Women Involved In Bloody Battle Given Release

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — With evident reluctance, Municipal Judge Patrick J. Barton has released two young women who were involved in a bloody gun battle in a downtown Indianapolis hotel.

Asa J. Smith, chief deputy prosecutor, told the judge that there was no evidence to support any charges against the women.

Maude Loretta Booth, 22, Des Moines, and Dorothy C. Norris, 26, St. Louis.

Miss Booth's boy friend, Everett C. Sparks, 30, Forest Grove, Ore., killed himself Aug. 8 after wounding two policemen and a woman bystander.

Travis F. C. Gatewood, 34, Portland, Ore., arrested with the girls, told police he and Sparks had been on a cross-country check forging expedition. The shooting started when the hotel questioned a check given by Sparks and called in a detective.

Smith told Judge Barton that a thorough investigation failed to turn up a case against the women. He said both insisted they knew nothing about the check forging operations.

Mr. Norris, who joined the other three only a few hours before the shooting, was met in the courtroom by her husband, Jack, a St. Louis welder, and said she would return to him and their three children. She left them several weeks ago for what her husband called "personal reasons."

Gatewood is wanted in San Antonio, Texas, on a check forgery charge.

Frederick Herbert, Des Moines lawyer who declined to say who employed him for Miss Booth, said money would be provided for her return to Des Moines. He said work and a home would be found for her.

Two Teenaged Boys Die In Truck-Auto Crash

Two teenaged boys died in the crash of their car into a truck west of Forest Grove Monday and another teenager, hurt in a Sunday accident, died Monday in a Salem hospital.

They brought the Saturday-to-Monday toll on Oregon highways to seven.

At least three other persons drowned over the weekend.

In the Forest Grove accident, Bob Lovelady, 19, of Mountain Gales Creek were killed. Two of Hart's brothers, Richard, 14, and Donald, 16, suffered non-critical hurt.

Their car sideswiped a truck on a curve on the Wilson River Highway and all four of the boys were thrown to the roadway as the car was ripped open.

Jerry Hagen, 16, Salem, died of injuries suffered in an accident which killed Mrs. Bevan Elkins Abbott, 79, of Dallas, Sunday.

That accident, on a new stretch of Highway 22 three miles north of Dallas, also injured John Brown, 17, Salem, who was with Hagen in one car, and Mrs. Edna McCleary, about 45, Dallas school teacher and daughter of Mrs. Abbott who was driver of her car.

RED CROSS SENDS AID
GENEVA Switzerland (AP) — The International Red Cross committee announced Monday it is shipping 10,000 Swiss francs (\$2,340) worth of medical supplies to Oman for the treatment of victims of the Persian Gulf uprising.

New Student At Cheam To Be Plain Charles

LONDON (AP) — The new boy at Cheam School at Headley will be just plain Charles to the other pupils. But the headmaster and teachers will call him Prince Charles.

His parents, Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip, have expressed a wish that the 8-year-old heir to the British throne be treated like any other boy when he enters the boarding school next month.

Parents of other pupils got a letter Saturday from the school's headmaster, Peter Beck, explaining the royal family's wishes.

"The staff will call him and refer to him as Prince Charles, but the boys will call him Charles," the letter said. "It would be a great help if you would explain this to your boy."

11-Year-Old Girl Gives Birth To 6-Pound Baby

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — An 11-year-old girl and the daughter she gave birth to are in good condition at the state medical center here, physicians said today.

The 6-pound, 4-ounce baby was delivered by a cesarean operation Friday. It was the mother's 11th birthday.

Dr. Eva Dodge, who delivered the child, said the unmarried mother has been at the medical center for some time under her supervision. The girl, a Negro, lives at Curtis, Ark.

Strauss Belittles Radiation Peril

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Lewis L. Strauss of the Atomic Energy Commission has suggested that critics of nuclear testing might better campaign against luminous wrist watch dials.

Strauss told a House Appropriations subcommittee, in testimony just made public, that such dials deliver more radiation "than all that received from the accumulated fallout to date."

He did not elaborate on this but added, in an obvious slip at those who want to end nuclear tests: "A campaign, if one is inclined to campaign, against luminous wrist watch dials would with the above assumption be more beneficial to humanity."

Discussing radiation hazards, the AEC boss testified that the normal radiation of a resident of the high city of Denver might receive is far greater than any stemming from test fallout.

He said normal radiation at sea level or a few hundred feet above "is lower than that which you receive at higher altitudes."

Business Boost Plan Given 'Success' Label

SPRINGFIELD, Ore. (AP) — Some 5,000 persons turned out for the opening of Springfield's experiment in boosting business in the downtown section of the town.

Under the plan, three blocks of Main Street will be closed to traffic for a total of 10 days.

John Chamberlain, a spokesman for the group sponsoring the plan, said it so far is a "tremendous success."

MENTALLY INCOMPETENT

WASHINGTON (AP) — Edith Louise Hough, a 41-year-old secretary, has been found mentally incompetent to stand trial for the Memorial Day slaying of a Russian translator for the Voice of America.

The finding was issued yesterday by Dr. Addison M. Duval of St. Elizabeth's Hospital. Miss Hough has been under mental observation at the institution for the past 60 days.
