GRANTS PASS, Ore. — Mrs. Troy Bagley, about 40, was killed Tuesday night when flames raced through and destroyed a two-room frame house a mile west of here.

Sheriff's deputies said the woman's husband told them he was awakened by the flames and smoke and stumbled from the house through a bathroom window.

Bagley, about 42, then raced to a nearby neighbor to summon help, deputies said. The house was enveloped in flames by the time firemen arrived, they added.

Bagley was hospitalized here for treatment after being nearly overcome by smoke.

Mrs. Bagley is survived by the widower and three children, none of whom live at home.

Fire Danger Said Critical

SALEM, Ore. — The state Forestry Department warned Wednesday that fire danger had reached a critical stage in almost all areas of the state.

Officials said the humidity would reach as low as 20 per cent in some areas with Southern Oregon probably the most critical.

They said the area bordering the coast was not as critical but added that readings would dip to 20 per cent in parts of the Willamette Valley as well as in Southern Oregon.

All of Eastern and Central Oregon also were listed as being critical.

The department said a 230-acre fire burned near Drain Tuesday but was controlled before nightfall. The fire broke loose from controlled burning. Another fire burned 30 acres in Wasco County.

A 15-acre fire on the Umatilla National Forest in southeastern Washington was controlled Tuesday and a Bureau of Land Management spokesman said all Eastern Oregon range fires were being mopped up Wednesday.

Minister Seeks Post In San Francisco Area

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — The Rev. Andrew Daughters, the Episcopal minister who "returned from the dead" two months after he was presumed drowned, left with his family Monday for San Francisco.

He said he hopes to be assigned to a church in the Bay area and further his theological studies at a Berkeley divinity school.

The Rev. Daughters was given up for dead as a drowning victim April 23 in Lake Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. But on June 30 he turned up and said he had wandered for two months as an amnesia victim.

He said he didn't know where he had been or what he did, that the last thing he remembers is climbing out of the Idaho lake. He later gave up his pastorate here for an extended rest.

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
