criminal libel trial.

Hamilton, a former boxer who is now separated from his actress wife, said the article on him was headlined:

"What Diana Dors never knew about her ever-loving hubby."

Hamilton said "There is a story involving me with an anonymous film star. They allege that I made love to the lady in a house I used to own in Chelsea, London."

"... This was supposed to be two years ago—long before I split up with Diana."

Hamilton described the story as "absolute nonsense."

Three Eisenhower Nominees Confirmed

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The Senate confirmed by voice vote Monday President Eisenhower's nomination of Neil H. McElroy as the new secretary of defense.

McElroy is resigning the presidency of Procter and Gamble to replace Charles E. Wilson in the nation's top military policy post.

Also confirmed by voice vote was the nomination of James H. Smith Jr., 47-year-old Colorado rancher, as new foreign aid chief.

Smith succeeds James B. Hollister of Cincinnati as director of the International Cooperation Administration.

The Senate also confirmed, in another voice vote, Eisenhower's nomination of John J. Gilhooly of New York as an assistant secretary of labor, succeeding Harrison C. Hobart, resigned.

COMMENT ON TAX

PORTLAND, (AP)—Oregon residents won't know the real costs of education until schools are financed by a special tax, State Sen. Walter Pearson said Friday.

Pearson, a Portland democrat, made the comments at a meeting of the Legislative Interim Tax Committee.

Girl Attacked In Sleep Dies; Assailant Sought

THE DALLES, (AP)—Police continued the search Monday for an assailant who beat two girls sleeping in a back yard Thursday night.

One of the girls, Mary Matthews, 9, died in a Portland hospital at midnight Saturday from a skull fracture. The other, Barbara Heidt, was not hurt seriously.

They were sleeping in the Heldt girl's yard when the assault occurred. The Heldt girl screamed but the assailant had fled before her father, Fred Heidt, rushed from their home to see what was the trouble.

U. S. Plane Crash Kills 2 Crewmen In Germany

FRANKFURT, Germany, (AP)—A U. S. Army courier plane crashed into the grounds of a factory Monday. Two crewmen were killed.

Their names are withheld until their families are notified.

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## Hershey Says Manpower In Unsatisfactory State

WASHINGTON, (AP)—If war should come tomorrow, or even next year, Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey says this country would find its military manpower "in a very unsatisfactory condition."

Hershey, veteran head of the Selective Service System, says that in addition to the present reduced military forces of less than three million fewer potential fighting men are trained.

If an additional two million were mobilized, about one million would come from the organized reserves and the balance either from veterans or untrained young men from 18½ through 25 years, he said.

Hershey offered his opinions to the Senate Armed Services Committee Friday as it considered a House-approved bill that would permit the armed services to reject men with low mental ratings.

"Witnesses testified that only 84,000 men now are being drafted from a pool that contains 1,300,000 men between 18½ and 26 years and that this pool is increasing by 200,000 each year.

Hershey bristled when some Pentagon spokesmen talked about "a surplus of manpower."

"We have displaced manpower," Hershey said. "We are like the fellow whose belt got so much larger than his chest. His chest is down in the wrong place."

Hershey said the National Guard, Navy Reserve and similar organizations could provide one million trained men.

He said the next million must come from veterans who already have done required service or from young men who have had no military training.

Indiana Youth Nabs First Place In Soapbox Derby

AKRON, Ohio, (AP)—For the second time in the 20-year history of the All America Soapbox Derby, the champion is from Anderson, Ind.

A crowd of 70,000 watched Sunday as a blue and white racer driven by 15-year-old Terry Townsend flashed to a length-and-a-half victory in the championship heat.

Another Anderson boy, Maurice Bale Jr., now a farmer, took home the grand championship in 1935.

Terry's racer covered the 975.4-foot distance down the dark green concrete runway at Derby Downs in 27.18 seconds, an average of over 24 miles an hour.

Freckle faced Terry said he hasn't made up his mind which college he will attend on the first prize of a \$5,000 scholarship.

David Hakman, 15, of Los Angeles won a \$4,000 scholarship for his second-place finish.

A Canadian boy, Andy Vasko of St. Catharines, Ont., finished third. He won a \$3,000 scholarship. A \$2,000 scholarship was the fourth-place prize won by 14-year-old James Pryor of Long Beach, Calif.
