

Hardtoppers Roll Again Saturday At Speedway

The gas-feeders roll again this Saturday night at the Roseburg Speedway as drivers from Roseburg, Coos Bay, Eugene, Medford, Cottage Grove and Springfield compete for the night's top prizes in four main events.

After a one-week layoff in which members of the Roseburg club traveled to Eugene to compete in a championship race, drivers will go out after point honors in the final month of racing at the Speedway.

Heading the list of drivers on the point totals is Jim Standley of Roseburg in car No. 22 with a total of 275 points. Close behind

in second place is Art Pollard, also of Roseburg, in car 87, who has a total of 255 points.

Nip And Tuck

Both drivers have been at each others' heels during the past two months. They have been the only drivers besides Whitey Dage to nab A-main events. Dage had the honor several weeks ago of breaking the hold the two drivers have had on the top prize money.

Nine drivers have pushed their point totals over the 100 mark and several more need only a few more to enter the charmed circle.

Last week over 30 cars competed in the night's action and at least that many are expected to show up for this Saturday's action.

Dage, although not winning many of the A-main events, has been picking up a lot of points in other events to rate as the number three point getter, with a total of 170. John Wilverding is in fourth place with a grand total of 150.

Saturday night's action will start at 7 p.m. with the time trials. The races start at 8 p.m. on the quarter-mile track south of town.

All seats in the grandstands are general admission seats and all are in a good position to see the entire race.

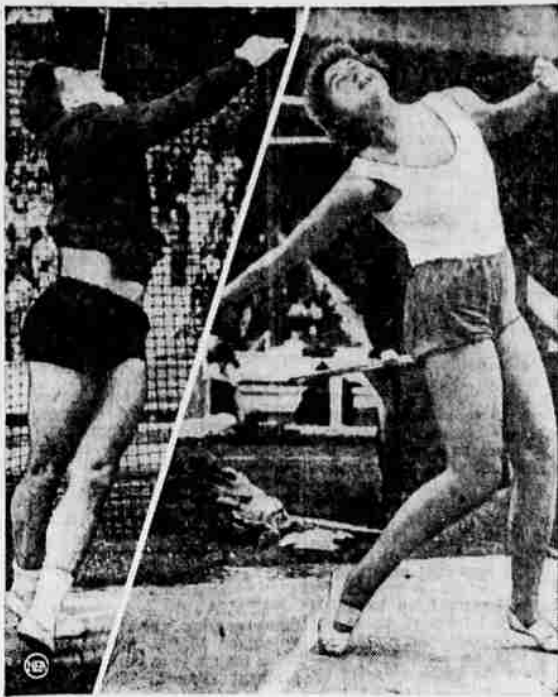

Title Hungry Fighters Scramble

CHICAGO — Joe Brown, who has proven to be anything but invincible, Thursday finds at least three fighters scrambling for a showdown for his lightweight championship.

Having one of the strongest cases is Joey Lopes of Sacramento, Calif., who weaved, bobbed and sprayed shots at Brown Wednesday night in Chicago Stadium to earn a 10-round draw in a nationally televised and broadcast heavyweight match.

Lopes, 10th ranking contender, boasted afterwards that "I will beat him if he gives me a crack at the championship."

Lopes, former AAU and Golden Gloves champion who has been a pro since 1949, was staggered by a series of sharp combinations in the seventh round but the 31-year-old Brown couldn't land the clincher.

"I'll fight him for the title if the price is right," said Brown. "He didn't hurt me any. I just didn't press him soon enough."

Wenatchee stepped out to a five-game lead in the Northwest League race Wednesday night as the next three clubs unwillingly celebrated "Be Kind to the Chiefs Night."

The Chiefs took care of the second-place club, the Eugene Emeralds, 2-0 in 10 innings on Roy Parker's two-run homer.

The third-place Salem Senators fell seven games off the pace by losing 6-3 to the Lewiston Bombers and fourth-place Yakima slid to an eight and a half game deficit by dropping a 10-3 decision to the Tri-City Braves.

Parker's belt, with Marty Rosell aboard, ended a tight pitching scrap between Pedro Carillo of the winners and Eugene's Olie Brantley. Carillo held the Emeralds to four hits. Brantley was tagged for eight.

Rosell got aboard on a single and then, with two out, Parker stepped up and sent one of Brantley's offerings high over the right field barrier as 4,214 Eugene fans, the top crowd of the season, watched.

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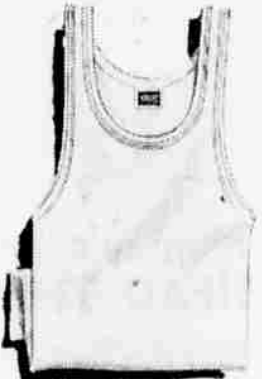
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
