Trucker Pinned Several Hours Under Log Pile

GRANTS PASS, (AP)—Harry G. Heathman, 39, of Grants Pass was hospitalized at 4 a.m. Tuesday after spending several hours pinned under a pile-up of logs from an overturned truck and trailer on the Mt. Reuben-Grave Creek Road near the old Gold Bug Mine. Driver of the truck, Bob Ashworth, ran some 14 miles to the Rand ranger station at Galice to obtain help for the injured man. By the time the ambulance arrived from Grants Pass, foresters from the ranger station had extricated the injured man and administered first aid. Ashworth and Heathman said they had stopped the truck and were almost asleep when Heathman felt the truck begin to topple over the 45-degree shale-covered incline at the roadside. Both jumped from the truck, but Heathman was pinned between the overturned truck and one of the falling logs. His small dog, which had been in his lap, was killed. Heathman's injuries had not been determined Tuesday morning, pending an X-ray report. However, hospital attendants listed his condition as fairly good.

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Prune Picking Prices Same

RICKREALL (AP)—Prune picking prices about the same as last year's were set here Monday night at a meeting of about 100 members of the Polk County Prune Growers Assn. The price will be 20 cents a bushel for picking alone and 50 cents for picking as well as shaking the trees. A bonus of 5 cents a bushel will be paid to pickers who remain for the entire season. Growers said they expected to get no more and probably less than the \$30 to \$35 paid last year. An average of about \$10 was the consensus. A state employment service representative said he believed an adequate labor supply would be available. The growers elected H. B. Hildebrandt, president; Eugene McDonald, vice president; and Leighon Shields, secretary-treasurer, all of Dallas. Directors named include Kenneth Elliot, Adolph Hildebrandt and Frank Neufeldt, all of Dallas; Emil Stevens Rieckreall, and Irvin Simmons, Salem.

Compact Group May Become Action Body

SEATTLE (AP)—A report by a special committee on the possibility of making the Columbia Basin Interstate Compact Commission an action-type body will be made at a meeting of the seven-state commission in Reno, Nev., Sept. 6. The special 12-member committee met here Monday to consider the change. The commission is at present a drafting organization and is trying to formulate a Columbia Basin compact satisfactory to all its member states. As an action-type body the commission would be able—in all probability—to take over the Bonneville Power Administration and build its own power plants. That is what public power groups in Washington want. Attending Monday's day-long meeting were two representatives each from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana, one each from Wyoming and Utah. Nevada's one representative on the committee was absent. Presiding was Howard R. Stinson of Idaho Falls, Idaho.

Spokane Natural Gas Co. To Ask Rate Increase

SPOKANE (AP)—Nathan Gellert, president of the Spokane Natural Gas Co., said Monday his firm will file an application with the State Public Service Commission Tuesday for a 20 per cent rate increase, effective Sept. 20. If the rate increase is approved, Gellert said, about 54 per cent of the boost will be applied to residential consumers, adding about \$30 a year to the average residential bill, which is now about \$140. The requested rate increase will add about \$251,000 annually to the company's revenue, Gellert said. Gellert said the increase is being sought because of rising construction costs and because fewer customers had signed up for gas during the first half of the year than was anticipated.

FUNDS FOR CHANNEL WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate has approved a supplemental appropriation bill containing \$425,000 to begin dredging of the Columbia River channel between Vancouver, Wash., and The Dalles, Sen. Neuberger (D-Ore.) said Monday. The plan is to deepen the channel to 27 feet.
