One Body Taken From Rock Slide; 2nd One Sought

EUGENE, (AP) — The body of one of the two men buried by a rock slide near Westfir last Thursday morning was found by searchers Monday. The hunt for the body of the second man continued.

The recovered body was that of Robert Anderson, 35. He and Burley Isaacs, 40, were killed Thursday when a large rock toppled from a hillside 1,500 feet above where they were working on a rock crusher.

The rock started a slide which buried the men and several pieces of heavy equipment.

Hope that the two men would be found alive was soon lost. The slide was estimated at nearly 2,000 feet long, 200 to 300 feet wide and from 15 to 50 feet deep.

Danger was ever present in the recovery operation. Hours after the slide settled, rocks were still tumbling down the steep hillside. Experts from the State Industrial Accident Commission and from logging firms were hesitant to move much rock at one time for fear of starting more slides.

Crews since Saturday have been operating a high-head line with a bucket, operated by a donkey engine and a large drum from the side of the slide.

Nearly 40 men worked at the site all day Sunday.

Okanogan Fruit Crops Promise Heavy Yield

KELOWNA, B. C. (AP) — Okanogan fruit growers estimate their crop will be about 50 per cent better than last year's meagre yield if good weather continues.

Preliminary estimates by British Columbia Tree Fruits Limited, selling agency for the growers, indicate that the apple yield will be 5,000,000 boxes, 50 per cent up from 1955.

Peaches are expected to be up 60 per cent, and prunes 40 per cent, while a good crop of cherries has already been marketed. Growers say this adds up to a bumper crop.

The total fruit value in the area last year was less than 16 million dollars, of which two-thirds was realized from apples. Proceeds were about two million less than in 1955.

Civil Rights Bill Action Sought By 4 Democrats

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four northern Democrats Monday formally asked the House Rules Committee to meet on the civil rights bill, thus paving the way for possible committee action within a week.

Rep. Bolling (D-Mo), leader of the Democratic civil rights faction on the 12 man committee, presented a letter of request to committee chairman Howard Smith (D-Va.)

Smith now has until Friday to decide whether to call a meeting on clearing the stalled measure for a House vote. The Virginia Democrat is staunchly opposed to the bill.

Under Rules Committee procedures, if Smith does not seek a committee meeting by Friday then a majority of the membership could force one by majority vote.

House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex) said Monday he still hopes to have the civil rights bill up for House action this week.
