PORTLAND (AP)—Four boys accused of burglary were released to their parents Thursday with this stern warning from Circuit Judge Virgil Langtry:

"They either must change their ways at once or be sent to the Mac Laren Home for Boys at Woodburn.

Langtry added each of the boys, whose ages range from 13 to 17, "should know the difference between right and wrong and must realize he is responsible for his actions."

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Credit To Good Drivers Advised Of Safety Squad

The T-Man Safety Squad, conducted in the interest of safer driving by the Roseburg Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions clubs, has drawn the attention of the state Department of Motor Vehicles.

James F. Johnson, director, said he will write to Police Chief Vernon M. Murdoch Jr., asking the name of each week's winner so that a letter of commendation may be sent.

"I think," Johnson said, "that it is just as important to give credit to good drivers as it is to crack down on poor ones."

Johnson said that Gov. Holmes has instructed the department to do everything possible to lower Oregon's incidence of traffic accidents.

"We have no illusions that we can do this by ourselves, and it pleases us to see the efforts of other groups around the state to encourage traffic safety," Johnson said of the T-man squad.

The T-men here are charged with noting the license numbers of traffic violators. The numbers are turned over to the police department, which determines who owns the cars. Then letters are sent informing the drivers of their particular violations.

The safety squad also chooses an outstandingly safe driver each week.

Under House Bad Place For Vent Of Clothes Dryer

Under the house is the wrong place to vent a clothes drier, says C. N. Currier, Roseburg building inspector.

While there's no building regulation against it in Roseburg, according to Currier, the city is trying to advise people whose driers are vented under the house that moisture seeping into the house can cause serious damage.

He said he is writing letters to all appliance dealers here asking them to vent outside.

Currier said that the moist air collecting under a house eventually will seep into the house. Wood may be rotted or covered with mold, he said, and the damp wood makes a dandy nesting place for termites and other insects.

A correction to an existing vent under the house is simple. Currier advises that a pipe can be extended from the end of the vent to a ventilation space in the foundation.

Inside the house, Currier says, plaster and paint can be damaged seriously by humid air.

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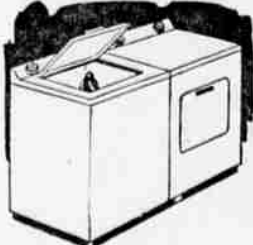
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
