Russian Jetliner TU104 Is Most Luxurious Thing Soviet Union Has To Offer

MOSCOW (AP)—The most luxurious thing in the Soviet Union is the Russian jetliner TU104. Three stewardesses serve vodka, caviar on toast and fresh oranges. They fuss over you just like stewardesses do between Paris and London or between Denver and Los Angeles—but there is a difference. You get fussed over so little in the Soviet Union that when it does happen you glow.

Seats do not recline far enough but they are soft and comfortable. The interior color pattern is red and pink and there are two capi-

talistic looking front lounges where the fortunates in this workers' paradise relax in flight and appear for all the world like corporation vice presidents on the way to a sales conference in Chicago.

The blast from two big jet power plants is bothersome toward the back of the plane but up front it is a kittenish purr and after two or three of those vodkas you can't hear the noise at all.

Each of the 70 seats is without a safety belt. Russians don't believe in them.

The TU104 is so fast you don't have long to enjoy the comforts. The medium jet flies from Moscow to Prague every day in 2½ hours. That's the same as flying from New York to Kansas City in about the time it takes to see a movie. Other TU104 routes go out of Moscow daily to Tashkent in the Uzbek Republic, to southern Russia and all the way across Siberia to Peiping.

It is the only jetliner in the world on regularly scheduled flights. Britain's original Comets were failures and the first American jets from Boeing and Douglas will not take on paying passengers for another couple of years.

This is a propaganda plum for the Russians. The pitch is skillfully done and no mention is made that the 104 is redesigned from a bomber and that it drinks jet fuel at a prodigious rate no commercial airline in the world could afford to operate it.

Processing Plant Ready To Accept Uranium Ore

FORD, Wash. (AP)—The Dawn Mining Co. said Wednesday its new \$3 million dollar processing plant is now ready to accept uranium ore from independent Northwest producers.

"We've all been waiting for this a long time," said Milan Patulak, geologist for the Atomic Energy Commission in Spokane. Ford is north of there in Spokane County.

"This will be a good deal for the independent companies around here because they will save the expense of shipping to Salt Lake City where the nearest processing plant before this one is located."

R. B. Fulton, plant manager, made this announcement.

"Dawn Mining Co. offers, effective today, to purchase uranium-bearing ores that are economically and metallurgically amenable to its plant process from domestic independent producers in negotiated amounts and at prices, premiums and allowances, and upon terms and conditions and subject to specifications in accordance with the provisions of the Atomic Energy Commission's domestic uranium program."

NEW YORK (AP)—Directors of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. Wednesday declared the usual \$2.25 quarterly dividend, payable Oct. 10 to stockholders of record Sept. 10.

The dividend was the 146th consecutive quarterly dividend at the \$9 annual rate paid by the company and will go to more than one and one-half million stockholders.

Judge For Girard Trial Known As Man Who Won't Yield To Pressure Groups

MAEBASHI, Japan (AP)—A tall, gaunt man of 50 stalks like a pensive stork through the streets of this quiet rural city nightly, a shopping bag swinging from one arm.

Neighbors and passers-by bow low as he passes. He returns their salutes but does not stop to chat. In the tiny four-room house where he lives alone he prepares his evening meal as a handsome German shepherd dog watches from beneath a chair.

The man is Dist. Judge Yuzo Kawachi, who will preside at the trial of Specialist 3C. William S. Girard, accused of fatally shooting a Japanese woman on a U.S. military firing range last Jan. 30. The trial opens here Monday.

In 21 years on the bench, Judge Kawachi has become known as a stern man who follows the dictates of his conscience and who does not yield to pressure. He won a measure of fame by refusing to bow to Japanese army pressure while serving as a civilian army judge in Indonesia during World War II.

"Don't think I am a misanthrope or a stoic after seeing how I live here," Kawachi said with a smile during an interview.

"Every weekend I go to my Tokyo house and enjoy my wife and three children," he said.

"They have to live in Tokyo because of the children's schooling. This way of life is as painful to me as to anyone—particularly for a judge who must live with dignity, at a low salary."

His base pay is \$2,240 a year, supplemented by a living allowance.

Kawachi has been district judge in this rural city some 80 miles north of Tokyo since 1947. He enjoys a high reputation in this province. Last July 19, 1957, he sentenced to three years in prison a Japanese charged with "bodily injury resulting in death" of a man—technically the same charge as that faced by Girard.

"Human life is precious," the judge told that man.

Of the Girard case, he said: "I have not found all the facts of the case. . . . What I can say is that I am determined to carry out a fair and fast trial. I have asked prosecutors and defense lawyers not to engage in esoteric arguments not pertinent to the case which serve only to delay the procedure. They agreed not to do that."

After a few minutes of meditation, Kawachi spoke softly, as if to himself. "Human life is precious. No one is supposed to get away free after killing a man or woman without provocation. Unless there were full extenuating reasons."

"I have not found out all the facts of the case. I plan to go out to the scene in the firing range Sept. 6 and 7 to carry out an on-the-spot survey. But do you think the U.S. Army orders its men to shoot and kill a woman without challenge?"

Japanese police in this city have quoted Japanese witnesses as saying Girard "enticed and induced" Mrs. Naka Sakai, 46-year-old shell picker, before he shot her to death with an empty cartridge fired from his rifle grenade launcher.

Governor Asks Commission To Refer Dam Application

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—Gov. Holmes asked the state Hydroelectric Commission Tuesday to refer to the state Water Resources Board the application of Pacific Northwest Power Co. for a state license for construction of the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams on the Snake River.

The governor said the Water Resources Board should make the study because "there is evidence that these projects are prejudicial to the public interest of the state of Oregon."

The company also has applied for a federal permit, and an examiner for the federal Power that the permit be granted. The Governor and Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan have protested to the FPC against issuing the permit.

There is a legal question as to whether a state permit is needed. The Hydroelectric Commission already has referred to the state Water Resources Board the application by Idaho Power Co. for a state permit to build three dams on the Snake River. However, construction of these dams is proceeding under a federal Power Commission permit.

The governor said he opposes the federal permit for the Mountain Sheep and Pleasant Valley dams because "of the single purpose nature of these projects and their limited storage capacity."
