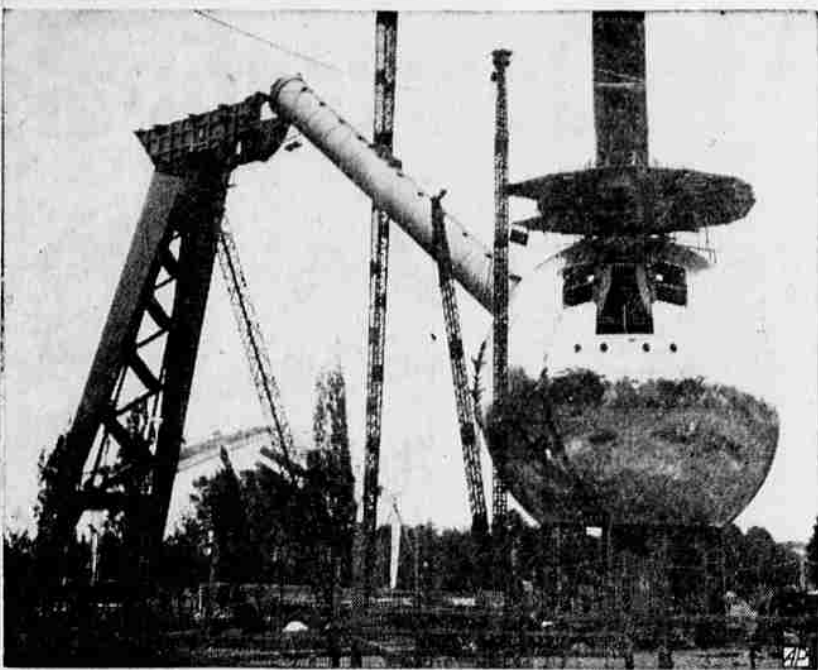

Anti-Communists Would Be Admitted Under New Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thousands of refugees from communism could be admitted to the United States under provisions of an immigration bill approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

OFFER REVEALED
BERLIN (AP)—A Communist report from Moscow said Wednesday Russia secretly offered a seven billion mark (\$1,600,000,000) trade pact to West Germany. The Berliner Zeitung, an East German Communist newspaper, said the Soviets put forward the proposal at the beginning of the currently stalled trade talks in Moscow.

The measure would amend the McCarran-Walter Immigration Act, and would permit broader use of 18,565 visas left over from the 1953 Refugee Relief Act which expired last Dec. 31.

This would open the way for admission of persons fleeing communism, or persecution in the Middle East.

Marco Calamai, 55, was washed overboard Monday when a huge wave broke over the yacht 25 miles northwest of Sardinia.

President May Name Dr. Welch Head Of TVA

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP)—The Chattanooga Times said today President Eisenhower is considering appointing Dr. Frank J. Welch, Kentucky educator and economist, to fill a vacancy on the Tennessee Valley Authority Board of Directors.

There are now two vacancies on the three-man board. One was caused by the recent death of Dr. Raymond Paty; the other resulted when Dr. Harry A. Curtis retired when his term expired in May.

Arnold R. Jones, deputy budget director, has been nominated by the President to fill the post Curtis vacated.

In the story by its Washington correspondent Charles Bartlett, the paper said Welch is reported to be a conservative Democrat and the White House is reported to have determined that a Democrat should fill the remainder of Paty's term, which ends May 18, 1960.

Welch, 65, has been dean of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, director of the experimental station and agricultural extension service at the University of Kentucky in Lexington since 1951. He is a native of Winfield, Tex.

Compromise Civil Rights Measure May Get Approval

WASHINGTON (AP)—House Republicans Wednesday unveiled a proposed civil rights compromise under which federal judges would be given limited powers to punish for criminal contempt in voting cases without jury trials.

House GOP leader Martin of Massachusetts disclosed at a news conference details of a plan which President Eisenhower had said earlier in the day the Republicans would make with his approval.

As Martin outlined it, it would accept a move by Rep. Celler (D-N.Y.) to limit jury trials in criminal cases to those involving voting rights, with one proviso.

"We propose as a solution," the GOP statement said, "a provision in voting cases only where the penalty to be imposed is to exceed \$300 fine or 90 days imprisonment, there would be no jury trial."

Under the jury trial provision of the bill, a person convicted by the jury could be fined up to \$1,000 and get a jail term of up to six months.

There was no immediate indication from the Democrats led by Speaker Rayburn of Texas whether they would go along.

Rayburn said after a first glance at Martin's proposal: "This is very deep stuff. I'll have to have some time to digest it."

The bill has been deadlocked in the House Rules Committee amid rival Republican-Democratic strategy since the Senate passed the bill Aug. 7 with a requirement for jury trials in all criminal contempt cases. This would apply in many cases other than those involving civil rights.

Eisenhower had told his news conference he would accept a compromise which provides for effective enforcement of voting rights. He did not spell out details at the time, but said it would represent a position between the one he took originally and the Senate bill.

Trading Continued Dull On Alfalfa Markets
PORTLAND (AP)—Trading continued dull on Pacific Northwest alfalfa markets the past week with slow demand and plentiful supplies.

The Department of Agriculture reported markets under heavy pressure from a large 1957 crop plus a record high carryover of last year's crop. Market prices were \$14 a ton under a year ago and the lowest since 1942.

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
